
9.7 MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF REVIEW.

- (a) The Board of Review shall convene in its first session on the second Monday in March of each year at such time of day and place as shall be designated by the Council and shall remain in session for at least four hours for the purpose of considering and correcting the roll. In each case in which the assessed value of any property is increased over the amount shown on the assessment roll as prepared by the assessor, or any property is added to such roll by the Board, or the Board has resolved to consider at its second session such increasing of an assessment or the adding of any property to such roll, the Assessor shall give notice thereof to the owner as shown by such roll by a first class letter mailed not later than the second day following the end of the first session of the Board. Such notice shall state the date, time, place and purpose of the second session of the Board. The failure of the owner to receive such notice shall not invalidate any assessment roll or assessment thereon.
- (b) The Board of Review shall convene in its second session on the fourth Monday in March of each year for two consecutive days and as much longer as may be necessary, from 9:00 a.m. to noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m., at such place as shall be designated by the Council and shall continue in session until all interested persons have had an opportunity to be heard, but in no case for less than eight hours. The Board of Review shall convene for at least one evening session from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. The Board may not increase any assessment or add any property to the rolls, except in those cases in which the Board resolved at its first session to consider such increase or addition.

According to the Charter, Council will need to designate the time of day and location for the first meeting in March. It is the Board of Reviews request to have it at 9:00 am at City Hall.

Council will also need to designate the location of the second meetings in March. It is the Board of Reviews request to have it at City Hall

Both designations could be made in the same motion. We would need something to the affect that City Council designates all Board of Review meetings to be held at City Hall with the first meeting in March to be held at 9:00 a.m.

Honorable Mayor and Council,

This is the January month end report. The department handled 89 complaints for the month and made 15 arrests. Six of the fifteen arrests were for Felonies. The most serious offense for the month was a traffic stop which subsequently led to an arrest for, "Possession with Intent to Deliver Crack Cocaine". A significant amount of Crack Cocaine was seized by the department. Per information from STING, we are expecting to see an increase in Cocaine in the area. We are being advised that Heroin users are converting over to forms of Cocaine as they are becoming scared of Heroin, which is almost always cut with a varying amount of Fentanyl now. Fentanyl is a prescription drug commonly given to cancer patients for extreme pain. Fentanyl is essentially Pharmaceutical grade Heroin (Opiate) which is 100% pure, which makes it so dangerous.

The department further handled four Domestic Assaults this month. One Domestic Incident developed into Resisting Arrest. Resisting Arrest occurs when a subject actively fights with an Officer, which automatically makes the incident a Felony.

LANSING, Mich. – The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) announced today that 51 water systems have been awarded a Water Fluoridation Quality Award from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Fluoridation is the adjustment of fluoride in the water to a level that is optimal for preventing tooth decay. It has been recognized by CDC as one of 10 great public health achievements of the 20th Century. CDC recommends water fluoridation as a safe, effective and inexpensive method of preventing decay. In fact, every \$1 invested in fluoridation saves at least \$38 in costs for dental treatment.

"Michigan consistently exceeds the CDC recommendations for community water supplies by having 90 percent of our population on community water systems accessing fluoridated water," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, chief medical executive and chief deputy for health for MDHHS. "These awards demonstrate the commitment to quality by these community water systems. Water fluoridation benefits all residents of a community and it has demonstrated its effectiveness in preventing tooth decay throughout one's lifetime."

Sample Motion to go into Closed Session to discuss Pending Litigation &

Matters Subject to Attorney/Client Privilege

"I move to go into Closed Session pursuant to MCL 15.268 (H) & (E) to discuss matters of pending litigation that are subject to Attorney/Client Privilege."

Permissible Reasons to go into Closes Session pursuant to State Statute:

15.268 Closed sessions; permissible purposes.

Sec. 8.

A public body may meet in a closed session only for the following purposes:

- (a) To consider the dismissal, suspension, or disciplining of, or to hear complaints or charges brought against, or to consider a periodic personnel evaluation of, a public officer, employee, staff member, or individual agent, if the named person requests a closed hearing. A person requesting a closed hearing may rescind the request at any time, in which case the matter at issue shall be considered after the rescission only in open sessions.
- (b) To consider the dismissal, suspension, or disciplining of a student if the public body is part of the school district, intermediate school district, or institution of higher education that the student is attending, and if the student or the student's parent or guardian requests a closed hearing.
- (c) For strategy and negotiation sessions connected with the negotiation of a collective bargaining agreement if either negotiating party requests a closed hearing.
- (d) To consider the purchase or lease of real property up to the time an option to purchase or lease that real property is obtained.
- (e) To consult with its attorney regarding trial or settlement strategy in connection with specific pending litigation, but only if an open meeting would have a detrimental financial effect on the litigating or settlement position of the public body.
- (f) To review and consider the contents of an application for employment or appointment to a public office if the candidate requests that the application remain confidential. However, except as otherwise provided in this subdivision, all interviews by a public body for employment or appointment to a public office shall be held in an open meeting pursuant to this act. This subdivision does not apply to a public office described in subdivision (j).
- (g) Partisan caucuses of members of the state legislature.
- (h) To consider material exempt from discussion or disclosure by state or federal statute.

- (i) For a compliance conference conducted by the department of commerce under section 16231 of the public health code, Act No. 368 of the Public Acts of 1978, being section 333.16231 of the Michigan Compiled Laws, before a complaint is issued.
- (j) In the process of searching for and selecting a president of an institution of higher education established under section 4, 5, or 6 of article VIII of the state constitution of 1963, to review the specific contents of an application, to conduct an interview with a candidate, or to discuss the specific qualifications of a candidate if the particular process of searching for and selecting a president of an institution of higher education meets all of the following requirements:
- (i) The search committee in the process, appointed by the governing board, consists of at least 1 student of the institution, 1 faculty member of the institution, 1 administrator of the institution, 1 alumnus of the institution, and 1 representative of the general public. The search committee also may include 1 or more members of the governing board of the institution, but the number shall not constitute a quorum of the governing board. However, the search committee shall not be constituted in such a way that any 1 of the groups described in this subparagraph constitutes a majority of the search committee.
- (ii) After the search committee recommends the 5 final candidates, the governing board does not take a vote on a final selection for the president until at least 30 days after the 5 final candidates have been publicly identified by the search committee.
- (iii) The deliberations and vote of the governing board of the institution on selecting the president take place in an open session of the governing board.
