





HAM-PLAINFIELD ROUNDABOUT PROJECT UPDATE

You will see an increase in activity as the HAM-Plainfield Roundabout Project ramps up in Blue Ash.

Several steps need to be completed before the road construction work begins in September.

Demolition of the Speedway and Marathon Gas Stations at the corner of Plainfield Road and Hunt Road is expected to begin in late July/early August and should take several weeks to complete.

Lane closures and some night work will take place as Duke Energy work is completed on Hunt Road.

Cincinnati Bell is installing underground conduit in front of the Marathon Gas Station and Evans Auto, then crews will install overhead cable on the new Duke Energy Utility poles along Hunt Road.

FREEDOM IS NOT FREE

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Under the current plan, the roundabouts will be constructed in this order:



- Kroger entrance on Hunt Road
- Plainfield Road and Hunt Road
- Plainfield Road and Peppermill Lane

Once complete, these roundabouts will greatly improve safety and ease traffic congestion well into the future.

SOLDIER'S NAME ADDED TO MEMORIAL STONE

Staff Sergeant William "Billy" Hoeb's name has been added to the Memorial Stone outside of the Bicentennial Veterans Memorial in Blue Ash.

During WWII, Hoeb's B-26 went down, and all of the crew, including Hoeb, were killed.

It was recently discovered that Hoeb had lived in Blue Ash.

The announcement of the addition of Hoeb's name was made during the Memorial Day Ceremony on May 31.

BLUE ASH GOLF COURSE HELPS THREATENED BUTTERFLIES

The Blue Ash Golf Course has joined a nationwide effort to help save threatened monarch butterflies.

In partnership with the USGA and Audubon International, the golf course is now a part of "Monarchs in the Rough," a project to increase pollinator habitat on golf courses throughout the U.S.

Over 700 golf properties, including the Blue Ash Golf Course, have committed 1,020 acres to creating new plantings of the milkweed plants these butterflies need to survive.

"The Monarch population has declined rapidly," said Scott Kincaid, Blue Ash Golf Course Superintendent. "I felt we were well suited to help restore some habitat that would benefit their return."

There are two areas on the Blue Ash Golf Course that are part of the project: between the 1^{st} and 18^{th} hole and behind the 8^{th} green. You can view the pollinator areas while playing a round of golf.

CITIZEN SPOTLIGHT: MAGGIE NEUMANN

"She believed she could, so she did."

That's Maggie Neumann's motto and she lives up to it in her work and deeds.

The 22-year-old did something that many people would have found incredibly daunting during a pandemic.

She started her own business, Maggie's Marvelous Mini Cheesecakes, in June of 2020.

Even more inspiring, she donates 20 percent of her profits to organizations that help the community, like Operation Giveback (OGB) in Blue Ash.

"I did that because they donate food for people who don't have a lot of food," said Neumann, adding that she was especially happy to have helped OGB provide toys to children for the holidays.

OGB volunteer Don McClure said Maggie's generosity is amazing.

"She has done wonderful things for OGB," McClure said. "She has given us some of her money from her



business but more importantly, she brings our students cheesecakes and they love them!"

PLANNING A GARAGE SALE? DON'T FORGET A PERMIT

Garage and yard sales are a great way to make some money for items you no longer want or need but before you host a sale at your Blue Ash residence there are a few things to know.

To have a garage sale in the City you need to apply for a permit. There is no cost. You can find the form at blueash.com and email it to the Community Development Department at CDPermits@BlueAsh.com.

Garage sales are limited to two per calendar year per residence and can only be two days in length.

The permit holder is responsible for making sure customers follow parking laws.

Garage and yard sale signs must not be placed on utility poles or in the public right-of-way.


POLICE DEPARTMENT HIGHLIGHTS

The City of Blue Ash in partnership with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) Southwest Ohio will present 'NAMI In Our Own Voice,' an interactive presentation to change attitudes, assumptions, and stereotypes about people with mental health conditions.

The free event is open to the public and will take place on September 14, from 7:00 – 8:00 p.m. at the North Fire Station Training Room, 10647 Kenwood Road.

'NAMI In Our Own Voice' combines video and trained NAMI presenters who will talk about their mental health journey.

The presenters humanize the misunderstood, highly stigmatized topic of mental illness by showing that it's possible-and common-to live well with a mental health condition.

This presentation also provides:

- A chance to ask presenters questions, allowing for a deeper understanding of mental health conditions and dispelling of stereotypes and misconceptions.
- The understanding that every person . with a mental health condition can hope for a brighter future.
- Information on how to learn more . about mental health and get involved with the mental health community.


