Have fun and chill out at the Warm 98.5 Ice Rink at Summit Park now through January 8!

Skate sessions are only \$7 per person – skates included. Children three years old and under are free.

The ice rink is located underneath Summit Park's glass canopy, 4335 Glendale Milford Road.

"This year we have even more exciting theme nights and activities," said Margaret O'Gorman, General Manager of Programs and Events in the Blue Ash Parks and Recreation Department. "Our popular Chuck-A-Duck game will be back with great prizes and we'll have some on-ice games in addition to fun theme nights!"

For inexperienced skaters, free skating aids are available for each session while supplies last.

After a spin on the ice, grab a hot chocolate, a DORA beverage, or a meal from one of the four on-site restaurants or the nearby Neighborhoods at Summit Park.

Plus, you can bring a sled when there's a nice coating of snow on the ground to enjoy the sledding hill behind the Observation Tower!



The Warm 98.5 Ice Rink will be open daily through January 8, with the exception of holidays. Operating hours vary and may depend on weather conditions. 2023 is going to be an exciting year in the City of Blue Ash. Residents can look forward to the completion of the **HAM-Plainfield Roundabouts Project.** The construction of the three roundabouts at Kroger/Hunt, Plainfield/ Hunt, and Peppermill/Hunt will increase safety and traffic flow through the busy corridor. The **Neighborhoods at Summit Park** will also be the site of some exciting projects next year. Construction is underway on the Arabella townhome development, the Nobis rehab hospital will be completed, and residents will enjoy the much-anticipated addition of Sugar n' Spice, a colorful casual diner specializing in stellar breakfasts.

The BLUE project concept at the Kenwood/Cooper corner was approved by City Council in September. The next step will be the submission of a final development plan.



The **Towne Square redesign and the Observation Tower improvement projects** are out to bid. The Towne Square Project will create an inviting, green space for year-round use and events, and a touching, user-friendly, walkthrough of the Bicentennial Veterans Memorial. As for the Tower, visitors will see enhancements to the flooring and railing. It's anticipated that both of these projects will get underway in 2023.

Next year will also be filled with **exceptional events and programs** that only Blue Ash can provide. Red, White & Blue Ash, Summer Concerts, Summit Cinema, Free Fitness, and the 2nd annual Brew Ash are just a few of the free, fun, family-friendly, happenings the Parks and Recreation Department is already planning. 
DID YOU KNOW?

Fall curbside leaf pickup ends on December 9, but before you grab the rake and start bagging the leaves in your yard next year, take a moment to consider if all that hard work is truly necessary. EPA research data shows **yard waste and leaves account for 13 percent of all waste generated**, and eight percent of all waste in landfills. What should you do besides raking and bagging? Experts say you should mulch in place by mowing over the leaves with a mulching blade about once a week.

WINTER WEATHER SAFETY

When **winter weather** strikes in the City of Blue Ash, residents should follow Hamilton County guidelines and recommendations to stay safe. Under Ohio Law, the Hamilton County Sheriff has the responsibility to monitor snow conditions and to declare a "Snow Emergency" when it has been determined that use of highways/ roadways by motorists is a threat to maintaining the public peace. There are three levels that may be issued:

- Snow Alert Level One: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads may also be icy. Motorists are urged to drive very cautiously. No roadways are closed but unnecessary travel is discouraged.
- 2. Snow Advisory Level Two: Roadways are hazardous with blowing and drifting snow. Roads may also be very icy. Only those who feel it is necessary to drive should be out on the roads. All employees should contact their employer to see if they should report to work.
- 3. Snow Emergency Level Three: Ice, blowing and drifting snow has created extremely hazardous road conditions. Low visibility, extremely low temperatures, and worsening road conditions have caused the closing of all or certain County roads to all but emergency and essential persons. No one should be on roadways unless absolutely necessary. All employees should contact their employer to see if they should report to work. Those traveling on the roads may subject themselves to arrest.



Here are the ways you can find out when these snow levels have been issued:

- **Sign up for Alert HC.** This is highly recommended. Alert HC is a notification system provided by the Hamilton County Emergency Management and Homeland Security Agency. Sign up at www.alerthc. org.
- Follow the Hamilton County EMA on Facebook and Twitter.
- Tune in to local news media sources (TV, radio) and/or follow local news sources on social media.

When it snows:

- Avoid parking on the streets
- Don't shovel or plow into streets
- Don't pass a snowplow
- Don't crowd the plows
- Slow down and take your time
