### Community Calendar Contest



The City of Blue Ash is looking for creative and talented photographers to put together the official 2014 Community Calendar.

One of the City's largest and most popular communication efforts, the annual Community Calendar is also one of its biggest public relations undertakings, as it is mailed to over 7,000 resident and business addresses.

As the 2013 Community Calendar contest proved to be a huge success, the City is giving the community another chance to contribute to the final product.

Professional and amateur photographers are invited to submit their contest entries now through Friday, September 14 to enter the 2014 Calendar Contest. 13 photos will be chosen, one for each month and the cover shot. Photos taken within the last 2 years are suitable for submission, and several different categories of images will be considered (e.g. parks and recreation, holiday, patriotism, family, business, municipal service, seasons, landscapes). The 13 photos used in the 2013 calendar will not be considered if resubmitted.

Once all entries have been submitted, they will be uploaded to the City of Blue Ash's Facebook page, <http://www.facebook.com/BlueAshOhio>, where individuals can vote for photos by "liking" individual photos. The voting period will take place Monday, September 16 through Friday, September 27, and the most popular photos will then be considered for the 2014 Blue Ash Community Calendar. Winners will then be notified by Friday, October 4.

#### CONTEST RULES & REGULATIONS

- Open to all photographers, both professional and amateur. Photographers do not need to be residents of the City of Blue Ash to participate.
- Digital photos from all seasons are suitable for the 2014 calendar. Photos must be taken within the last 2 years.
- The City of Blue Ash reserves the right to use submitted photos in the calendar as well as other promotional publications. The City also reserves the right to crop photos to fit the horizontal layout nature of the calendar as needed.
- To enter, photos can be emailed to [calendarcontest@blueash.com](mailto:calendarcontest@blueash.com). Be sure to include your contact information (name, phone number/email address) along with a title, brief description, and the location where the photo was taken.
- No financial compensation will be offered to the winning photographers; the photographer submitting the winning cover photo will receive a Blue Ash Prize Pack.
- Photos depicting imagery outside of Blue Ash city limits, as well as those featuring questionable imagery (violence/explicit and offensive language/mature themes, copyrighted material) will be disqualified.

### Summit Park Construction Update

The City officially broke ground on Summit Park construction on June 13th. Currently, the earthwork continues on approximately 42 acres of Summit Park. The excavation contractor, Nelson Stark, is working to create portions of the future ponds and is placing fill around the great lawn. Nelson Stark began installation of the storm sewers in late July, along with the sanitary sewers in early August. ## Patient Returns to Thank EMS Providers

In mid-April, James Early suffered cardiac arrest while mowing grass at his daughter's residence in Blue Ash. A passerby saw Mr. Early lying in the yard and immediately called 9-1-1. Meanwhile, another Good Samaritan administered CPR to Mr. Early until EMS arrived. Blue Ash Paramedics then initiated advanced life support and regained a heart beat prior to transporting him to Bethesda North Hospital. On Friday, July 19, 2013, Mr. Early, his wife, daughter, and granddaughter visited the North Fire Department to personally thank the Paramedics who helped saved his life.

# News from the Blue Ash Police Department

## A few notes from Police Chief Paul Hartinger

School begins in just a few weeks. BAPD advises residents and corporate citizens to be careful of children present in the neighborhoods. Ohio Revised Code section 4511.75 describes rules about driving when school buses are picking up and dropping off children:

- You must stop for school buses receiving or discharging school children on undivided two-lane roadways, and remain stopped until the bus resumes motion or until signaled by the driver to proceed.
- If the roadway is divided into four or more lanes, such as Kenwood Road at Hunt Road, cars approaching from the opposite direction of the bus are not required to stop, only those cars overtaking (coming up behind the bus) shall stop.

Help BAPD keep your community safe by locking your cars, closing garage doors and taking your personal property into your house. Even small items such as yard tools are targets. GPS units, iPods and inexpensive items left visible in your car are all inviting to thieves as well.

As the daylight hours become shorter towards fall, there is sometimes activity in your neighborhood that looks suspicious, but you're not sure if you should call the police or not. Best thing to do: call and advise the police dispatcher of what you see. In fact, many times the police investigate crimes where the victims report that they saw something that just didn't look right, but didn't call the police. Remember, if it's a true emergency and you need help right away; dial 9-1-1. If you would like us to check something out or you just need to speak to an officer, call 745-8555.

Blue Ash Police is the head agency for the OVI Task Force. We proactively patrol for impaired drivers and prosecute offenders. Blue Ash encourages people to drive sober and get home safely. We also advocate for everyone to wear seatbelts in motor vehicles.

## Sidewalk Construction

The City has begun construction on three sidewalk projects throughout Blue Ash:

- Cooper Road (Plainfield to Waxwing)
- Plainfield Road (Cooper to Glendale-Milford)
- Reed Hartman Highway (Osborne to Cornell)

These sidewalks will add connectivity to Summit Park and fill in several gaps in sidewalks that currently exist. For the Cooper and Plainfield sidewalks, the City asks that the public temporarily find alternate



routes and do not use the extended shoulders. As construction takes place, several types of hazards will exist throughout both of these projects. The City asks that everyone obliges to stay safe.

## Carver Road Rehabilitation Project

The Carver Road Rehabilitation projects will begin shortly. Currently, the City plans on reconstructing one side of the road at a time. This will result in one-way traffic through the duration of this project. Please pay special attention to this area, as the City does not want anyone to drive in the wrong direction. ## UC Blue Ash College – Muntz Hall Renovation Project

- A \$4.5 million project is being coordinated by the UC architects to address the need to re-design existing space and provide more room for the growing student population.
- Renovation began in fall 2012 and will be complete by the end of this summer (the only remaining part of the project under construction is the patio for the outdoor portion of the Commons).
- The renovation covers 22,000 square feet and includes the new Bleecker Street Café; a Community Commons with space inside and an outdoor patio for meeting, studying or just relaxing; a new state-of-the-art library; and a renovated Dean's Suite.
- The new Café and Commons are really transforming the campus and providing a new energy that is created as people are coming together to meet, study and collaborate.
- UC Blue Ash College has approximately 5,000 students, with another 1,000 who come from area colleges and universities to take classes. It is the largest regional college campus in Ohio.

“The new café and commons are designed with our students, faculty and staff in mind,” said Dr. Cady Short-Thompson, Dean of UC Blue Ash. “We wanted to provide a new, inviting and comfortable space where people can come together to meet, study or just take a break from a busy day. I believe this addition will really help transform our campus.”
