History & Information

Elko Police Department History & Information

The City of Elko was incorporated by an Act of the Legislature of the State of Nevada March 14, 1917. At that time a Police Supervisor, W.R. Mayer, was appointed to be the executive officer of his department and had under his special charge the enforcement of all police regulations.

On June 2, 1917, George Cotant was unanimously appointed City Marshall and J.C. Doughty was unanimously appointed Police Judge for the City of Elko, both with a monthly salary of \$1 each. Also on this date, F.H. Sutton was appointed Night Watchman with a monthly salary of \$100.

Today, the Elko Police Department consists of 56 employees. Of these 56 employees, 45 are sworn officers. Of those 45 sworn officers 31 are assigned to the Patrol Unit, 7 are assigned to the Detective Unit, 4 are in special assignments (i.e. the School Resource Officer Unit and the Elko Combined Narcotics Unit), and the final 3 sworn officers make up the Command Staff. The 11 non-sworn positions are assigned as follows: 1 Records Supervisor, 4 full-time Records Techs, 1 Evidence Tech, 1 Part-time Evidence Technician, 1 Administrative Assistant, 1 Part-time Domestic Violence Systems Advocate, 1 Animal Control Officer, and 1 Part-time Animal Control Officer.

The Elko Police Department is a professional and progressive law enforcement agency that is continually moving forward. We are always looking for opportunities to improve training, education, technology and equipment for our staff.

The Operations Division handles all crime calls and traffic accidents within the City limits, as well as routine police matters which include animal calls, funeral processions, parades and much more. Our average response time to emergency calls is three minutes from the time the call is dispatched to the

The following is an Annual Report for the Elko Police Department, year 2022. The report includes summaries and charts for licensing permit data, crime comparison data, and records transactions data.

Licensing / Permits / Applications:

In 2022, the Elko Police Department processed a total of 72 licensing and permit applications. The licenses and permits breakdown into the following categories, (see chart 1a): 0 brothel licenses, 45 special event liquor licenses, 7 liquor license applications, 7 parade permits, 6 solicitor/peddler applications, 3 temporary sexually oriented business licenses, 4 special event/vendor applications, and 0 temporary merchant applications.

Online reports: 407 (down 57 from 2021).

Records Unit Transactions:

In 2022, the Records Unit processed 799 total transactions. These transactions breakdown into the following categories (see chart 1b): 154 work card applications (bartender cards, taxi drivers, etc.), 40 sex worker applications, 3 solicitor applications, 391 miscellaneous fingerprint transactions (gaming, nursing, teachers, daycare, etc.), and 211 insurance report records.





Crime Report:

In 2022 the Elko Police Department made 807 arrests, 734 adults and 73 juveniles. There were 448 traffic collisions investigated and 642 traffic citations issued. 710 incidents of domestic violence were reported in 2022. The total calls for service in 2022 were 22,920, down 8% from 2021; this generated 2,105 cases for the department, down by 17%.

Severe crimes in the City of Elko totaled 1,654 for 2022. This total is down 440 incidents from 2021's severe crime totals. Severe crimes include: murder and manslaughter, kidnapping and abduction, forcible rape, forcible fondling, robbery, aggravated assault, simple assault, intimidation, arson, extortion/blackmail, burglary, pocket picking new, purse snatching new, shoplifting new, theft from a building new, theft from coin operated device, theft from motor vehicle, theft of motor vehicle parts & accessories new, all other larceny, motor vehicle theft, counterfeiting and forgery, false pretenses swindling, CC/ATM fraud, impersonation, identity theft new, embezzlement, stolen property offenses, destruction of property, drug narcotic violation, drug equipment, incest new, statutory rape, pornography/obscene material, gambling offense split into other offenses, sports tampering new, assisting and/or promoting prostitution, weapon law violations, and animal cruelty new. (see chart 2 for breakdowns)

Less severe crimes totaled 461 for 2022. This total is down by 115 incidents from 2021 totals. Crimes included as "less severe" are bad checks, curfew/loitering/vagrancy, disorderly conduct, DUI, family offenses (non-violent), liquor law violations, runaway juveniles, trespassing, and other minor offenses. Policy Manual

Lieutenant Palhegyi took on the arduous task of revamping the Elko Police Department's Policy and Procedure Manual, which has been in need of updating for several years. The updating of the policies and procedures is on on-going mission as laws and procedures change but this task was to go through the entire manual to update and refresh all policies and procedures. The task took over 6 months of dedicated time, research, and collaboration with specialty units and outlying agencies.



Administrative Support Division Highlights

Spillman / Computer Aided Dispatch (CAD)


In December of 2022, the Elko Police Department converted to Spillman, a new records management system (RMS).

Personnel

During 2022, the Elko Police Department hired one part-time Animal Control Officer and one part-time Evidence Technician. The department saw one resignation in the Patrol Unit, and three retirements - two from the Detective Unit, a Sergeant and a Detective, and one Sergeant from the Patrol Unit.

The Detective Sergeant retired in late 2022 and Detective Corporal Nielson was selected as the acting Sergeant for the Unit. Detective Parvin successfully tested for the Detective Unit in March

The Elko Police Department strives to hire only the top qualified candidates and we continue recruitment efforts for lateral and new Police Officers.







Operations Division Highlights

Crime Suppression Unit (CSU)

In 2022, the Elko Police Department launched a trial run of the Crime Suppression Unit (CSU). The CSU 7-month trial operated from March 2022 to October 2022. This three officer unit focused on street crimes such as theft of property and drug violations.

During the 7-month trial period the CSU closed 64 cases, made 64 arrests, assisted other entities 90 times, served 40 warrants, investigated 84 suspicious activities, made 291 traffic stops, issued 29 citations and 95 warnings, conducted 45 follow ups and 82 security checks, responded to 11 alarm calls, and 41 criminal investigations focusing on property crimes that lead to drug related calls.

The CSU seized 362.38 grams of methamphetamine, 43.87 grams of heroin, 1.1 grams of cocaine, 60 grams of pills, a total of 115.5 pills, and 60.3 grams of other categories of drugs. This totals 364.35 grams of drugs removed from the streets of Elko by the CSU in a 7 month period.





Operations Division Highlights

Promotions

In June of 2022, Corporal Daz was promoted to Sergeant in the Patrol Division. Sergeant Daz has been with the Elko Police Department since 2006, he is a Field Training Officer, a member of the Elko Special Response Team, and the Commander of the Elko Bomb Squad.

Training

In November 2022, Corporal Olvera, Officer Pinkham, Officer Pepper, and Officer Keil hosted a *Patrol Tactics* training class. A total of 15 law enforcement personnel attended the training. This included personnel from the Elko County Sheriff's Office, Eureka County Sheriff's Office, Nevada Game Wardens, Nevada Department of Investigation, Nevada State Police, and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Retirements

Detective Spring retired in March 2022, Sergeant Locuson retired in July 2022, and Sergeant Drake retired in December 2022.





Operations Division Highlights

Animal Control Unit

In 2022, the Animal Control Unit worked 1,121 cases, handling 1,377 animals. These included: 1,052 canines, 279 felines, 17 chickens, and 29 other animals. In 2022, 172 animals were returned to their owners, 116 animal welfare checks were conducted, and 29 animal carcasses were removed.

Specialty Units

Special Weapons and Tactics Team (SWAT)

2022 saw many changes to the SWAT Team. Sergeant Drake, the Commander of the team, resigned in June, and Corporal Williams took over command. There were three members added to the SWAT team and two resigned from the team. One new team leader was chosen, Corporal Olvera.

SWAT responded to nine high-risk callouts in 2023, with several activations for assistance to other agencies and in outlying areas.

Elko Bomb Squad

In 2022, the Elko Bomb Squad responded to fifteen bomb call-outs. The Elko Bomb Squad is a regional team that responds to five counties in the eastern half of the state.

The Elko Bomb Squad responds to calls for suspicious packages, bomb threats, old explosives, and other calls as needed.

Honor Guard

In February 2022, Officer Anderson took on the roll of Honor Guard Commander. The Honor Guard attended one line of duty death funeral in Las Vegas for Truong Thai of the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department.

The Honor Guard had three training days and attended five events in 2022 (Parades, Color Guard, etc.). The unit currently has four active members, consisting of one Sergeant, one Detective Corporal, one Detective, and one Patrol Officer.









School Resource Officers

ALERT Class

School Resource Officers have continued the ALERT Class program. The ALERT class is an eight (8) hour drug, alcohol, and tobacco educational class required for students (and their parents) who violate the school district's drug, alcohol, and tobacco policy. Students who attend this class get their suspension time reduced by half, keeping students in school.

Future Law Enforcement Academy Training (FLEAT)

FLEAT was brought back this year. School Resource Officers assisted in teaching several classes during the week long FLEAT Academy. The junior police academy is organized by the Elko Police Department and the Elko Sheriff's Office each year. For 2022, 54 cadets signed up to attend the F.L.E.A.T. academy, 49 actually attended. During the week 4 cadets dropped out due to sickness. A total of 45 cadets complete the F.L.E.A.T. Academy.





Detective Unit Highlights

In 2022, the Elko Police Department Detective Unit received 430 new cases.

- Closed 141 cases
- Completed 119 supplemental reports
- Conducted 5 background investigations
- Prepared / executed 46 search warrants
- Administered / observed 74 forensic interviews
- Completed 23 administrative subpoenas / preservation letters
- Forensically downloaded and examined 89 telephones / mobile devices
- Hosted 5 presentations
- Investigated 82 sexual assaults / child abuse cases
- Investigated 11 homicide / suspicious deaths



Cases

The Detective Unit saw an increase in assigned cases. With the absence of two detectives, the remaining available detectives were tasked with more cases. More cases will be brought into the new year, and higher caseloads are expected for 2023 due to lower staffing levels in the Detective Unit.

Of the 182 assigned cases, 151 were crimes against a person, which equates to 83% of the caseload, versus 17% or 31 crimes against property cases.

The Detective Unit worked on several sexual assault cases, including juvenile sexual assault, with positive outcomes, many of which are still in the judicial process.

Upgrades



The unit performed an infotainment center extraction on a Ford Mustang involved in a vehicle vs. pedestrian showing the vehicle's movements before, during, and after the pedestrian was struck.




Detective Unit Highlights (cont.)

Elko Combined Narcotics Unit Highlights – 2022

The Elko Combined Narcotics Unit (ECNU) initiated 80 cases – 61 drug related. ECNU had a total of 63 arrests and authored several search warrants during 2022.

ECNU seized:

• Methamphetamine: 4,083.15 grams

• Down 6,357.65 grams from 2021

• Heroin: 1,738.21 grams

• Up 806.96 grams from 2021

Cocaine: 4.84 grams

• *Up 3.16 grams from 2021*

• Others: 1,014 dosage units

• *Up 1,010 dosage units from 2021*

The total seized drugs had a street value of \$455,893.

ECNU detectives seized 20 firearms in 2022, with a street value of \$30,650.

The Elko Combined Narcotics Unit assisted neighboring agencies in the response and investigation to other major crimes during the 2022 calendar year.


