# 1. Introduction

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# Introduction

The City of Hazel Park prepared this Recreation Plan in accordance with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources' Guidelines for the Development of Community Park, Recreation, Open Space, and Greenway Plans to:

- Create an inventory of existing parks and recreation facilities in and around the City
- Gain community input on parks and recreation strengths and weaknesses
- Develop goals and objectives that will lead to future improvements
- Establish a framework for future park and recreation improvements
- Provide the planning basis for grants and other funding resources

This plan will address parks located within and under the jurisdiction of The City of Hazel Park. The previous Recreation Plan, completed in 2019, will be reviewed and updated to address input received and analysis conducted as part of this update.




## Community Profile


### LOCATION

Hazel Park is located in the southeastern corner of Oakland County. The city lies 8 miles north of Downtown Detroit, which is the traditional center of the Southeast Michigan region. Access to and from Hazel Park is provided by M-102 (8 Mile Road), I-696, and I-75, which displaced many Hazel Park households when it was constructed in the 1960s. 9 Mile Road connects central Hazel Park directly to Ferndale. It is among the most densely populated cities in Michigan.

## POPULATION

The estimated 2020 population for Hazel Park was 14,983, down 1,439 from the 2010 Census. SEMCOG projects a shift to stabilization or slight growth through 2050, when SEMCOG projects the city will reach a population of just over 15,000 residents. This projection has the potential to prove conservative if Hazel Park absorbs some of the energy around new and infill housing that have seen very high levels of new development and redevelopment in Ferndale and Royal Oak. The City could also fall short of this projection if this does not occur.


The number of households has also decreased since 2010, though the vacancy rate of housing units has decreased from 12.7% in 2010 to 6.3% in 2023. The largest factor in population decline over the last decade has been a sharp decline in average household size, from 2.47 people in 2010 to 2.03 people in 2023.

This decline in household size is closely related to other shifts in the City's population. The City experienced an unusual decline in households with seniors from 2010 to 2022 (down 5.6%) and in seniors living alone (down 8.5%), while those groups grew in most places. However, there was a 25.6% increase in people under 65 living alone, while households with children fell 30.1%.

In general, the implications of the City's population shifts for recreation planning are as follows:

- As the population of children continues to decline, with decreases in all segments under 19, recreation facilities and programming should be balanced toward serving all age groups.
- Senior programming will remain key to supporting this population, and could be a key component of facilitating aging in place.
- Recreation programming and facilities have the potential to help reduce social isolation in a community where a large portion of households (35.5% in 2022) are comprised of one individual living alone.

## DISABILITY

In all parks and recreation planning, accommodations for the disabled are taken into account to ensure access to all future facilities. The US Census Bureau reports that more than 25% of Hazel Park's residents have a disability of some sort, with the most impacted populations being the 35-64 (12.5%) and 65 and older (7.1%) subgroups. Table 1-1 below shows the most prevalent disabilities by type within each of these age groups, with ambulatory, cognitive, and independent living difficulties being the most prevalent.

Ambulatory disabilities include serious difficulties walking or ascending/descending stairs, issues that limit physical activity and lead to poorer health. Cognitive disabilities are those involving limitations in mental functioning and skills such as communicating, self-care, and socialization. Disabilities associated with independent living extend beyond the ability to live alone and/or become employed to include difficulty with independent travel (e.g. using public transportation systems), managing a personal budget, dealing with insensitive and discriminatory behavior by peers, problem solving, making adjustments to change, using community services, making complex decisions, and/or pursuing complex activities.

Giving consideration to these difficulties in planning for parks and recreation activities could result in positive health outcomes for a population that already experiences great difficulty on a day-to-day basis. Accommodations could include upgrades to park equipment and furnishings, installation of ramps or pavement improvements in order to ease accessibility for those who suffer from ambulatory difficulties, and installation of audible crosswalk signals.

## ECONOMICS

Hazel Park is generally less affluent than Oakland County at large. While this affects the City's budget and has historically limited the City's financing, the City is financially stable, and the relatively low cost of housing means that Hazel Park is an affordable place to buy a first home. The City is often cited as an up-and-coming community, primed to receive spill-over redevelopment as neighboring communities such as Ferndale and Royal Oak become more expensive and redevelopment opportunities become more scarce in those jurisdictions. This is partly reflected in home prices, which rose 7.8 percent from September, 2023, to September, 2024, when Rocket Homes reported the average sale price to be \$174,000, similar to prices in Madison Heights and Warren, though far below prices in Royal Oak and Ferndale.

A contributing factor to Hazel Park's relatively low affluence is the population's low educational attainment, though this has changed dramatically since 2010. In 2010, just 7 percent of residents had a bachelor's degree, and 2.3 percent had a graduate degree, while 23.7 percent of adults 25 and older had not finished high school. In 2022, the American Community Survey found that the rate of residents who had not graduated high school fell by almost half to 12.1 percent, while the portion of the population with bachelor's degrees more than doubled to 17.8 percent, and graduate degree holders are now 4.7 percent of the adult population. The portion of residents holding an associate's degree also doubled from 2010 to 2022, from 4.8 percent to 8.5 percent.

Median household income in Hazel Park in 2022 was \$59,576, up 27 percent from 2010. While this is still well below Oakland County's median of \$92,620, it is a major improvement. In 2010, Hazel Park's median household income was just 52.5 percent of the county's; in 2022, it was 64 percent of the county's number. Hazel Park has therefore made significant progress. Indeed, the percentage of residents living in poverty also fell from 25.8 percent in 2010 to 15.5 percent in 2022.


Still, the City must be cognizant of its residents' relative challenges as it plans, and parks and recreation facilities and programming can fill in major gaps in lower incomes residents' access to physical health and social opportunities.

Neighborhood associations have a very strong relationship with the Parks and Recreation Department which provides these groups with meeting space at the community center. Neighborhood associations also support the Parks and Recreation Department with planning annual events.


## Land Use & Zoning

Hazel Park's population is spread evenly throughout the city except for the northeastern corner of the city, which is designated solely for industrial and has become a major warehousing and shipping hub in the years since the closure of the Hazel Park Raceway in 2018. Most of these are single family homes with some patches of single family attached and multi family homes along E. Woodward Heights, E. Woodruff, and Palmer. Industrial development is primarily located along Dequindre and Ten Mile, with a concentration along the eastern portion of Nine Mile. Commercial development is centered around the intersection of John R and Nine Mile with the remainder of that development stretching along those two roads as well as along Eight Mile. Just over 2% of the city's land is dedicated to parks & recreation.

## 2. Administrative Structure

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# Administrative Structure

The Hazel Park Parks and Recreation Department coordinates all parks and recreation services in the City. It is also responsible for the Senior Citizens Department. The Parks and Recreation Department works closely with the Department of Public Works, which is responsible for maintenance and upkeep of all parks and recreation facilities.

The Director of Parks and Recreation is responsible for all recreational programming and facilities. The Director is also the staff liaison to the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, a body of up to seven members that advises the City Manager and City Council on recreation policy. Members are appointed by City Council to two-year terms.

## Parks and Recreation Budget

Funding for the Parks and Recreation Department is provided by City Council in its annual budget, and the Department seeks additional funding via grants.

### PARKS AND RECREATION ADVISORY BOARD

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board holds regular meetings to discuss recreation programming and facilities improvements. It is also the key board for the development of the 5-Year Parks & Recreation Plan. Members of the Advisory Board attend its meetings, listen to the community, promote the participation of different community groups in recreation activities, and provide crucial input to the planning process.

The Advisory Board acts in a fact-finding, advisory capacity, and makes recommendations to the City Manager and City Council. It does not have any legislative or administrative authority. Its role in the recreation planning process includes consideration of community need for recreation facilities and programming, and recommending a program of likely capital expenditures as part of the plan.


The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board was established in 1962 by ordinance. Its structure and duties are set forth in Chapter 2.24 of the City Code of Ordinances. Under Ordinance 2.24, the Advisory Board may have up to 8 members, including the Director of Parks & Recreation, who is a non-voting, permanent member. The Board is currently comprised of five appointed members and the Director.



## Administrative Structure

The Hazel Park Parks & Recreation Advisory Board develops plans for the City's park system, which is administered by the Department of Parks & Recreation. The Department of Public Works maintains the City's park facilities; volunteers also contribute to park maintenance at certain facilities.

## Parks & Recreation Funding

The Parks & Recreation Department derives its primary funding from the City of Hazel Park's general fund. Donations from individuals and private organizations, registration fees, and other contributions (monetary or in-kind) from local businesses and individuals sometimes add to Parks & Recreation revenues, though this is not a consistent source of funding.

At the time of the last 5-year Parks & Recreation Plan, the City still owned the Viking Ice Arena. This facility has since been sold, and it no longer appears as a line item in the table.

Expenses of the Parks & Recreation Department and Senior Services Program include direct costs of maintaining facilities and programming, but also numerous behind-the-scenes costs, such as wages, insurance, supplies, fuel, utilities, and postage.

### 3. Parks & Recreation Inventory

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# Parks & Recreation Inventory

Hazel Park has various recreational amenities for residents and nonresidents to enjoy within its border. The City maintains fifteen parks, totaling over 36 acres of land. Hazel Park is about 2.8 square miles, and its parks occupy roughly 2.1 percent of its land area. The City also maintains a community center and extensive recreation programming.

Creating an inventory and evaluating the existing facilities, parks and land in Hazel Park is important in order to plan for the city's future open space and recreation.

## State Parks and Recreation Areas

Eighteen (18) State parks and recreation areas are located in the seven-county Southeast Michigan region. These parks have a combined area exceeding 75,000 acres and provide a wide range of day use facilities. Common recreation opportunities available at these sites include hiking, swimming, fishing, boating, picnicking, camping, cross-country skiing and snowmobiling, among others. No state parks or recreation facilities are located within Hazel Park or its neighboring communities, apart from Belle Isle in Detroit. Eight recreation facilities operated by the State of Michigan are located in Oakland County.

## Regional Facilities

The Huron-Clinton Metropolitan Authority (HCMA) operates more than one dozen regional recreation areas in Southeast Michigan. These parks provide facilities for a wide range of recreational opportunities, which include picnicking, playgrounds, hiking, swimming, boating, fishing, golf, court games, cross-country skiing, ice-skating and sledding, among others. Three HCMA parks are located in Macomb County, and these are generally closer to Hazel Park than those located in Oakland County itself: Stony Creek Metropark in Washington Township; Lake St. Clair Metropark in Harrison Township; and Wolcott Mill in Ray Township.

## County Facilities

Oakland County owns and operates over a dozen parks and recreation facilities, and its properties include a farmers market and five golf courses. While the county has extensive facilities, Hazel Park's location in the older, more developed area at the meeting point between Macomb, Oakland, and Wayne Counties means that most facilities are fairly distant. The nearest is Catalpa Oaks, which is approximately five miles away, off Greenfield Road, while the Red Oaks golf course is about two miles north in Madison Heights.

## City Facilities

The following pages provide more detail for each of the parks and recreation areas in Hazel Park. the City. Since the adoption of the last 5-year recreation plan, the City sold the Viking Ice Arena, and details of this facility are no longer included in the recreation inventory.


## School Facilities

Hazel Park City School District covers all of Hazel Park and portions of eastern Ferndale. Facilities located within Hazel Park are listed in detail in this chapter. Edison School, Jardon Vocational School, and Webb Elementary are located in Ferndale.

## Regional Planning Efforts

Nine Mile Road is one of the two major thoroughfares running through Hazel Park and provides a key connection to Ferndale and Warren. Hazel Park, Ferndale, Oak Park, Southfield, Farmington, and Farmington Hills are all participating in a Nine Mile Task Force whose aim is to improve the overall function of the corridor and provide better transportation options for all road users. Ferndale and Oak Park have already engaged in projects to change the street layout and improve non-motorized transportation options. As projects proceed through the corridor, Hazel Park should stay engaged and investigate how Nine Mile could play a key role in improving the City's walking and biking connections to its neighbors.

# Barrier Free Analysis

A critical component in planning for recreation facilities is providing barrier-free access to accommodate the needs of visitors with physical and/or mental disabilities. Barrier-free access includes, but is not limited to, ensuring that adequate barrier-free parking spaces, sidewalks, trails, picnic tables, and playground equipment are provided for renovated or new recreational facilities. Standards from The Accessibility Checklist, a guidebook founded upon the Uniform Federal Accessibility Standards (UFAS) and the codes and standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), were used to verify barrier-free compliance.

The MDNR Guidelines require that a barrier-free ranking be given to each facility for assessing its accessibility to people with disabilities. The assessment considers the accessibility of both the facilities themselves as well as the access routes to them. The following system, provided by the MDNR Guidelines for the Development of Community Park, Recreation, Open Space and Greenway Plans (01/27/06), was used to assess each park:

- Rank 1: None of the facilities / park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
- Rank 2: Some of the facilities / park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
- Rank 3: Most of the facilities / park areas meet accessibility guidelines.
- Rank 4: The entire park meets accessibility guidelines.
- Rank 5: The entire park was developed / renovated using the principals of universal design.

## Accessibility

The U.S. Access Board is designated by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) as the agency responsible for developing minimum accessibility guidelines to ensure that new construction and alteration of facilities covered by ADA are accessible and usable by people with disabilities. The Access Board has published the following guidelines that should be used by Access to Recreation applicants to determine the criteria they must exceed to achieve universal accessibility:

## IMPROVEMENTS TO TARGET

In Hazel Park, there are general improvements that could be made to each park that would make them more accessible:

- Concrete pads adjacent to existing benches and tables and connections from walkways to benches will allow users in wheelchairs the ability to be seated next to a friend on a bench.
- Develop paved or stabilized pathways for all amenities within the parks; make all paths of sufficient width for two people to walk side-by-side or pass.
- Provide smooth transitions between trails, picnic areas and decks, etc.
- When making playground improvements, provide ramps and transfers, and use “poured-in-place” or rubber tiles under equipment, rather than loose fill material such as wood chips; as playground equipment requires replacement, provide ramps and transfers to all play components.
- Provide accessible seating spaces near sports courts.
- Note that in the detailed accessibility assessments that follow, parking is analyzed as a contributor to accessibility, but maybe of the City’s parks, being neighborhood parks primarily visited by people on foot, do not have dedicated parking areas. On-street parking is always available; accessibility can be improved by ensuring that ADA-compliant curb cuts are in place providing ramp access to the park.

The Parks & Recreation Advisory Board considers improvements to accessibility across the park system a high priority for the next five years.

# Local Schools and Other Facilities

## Schools

### **Webster Early Childhood Center**

Webster Early Childhood Center is located at the corner of Jarvis and West End Street. South of (and behind) the school site is 1 acre of park and greenspace with two play structures.

### **United Oaks Elementary School**

United Oaks Elementary is located at the corner of Jarvis Ave and Russell Ave. The school maintains two play structures and an asphalt playground area adjacent to the school in addition to one acre of greenspace east of the school site..

### **Hoover Elementary School**

Hoover Elementary School is located directly across the street from Hazel Park High School and the GRBA Field site. The school maintains play structures and a single softball field on a 1.5-acre site directly north of the school building.

### **Michigan Virtual Charter Academy/ Hazel Park Schools Administration Building**

This school site is located at 1620 East Elza Ave and maintains play structures and a swing set on more than 2.5 acres of greenspace.

### **Hazel Park Junior High**

Hazel Park Junior High School is located directly west of the newly renovated Scout Park site. The school maintains two softball fields on the 2.5-acre greenspace between the school building and Scout Park.

### **Hazel Park High School**

Hazel Park High School is located at 23400 Hughes Ave. The school site is directly adjacent to the GRBA Field, a 9-acre site with a football field, baseball field, softball field, and soccer field just north of the school building. On the south side of the school site is a set of six tennis courts.

### **Roosevelt Invest School (Alternative High School)**

The INVEST Roosevelt school site is located directly east of Green Acres Park. The school maintains two play structures on over 2 acres of park and greenspace

## **Other Local Facilities, Agencies, and Departments**

### **Viking Ice Arena**

Viking Ice Arena was once owned by the City, but was sold and is now privately operated as an independent facility.

### **Junior Vikings**

The Parks & Recreation Department collaborates with the Hazel Park City School District for sports programming via Hazel Park Junior Vikings, which currently offers cheerleading, football, and wrestling, with plans to expand its programming.

## **Hazel Park Senior Citizens Department**

When the Ferndale Community Center became inactive, Hazel Park established an important partnership with the Ferndale/Hazel Park Seniors group, which uses the Hazel Park Community Center. Through its Senior Citizens Department, the City of Hazel Park offers programs and events for its senior population which includes:

- Programs & Activities: Offered Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to Hazel Park residents ages 55 and over, and the physically handicapped.
- Transportation: Offered Monday through Thursday from 8:30 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. to Hazel Park residents ages 55 and over, and the physically handicapped in collaboration with SMART. Cost is \$1.50 per person for each one-way ride and \$3 round-trip. Individuals can call (248) 546-4093 to schedule transportation services.
- Chore Assistance Program: The Senior Citizens Department connects senior citizens and others needing assistance with home maintenance with Community Services of Oakland.

## **Intergovernmental Agreement with Oak Park**

The City of Hazel Park has an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Oak Park whereas both cities offer recreation programs at resident rates to residents of the other municipality, which are not currently available within the other municipality. The municipalities have mutually agreed to operate certain recreation programs on this cooperative basis in order to maximize the use of available public resources. Oak Park Recreation offers and provides Hazel Park residents with the following recreation programs at Oak Park resident rates at designated Oak Park locations:

- Use of municipal pool
- Rental of Community Center rooms, park shelters and ball fields
- Program registration
- Senior programs and dues; and
- Additional offerings at the discretion of the Oak Park Recreation Director


Hazel Park Recreation offers and provides Oak Park residents with the following recreation programs at Hazel Park resident rates at designated Hazel Park locations

The Parks & Recreation Department is responsible for oversight and maintenance of the City's 15 parks and the Hazel Park Community Center at 620 W. Woodward Heights Blvd. The Parks & Recreation Department and the Department of Public Works collaborate to keep Hazel Park's recreation facilities clean and in good working order. Regular maintenance, trash removal, and labor for events are coordinated between the two departments.

## 4. Recreation Needs Analysis

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# Recreation Needs Analysis

To analyze the recreational needs of Hazel Park residents and determine deficiencies within recreation programs, it is helpful to consider standards for recreation service areas, land needs based on future population, and the ultimate size and extent of recreation facilities and their location.

These recreation planning standards are a useful tool in making an assessment of future recreation needs. Standards may be used effectively only as a means for comparing present conditions to what is thought to be suitable or desirable, and as a general guide toward estimating future needs and demands.

The following organizations have developed guidelines for recreation, which are referenced in this analysis of Hazel Park's recreation facilities:

1. **Heritage Conservation & Recreation Service (HCRS)**

The HCRS recommends standards based on compiled data on standards used or recommended by various city, county, metropolitan, state, and federal park and recreation agencies.

2. **Urban Land Institute (ULI)**

The ULI, a private research organization concerned with planning and development of land, recommends standards for recreation areas for community and neighborhood development.

3. **National Recreation and Park Association (NRPA)**

The NRPA developed the following recommended standards and guidelines for recreation, parks and open space.

## Recommended Community Recreation Facilities

The major types of community recreation facilities recommended by the above organizations include:

1. **Playgrounds/Mini-Parks**

Specialized facilities that serve a concentrated or limited population, or specific groups such as small children or senior citizens. For example, suggested recreational amenities for an individual mini-park include a tot lot, two picnic tables and open space.

2. **Playfield or Athletic Fields/Neighborhood Park**

Neighborhood parks should offer a variety of activities to accommodate a range of ages, physical abilities, and recreational interests. Therefore, it is recommended that neighborhood parks should be comprised of approximately 50% active uses (fields, courts, playgrounds, skating, etc.) and 50% passive uses (trails, picnic areas, etc.). In an urbanized community such as Hazel Park, parking occurs on the street.

3. **Community Parks**

Community-wide parks include larger parks with diverse environmental quality. A variety of passive and active uses are provided, including athletic fields, sledding hills, trails, picnic areas, and playgrounds. Typically, uses are separated by activity and age group to limit potential conflicts between different types of users. Other potential facilities include lighted spectator-type athletic fields and off-street parking.

4. **Connector Trails**

Connector trails would include a multi-use trail to give non-motorized access to parks and other uses throughout the City, and would also provide connections to regional bike lanes. Modes of travel include walking, biking, and in-line skating. These trails would by necessity be located within the road rights-of-way. There are no current standards for trails within/around a community.

## 5. NRPA Annual Agency Review

Each year, the NRPA surveys parks and recreation agencies across the US and shares this data to help communities benchmark their programs and facilities against similar-sized peers. The NRPA recognizes that applying standards and guidelines often prove challenging due to the variety of populations served and funding sources available. Table 4-1 on the following page shows current benchmarks for certain park facilities. The list illustrates the number of facilities that might be expected within Hazel Park, based on its current and future population.

# Parkland Analysis

Approximately 37.75 acres of parks and facilities exist within Hazel Park, owned by the City and managed by the Department of Public Services. The Hazel Park Public Schools own the remaining 20.5 acres.

## MINI/NEIGHBORHOOD PARK

Mini/Neighborhood parks serve an area up to a one-half mile distance and are typically less than 10 acres in size. Hazel Park has eleven (11) mini-parks, three (3) neighborhood parks, and eight (8) school facilities that provide less than the recommended acreage for mini and neighborhood parks.

## COMMUNITY PARK

Community parks typically serve an area within one-half to three miles and are between 30 to 50 acres in size. However, since the City of Hazel Park is only 2.8 square miles many of the City's community parks are smaller than the guidelines, but serve a community-wide function. The City owns roughly 18 acres of community parkland, 65 acres less than the recommended acreage for community parks. In addition to the City-owned land, Hazel Park Public Schools contributes 17.5 acres of land since it is categorized as a community park. With public school parks included, Hazel Park's community parkland deficiency decreases to 47.5 acres.

## SCHOOL PARKS

School properties can fulfill the requirements for other classes of parks such as neighborhood, community, sports complex, and special use. For the purposes of this inventory all childhood centers and elementary and middle school facilities were classified as neighborhood parks, and Hazel Park Advantage, Hazel Park High School, Hazel Park Junior High School, and Roosevelt Invest School were considered community parks.

## REGIONAL PARK

Regional facilities offer a variety of active and passive recreational opportunities which help in meeting the need for local parkland and help balance the deficiencies in facilities. Hazel Park does not have a regional park within its borders. However, it should be noted that a number of regional parks are within a short distance from the City despite not being within its borders.

According to the above guidelines, the City of Hazel Park exhibits a deficiency in the community park category when school properties are included. Overall, the City is providing an exceptional amount of parkland for its residents given the constraint of its municipal boundaries and relatively dense land use.

## State of Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR)

The DNR includes a Recommended Classification System for Local and Regional recreation Open Space and Trails (see Table 4) for the development of recreation plans. On the next page, these standards outline recommendations for developed recreation acreage and for the various types of recreation activities; however, it should be noted that these standards are guidelines and the City should consider other recreation opportunities within the area as well as the ability to maintain community facilities.

## 5. The Planning Process

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# Planning Process

The recreation planning process in Hazel Park is intended to involve individuals who represent a broad cross-section of the community's population. The City Council is responsible for implementing the Recreation Plan, but the Advisory Board provides input, analysis and recommendations. The planning process began with an inventory of all Hazel Park parks facilities. A survey was then developed and posted online.

Using the inventory and survey findings, this Recreation Plan identifies opportunities to improve the City's park facilities, along with goals for the future. The draft plan and 5-year action program of priority projects will be reviewed by the Advisory Board. Following the recommendation of approval by the Advisory Board, the plan will be presented to the City Council. The draft plan will be made available for public review and comment for at least 30 days prior to formal adoption by the City Council. Notice of the public review period will be provided in the local newspaper. The plan will be presented at a public hearing held by the Advisory Board. Copies of the notices announcing the review period and public hearing are included in the Appendix.

## Public Input – Online survey


The online survey measured basic familiarity with the park system, preferred locations for increased walkability and a new recreation center, and level of satisfaction with existing facilities park. Questions asked how often they visit parks and why, what respondents felt is missing from the city parks, and what their priorities were for the system. Questions provided by Oakland County regarding inclusivity were also included. The online survey was open from late July through late August, 2024, and generated 307 responses; additionally, paper surveys and links to the online survey were sent to all City households in the mail with the water bill; roughly 100 paper surveys were completed and returned. The 2018 survey received only 56 responses.




## Public Input – Open House

A public open house was held on October 3rd, 2024, from 4:30 to 6:30pm, allowing members of the public to respond to conceptual plans that had been developed for the pocket parks in the southern part of the City, as well as the goals and objectives of the plan. Participants were enabled to provide open-ended feedback as well. About twenty people attended the open house and provided feedback.

Passionate community members advocated for augmentation of the City's tree canopy and a skate park, and numerous other comments were also received. These can be viewed in full in the photos below. Transcribed responses are in the Appendix.



## 6. Goals & Objectives

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# Goals & Objectives

This plan sets forth a set of goals objectives for the future of parks and recreation in Hazel Park. Goals and objectives offer guidelines and milestones for parks and recreation planning. The following carry forward or build on the previous recreation plan (2020-2024), as the Advisory Board found that they were still applicable.



## WHAT ARE GOALS, OBJECTIVES, AND ACTION ITEMS?

- **Goals** are general guidelines that explain what the community wants to achieve. Goals are usually long-term and represent global visions such as “foster a unique and inclusive community.” Goals define the “what” but not the “how.”
- **Objectives** identify the milestones that mark progress in achieving goals – more of the “how.” For example, the goal of “foster a unique and inclusive community” could be measured in terms of “establishing youth and teen programming for the summer months. Objectives are plan-specific and are included here.
- **Action items** are more specific and define the steps to accomplish objectives and attain the identified goals – these could be considered the “who” and “when.”

## GOAL 1: Foster an inclusive and unique community.

### Goal 1 Objectives

Seek partnerships with local organizations, clubs and institutions to provide a more expanded variety of organized activities and programs – particularly at underutilized park sites - within the community. This includes:

- Senior walking clubs.
- Theatrical programming that involves schools, library, and residents
- Seasonal, including winter activities.
- Art and cultural programs.
- Teen and youth programming during the summer
- Continue to celebrate the community by participation in festivals, community functions and events

## GOAL 2: Provide parks and recreation facilities that are beautiful and high quality, that respect history, offer a variety of experiences, both passive and active, are well maintained and that are accessible to all residents of the community.

### Goal 2 Objectives

- Analyze and improve universal accessibility.
- Incorporate art and murals into park design.
- Encourage central entry areas for sitting and gathering in park design.
- Maintain and update park equipment and facilities as needed, such as playground equipment, ball fields, open space areas including natural landscaping.
- Implement a standardized park design for all City of Hazel Park Parks including signage, installation of trees, tree transplanting, improved landscaping, benches, bike racks, and waste receptacles.
- Support and encourage new developments to include areas for active and passive recreation

## **GOAL 3: Create a community of healthy residents by providing opportunities that promote and encourage active lifestyles and mobility.**

### **Goal 3 Objectives**

- Increase non-motorized transportation connections between parks, historical sites, community facilities and shopping districts that allow residents to cycle, walk and run.
- Develop and promote programming that encourages active lifestyles for all ages.
- Develop a wayfinding program for the trail / greenway network that directs users of the non-motorized paths to City parks and other destinations.

## **GOAL 4: Provide recreation programming and facility opportunities that meet the needs and interests of the entire community.**

### **Goal 4 Objectives**

- Create opportunities that go beyond the traditional team sports such as educational components, individual sporting pursuits, training/self-improvement courses.
- Provide additional environmental-oriented programs and use parks as outdoor classrooms and art theater.
- Coordinate with the Hazel Park Art Council regarding public art at parks. Coordinate location, lights to illuminate, sprinkler locations, etc.

## **GOAL 5: Coordinate and partner with other entities and residents to ensure the availability and opportunity for comprehensive, quality services and facilities.**

### **Goal 5 Objectives**

- Recruit civic and business organizations for assistance with park improvement projects.
- Partner for grants & outside funding and increase opportunities for donation, sponsorships and fundraising efforts.
- Foster, promote and encourage cooperative relationship with public and private entities.
- Promote a system for people to approach the City with ideas to collaborate for park improvements.
- Provide volunteer opportunities in program delivery and improvement projects.
- Establish “Adopt-A-Park” program to encourage collaboration with residents and neighborhood groups with maintaining and increasing participation at underutilized City parks.
- Review and update the Parks and Recreation Master Plan every five years to maintain a current assessment and ensure grant funding eligibility.

## **GOAL 6: Operate the parks and recreation department in an effective and efficient manner so as to maintain a high level of customer service.**

### **Goal 6 Objectives**

- Expand web-based marketing efforts to inform residents of programs and events.
- Update and maintain the city's website for improved access to the following information:
  - » All city-owned and operated parks and recreation facilities (with locations and programming).
  - » Recreation opportunities offered via the interlocal governmental agreement between Oak Park and Hazel Park.
- Continue to use existing community resources efficiently and demonstrate fiscal adaptability and responsibility.
- Review Parks and Recreation Master Plan annually to establish priorities and responsibilities with Parks and Recreation Board.
- Continue to build upon the Department's relationship with Hazel Park Junior Vikings to offer additional youth programming.

## **GOAL 7: Improve the quality and number of services, activities, and programs to meet the social, educational, health, recreational, and social service needs of the city's age groups, including the senior population.**

### **Goal 7 Objectives**

- Expand parks and recreation programming and activities to encourage older adults to stay active, healthy, and involved with other active members of the community.
- Continue to grow partnership between City and Ferndale/Hazel Park Seniors group.
- Host a diverse set of senior activities and programs at the Hazel Park Community Center to increase participation in municipal recreation, fitness, and wellness programs among older adults.
- Increase the level of programming which provides helpful information, lifelong learning, and enables individuals to acquire new skills that contribute to their continued independence.
- Reprogram many of the city's underutilized park facilities for senior and adult use by providing opportunities for both independent and guided exercise, increased accessibility, and ease of use.
- Develop programming that provides social opportunities for the city's adult population.

## **GOAL 8: Restore native and natural habitats to create sustainable development in the areas of conservation, re-naturalization, and implementation of natural landscapes and greenspaces throughout the city.**

### **Goal 8 Objectives**

- Habitat Creation - Restore native and natural habitats for the 5 B's (bats, birds, bees, butterflies, and bugs) throughout the community and teach residents and businesses how to incorporate these ideas onto their property. Include native plants in planting and landscaping plans. Consider Otis Avenue courts as a location for canopy/habitat restoration and the creation of a Scout-Kennedy greenway.
- Land Management - Find land management solutions to minimize flooding and erosion utilizing plants and other landscaping.
- Education - Create educational opportunities for residents through nature themed events.
- Training – Train Code Enforcement and other City staff on recognizing and understanding well-maintained native gardens.
- Community - Increase community involvement to foster an appreciation of nature and encourage a stronger sense of personal connection.
- Engage in additional tree planting to restore canopy, mitigate stormwater absorption, and provide shade; consider collaboration with Red Oaks and Re-leaf
- Pursue alternative stormwater management techniques in the parks

## 7. Implementation

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# Action Plan

The action plan discussed in the following section includes a five-year capital improvement plan, conceptual plans for three pocket parks in the southern portion of the City, a strategy for approaching two other mini parks in that area, designs for a wayfinding system, and information about a pending renovation of the building next to the Community Center. The five-year capital improvement plan carries forward some elements of the last five-year plan and adds new elements to address the City's new priorities.

The action plan outlines Hazel Park's approach to implementing the goals and objectives identified in the previous chapter. These strategies are intended to provide guidance for planning and budgeting purposes for the next five years. They suggest priorities generally, but are not intended to be set in stone or limit additional creative approaches. Generally, parks and recreation action strategies should consider the following when outlining a strategy to implement goals and objectives:

1. Are there immediate health, environmental, and safety concerns that need to be addressed?
2. What are opportunities that exist to partner with other groups towards a common goal?
3. Is there a person or group who can champion specific goals/objectives?
4. Are there multiple goals that can be achieved by implementing a project?
5. What projects affect the greatest number of people in the community and/or address the greatest need?
6. How can projects be broken down into phases for a multi-year approach?
7. What funding opportunities exist for implementation of certain goals?

**PLANNING ACTIONS (P)** reflect strategies aimed at identifying an approach, including cost estimates, to achieving certain goals and objectives. These are activities that can be undertaken at a variety of levels, including the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board, the Planning Commission and the City Council.

**MAINTENANCE ACTIONS (M)** address those issues identified in the plan as needing upgrades or attention to repair, safety or appearance. These activities will likely be addressed by the public works department, but may also include assistance by various community groups.

**ADMINISTRATIVE ACTIONS (A)** will pursue strategies that keep an inventory of recreation facilities, programs and events for the City. Strategies developed through planning actions will be implemented and/or coordinated through administrative efforts.

**FUNDING ACTIONS (F)** will actively pursue local, cooperative and grant funding approaches to implement the goals and objectives of the plan.

**CONSTRUCTION ACTIONS (C)** will take place once a plan has been finalized, funding has been obtained, permits have been acquired and the project is 'shovel ready'.

## OPENNESS TO OPPORTUNITY

Though the action plan includes many specific items, it cannot anticipate every possible opportunity to improve Hazel Park's recreational facilities and programming. For instance, the plan does not specifically identify a location for a skate park, but the Advisory Board is aware of some local interest in such a facility. If a partner emerged that could shepherd such a project (or a similar facility), the City could work with that partner.

## Small Park Upgrades

This plan takes a special look at several smaller parks on the City's historically underserved south side. Conceptual designs were developed for the three smallest of these parks, which the City conceptualizes as "pocket parks," or small parks serving areas where no larger facilities exist: the Hazel Park Art Park (aka Mayor Jan Parisi Art Garden), Sutar-Sutaruk-Meyer Foundation Park (aka Caledonia Park), and Albert Sylvester Park. It also offers strategies for the long-term development of Madge Park and Jessica Nagle-Wilson Memorial Park, which could be applied to other parks in the City.

### Madge Park and Jessica Nagle-Wilson Memorial Park

These two parks both have substantial area for small parks serving a highly local population. In both cases, the current recreation facilities are spread throughout the park, with no connecting pathways. Both have mature tree canopy and open lawn areas as well. As Hazel Park considers the redevelopment and upgrading of these parks in the future, thought should be given to grouping play equipment in one area of the park, with strong barrier-free pathway connections. Other areas of these parks could serve as small playing fields or picnic areas. Still others could be set aside for native plantings, additional tree canopy, and passive stormwater management systems such as bioswales and rain gardens. In other words, these parks can be split into zones with distinct purposes, each of which serves a different health or environmental function.

### Art Park, Sutar-Sutaruk-Meyer, and Albert Sylvester Parks

The following pages present conceptual layouts for these three parks, designed to be implemented over time as funds become available. These are followed by a pattern book with cost estimates for elements that could be added to these parks, as well as others in the system.

### Albert Sylvester Park


This park is the sole recreational facility serving the neighborhood at the City's southern end between John R Road and I-75. It was created on a vacant lot, and a second vacant lot next door, which is also city-owned, provides the potential for the park to expand in the future. For the moment, the conceptual design leaves this lot open and recommends removing the sign prohibiting ball playing so that the open space can be used as neighboring residents see fit. Otherwise, the design emphasizes incremental improvements to accessibility, a gradual replacement of outdated equipment, and the gradual addition of more things to do.

### Art Park

The Art Park is located along John R Road, and is accessed from the public sidewalk; it must be accessed on foot from somewhere nearby. The conceptual plan focuses on expanding the park's ability to showcase multiple artworks and drawing more users to it over time. Diverse seating options will increase the park's function as a place of contemplation in an otherwise busy area.


### Sutar-Sutaruk-Meyer Park

This park received substantial investment over the last five years, including new trees, landscaping, a picnic table, play equipment, public announcement board, and trash receptacle. The conceptual plan calls for continued progress, with an emphasis on additional places to gather and improved accessibility.



### Albert Sylvester Park



# Wayfinding

Hazel Park's recreation facilities are distributed throughout the City, and our survey results indicated that many residents are unaware the location of many of them. Some parks are meant for neighborhood use, but we can still improve their visibility, and connections to and from them by providing more direction. The wayfinding signage concept below provides two basic sign types: park entry signage to identify a given park, and a smaller informational sign. Cost estimates for these signs are included in the appendix.

## Entrance Identification Signs

Entrance identification signs are designed on a metal framework with a durable vinyl wrap. The frameworks and footings are the most significant capital cost, but the coverings are relatively inexpensive, and can be changed if the park system's branding changes in the future, or if damaged.

## Informational Signs


The smaller sign shown below can accommodate information, from a simple park name and arrow to be set out on a major road, to walking distances to major destinations set within the park itself. This low-cost option could offer a quick and relatively simple way to implement a wayfinding system while gathering funds for a more capital-intensive entryway sign system.

## Locating Wayfinding Signage

Entryway signage should be located at the most prominent point of entry to a given park. Informational Signage can be used in several ways:

- As park identification signage; if the cost of entryway signage delays its implementation, these signs can serve as a lower-cost interim measure
- Pointing park users to other nearby amenities, services, and facilities; signs in the parks can list nearby destinations, with travel times and/or distances
- Directing people to parks & recreation facilities, these directional signs could be placed along major routes of travel, increasing awareness of the City's parks and their locations. For instance, Kennedy Park has a parking lot accessed from Dequindre Road, but this is not a very visible access point. A small sign here identifying Kennedy Park would greatly increase awareness of the facility.

## Community Center - Pole Barn Renovation

Hazel Park's Community Center is located at 620 W. Woodward Heights Blvd and is a hub of recreational and social activity. It is adjacent to Green Acres Park. Next to the Community Center is a pole barn (pictured below) that has been underutilized for some time and is in need of improvement. To that end, the City has secured two grants to support the improvement of this structure so that it can be used as a venue for meetings and receptions, gallery space for local artists, and other community gathering needs. The space would also serve as a heating and cooling center for residents during power outages in times of extreme weather, supporting the City's climate resiliency goals. The City has secured \$505,000 in grant funding from HUD and \$575,000 from CMF/DNR Spark Grant CMF-G20243229 to bring the project to life. Plans are shown on the following three pages. The project narrative describes the project as follows:

"The plan for the renovation is an entire rehabilitation. The inside would be reconstructed from its current shell to provide room for a larger activity space, which would be facing the Woodward Heights Blvd, followed by smaller rooms that would be used as offices and or smaller activities rooms, facing the parking lot and ballfield area in the back. Taking the pole barn to a community meeting space by adding in walls, HVAC, heating, and cooling and more, we will be doing an entire reconstruction from the space that it once was to what it could be. We hope to add indoor bathrooms, as well as outdoor bathrooms for sports and special events use. Since a waterline connection already exists within this building, a hook-up should be no issue. These bathrooms will not only serve the guests that visit the public facility, but the residents that utilize the park features as well, such as the baseball field and our newly installed disc golf course. All areas of this new building will be fully compliant to ADA standards and take in any community ideas and recommendations for programming.

Further, our hope is to add garage-style doors in the front of the building to allow for natural light as needed and accessibility to the building. These doors can then be opened to allow for more air flow throughout the building, as well as better lighting. They can also be closed to allow for an aesthetically pleasing look to the building itself, enticing residents and visitors to the area to visit all the events going on. In front of the pole barn that faces Woodward Heights, our hope is to add a cement patio that would provide more seating space for residents during the warmer months, which would also provide an overflow area for meetings and events as well. Continuing with the project design, we would like to see a connecting hallway built between the Hazel Park Recreation Center and this new space. This would allow easier access between the two buildings without residents having to exit the buildings and walk outside in seasonal temperatures. Further, we will be adding in a kitchen area inside the building, both a mechanical and storage room, a coat area, and finally, a space for concessions."

















- We just moved here last year and have not really had to see what is available to us. I signed up for the city email but I'm not completely aware of what programs or offerings are available
- more group youth activities. Life Training- outward bound type workshops
- Our recreation department is really lacking programming. Every community around us puts a lot more effort into programming. Ours is embarrassing.
- With a potential recession coming, the city should be careful about investing in facilities that require a lot of ongoing maintenance and repair or that may need to be revamped or rebuilt in just a few years. Outdoor spaces that are simple to maintain are probably a better investment.
- Well-maintained parks with great curb appeal (no weeds, dog poop, newer equipment, and higher-end attractions; read tennis, pickle ball. Better trees that flower and or fruit.
- I feel like we have cool things in HP that a lot of residents aren't aware of. But having more spaces and a walking path would be amazing. And having an affordable workout center would also be great
- Why is everything at Green acres? the southeast corner of HP is basically abandoned . . . why not revitalize the pocket parks? do not need fancy expensive playground equipment but you need a PLAN. Where is the overall plan?
- Jessica Nagel has had a giant hole in the ground with orange barrels around it for years! I am about to go over there and fill it and remove the barrels myself soon. The fact that there is no parking allowed in front of parks is ridiculous , it should not be where people attending parks are forced to take up street parking in front of residents homes when most already only have a driveway big enough for 1 car. The bathrooms at green acres are RARELY open and I believe that is the only park with bathrooms. Not having restrooms or water available makes it impossible to spend time at our parks ESPECIALLY with children.
- The Memorial Day Fair is the most important thing to us in Green Acres park. The fact they now put up a huge fence makes it less fun for the community. The cost also is very high for less rides. We saw police giving a mom a hard time for having so many kids yet let the white people in no problem. I've seen many racist actions by police at the entrance. Making the fair like a prison is not fun for the community and makes the city look bad when other cities have no gates for their fairs and festivals.
