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#### **Our Mission and Values**


The Mission of the Hinsdale Police Department is to provide the community with impartial law enforcement, community oriented services and police protection, while maintaining the highest ethical and professional standards.

Officer Timothy Lennox retired in May after serving the Department for just over 26 years. Lennox served as an Accident Reconstructionist and Patrol Officer.


#### Remembrance

On June 3, 2015 the Hinsdale Police Department lost one of its own when retired Police Chief James Eccardt passed away. Chief Eccardt retired from the Hinsdale Police Department in 2003, after serving for 31 years, serving as Chief of Police in his final two years.

Eccardt was a Vietnam veteran as a U.S Marine and a Purple Heart recipbefore joining Hinsdale Police Department in 1972. After spending his first three years as a patrol officer, Eccardt became a detective in 1975, was named supervisor of the investigation/youth division from 1976 to 1983 and was a sergeant from 1983 to 1990. In 1990, he became deputy chief, attended the FBI Na-

tional Academy, and was appointed Chief in 2001.

Known as a fair and honest leader that loved this noble profession, Eccardt was a great friend and mentor who will truly be missed.

vice Excellence Award. Kris received multiple nominations for this award due to his outstanding service to patrons and his dedication to the department.



### Life Saving Award



The actions taken by Officer Louis Hayes, Jr. on May 26 resulted in the stabilization of a critically injured worker. Officer Hayes provided trauma intervention prior to paramedics arriving on scene to transport the injured man to the hospital. Without Officer Hayes's interventions, the injured worker may not have survived his injuries.



On September 9, Officer Kevin Berland responded to a report of a motor vehicle crash that occurred on Route 83. Without hesitation, Officer Berland began administering first aid to the driver, placing a tourniquet around the victim's arm to minimize blood loss. The care of the driver was then turned over to responding paramedics from the

Clarendon Hills Fire Department and the driver was transported to Good Samaritan for further treatment. Without Officer Berland's interventions, the driver may not have survived his injuries.

### **Department Training**

The Hinsdale Police Department is committed to providing current, thorough training to all staff members. For 2015, staff members spent over 1,800 hours in conferences training, seminars. Additionally, sworn personnel are required to attend in-service training sessions on an annual basis. These training sessions provide officers with supplemental training on advances, changes and improvements in the law enforcement community, with requisite training prior to assignment to special

### **Traffic Safety Challenge / Accreditation**

In 2015, the Hinsdale Police Department took second place in the Illinois Chiefs of Police Association Traffic Safety Challenge. The Traffic Safety Challenge recognizes Police Department's efforts toward promoting traffic and pedestrian safety through innova-

tive educational programs and sustained enforcement efforts.

A special thanks to Sergeant Steve Cogger, Detective Kevin Susmarski and volunteer Cindy Go for their efforts on putting together a winning entry. In 2014, the Hinsdale Police Department received a "Gold Standard Assessment" on its sixth reaccreditation for the Commission on Accreditation for Law Enforcement Agencies (CALEA). The purpose of the CALEA accreditation process is to improve the

delivery of public safety services, primarily by maintaining a body of standards developed by public safety practitioners covering a wide range of up-to-date public safety initiatives, establishing and administering an accreditation process, and recognizing professional excellence.

### **Fitness Challenge**

On December 12, Hinsdale Police Department staff members hosted and participated in the 2015 Fitness Challenge. The elements of the Fitness Challenge include: a 1.5 mile run, 300 meter sprint, bench press, push up test, sit up test and vertical jump. All staff mem-

bers who attended, successfully completed the challenge requirements and were awarded t-shirts and service bars to display on their uniforms.

#### **Investigations**

The Criminal Investigative Division is primarily responsible for conducting follow-up investigations of all criminal incidents reported in Hinsdale. In 2015, there were 364 cases assigned to the division. The most frequent incident classifications were Theft (84 cases), Fraud/ID Theft (83 cases), Vandalism/Trespass (42 cases), and Burglaries (22 cases).

The division is also responsible for the proper

storage and security of property and evidence recovered by officers, background investigations, undercover activities and surveillance.

Members of the division also serve on other task forces, act as liaison officers, and retain memberships in professional organizations, such as the Illinois Juvenile Officers Association, Illinois Internet Child Exploitation Task Force, Certified Lead Homicide Investigator, the International Association of Financial Crimes Investigators, and the West Suburban Detectives Association.




#### **Juvenile Crime**

Juvenile crimes increased in the last year from 114 incidents in 2014, to 175 incidents in 2015. The most frequent incident classifications were Alcohol, Drugs/Narcotics, and Curfew. In many incidents, juvenile offenders are referred to the Hinsdale Police Department Juvenile Officer, and placed in diversionary programs including Peer Jury and Station Adjustment.

In 2015, there were 71 juvenile offenders placed in diversionary programs.

Peer Jury is the most frequently used program which includes community service, the Alive at 25 Class, meeting with the Juvenile Officer and appearing before a Jury of Peers organized thru Downers Grove Township. Juvenile Officer Michael Coughlin is currently the president of the DuPage Juvenile Officers Association, and 1st Vice President of the Illinois Juvenile Officers Association.





Pictured right: Peer Jury Diversionary Program held in Downers Grove Township

### **Policing**

The Hinsdale Police Department is a service-oriented Police Department. In 2015, Hinsdale Officers responded to 13,671 calls for service. Among those calls, Fire Department/Ambulance Assists, Alarm Activations and Motorist Assists were the most common.

Calls for service were lower in comparison to last year, and year to year crime has had minimal movement. For 2015, we saw slight increases in assault/batteries, residential burglaries and vandalism/trespassing offenses. There was a significant increase in drug offenses and a minor decrease in burglary to motor vehicles, thefts, disorderly conduct and domestic crimes.














#### **Traffic Stops**

The Hinsdale Police Department has developed a policy which reaffirms the department's commitment to unbiased policing in all encounters between police officers and citizens, and reinforces procedures that serve to maintain public confidence and trust. Written policy, operational practices, training and supervision are part of a multifaceted strategy to provide services in a fair and equitable fashion that reflect positive policing values.

The Hinsdale Police Department conducted 5,144 traffic stops in 2015.

There were 54 DUI's in 2015. The average breath test results were .16, which is twice the legal limit.

#### **Special Enforcement**

Traffic enforcement is an essential job function of patrol officers in the department. Special enforcement periods and campaigns have been designed to address issues such as stop sign violations, DUI's, seat belt violations and violations at railroad crossings. The table to the right depicts the number of citations issued for the most frequently violated offenses.

The "Stop means Stop" initiative has been in effect since June of 2015 to address the issue of drivers disregarding stop signs in residential areas. Between June and December, over 500 warnings and over 400 citations were issued.

### Narcan Program

The Hinsdale Police Department is one of 33 departments in Illinois that carries Narcan. Also known as Naloxone, Narcan is used to counter or reverse the effects of a heroin overdose.

Since 2010, 183 national public health pro-

grams and 53,000 individuals have been trained to use Narcan resulting in more than 10,000 cases of successful overdose reversals. Narcan can be administered via a nasal inhalant or by an intramuscular injection.

#### **DARE/VEGA**

Drug Abuse The Resistance Education (D.A.R.E.) program continues to be the primary drug prevention program offered by the Hinsdale Police Department. D.A.R.E. is a collaborative effort by certified officers, educators, students, parents, and the community to offer an educational program in the classroom to prevent drug abuse and violence among youth. Officer Michael Coughlin teaches





D.A.R.E in all 5th grade classrooms in the public elementary schools and in 6th grade classrooms in the parochial schools, as well as the middle school level. Officer Coughlin also teaches Violence Education Gang Awareness (VEGA) which is integrated into D.A.R.E. as a program teaching conflict resolution, avoiding gang activities and problem-solving without violence.

#### Alive at 25

Alive at 25 is a young-driver intervention program that targets drivers between 15 and 24 years old, the age group identified as most likely to be involved in fatal collisions. This highly interactive program teaches young drivers how to take control of situations by taking responsibility for their own driving behavior. It teaches students that they are more

likely to be hurt in a vehicle crash because of their inexperience, other distractions, and peer pressure. Speeding, alcohol and "party drugs" are topics covered because they increase the risk of injury or death.





#### Situational Awareness/Self Defense Class

This class is designed for female high-school and college students to teach situational awareness skills in the classroom setting and to allow them to practice self-defense techniques on the trainers. Participants are placed in controlled situations where these techniques are practiced. Students are

taught to be aware and alert in their surroundings, and shown how to be prepared for any situation so that they can prevent becoming a victim. The students are encouraged to practice and rehearse selfdefense techniques mentally, verbally, and physically, after completing the class.



#### Safety Village

In June of 2015, Officers Michael Coughlin and Mark Keller assisted with the 24th year of Safety Village. The program teaches children to practice safety by participating in artificial sce-This practice will narios. give children the knowledge they need to act in real life emergency situations. There were more than 50 safety tips taught to 300 children between 5 and 6 years old. Officers, Firefighters, and

high school volunteers help with Safety Village during each summer session. This program has taught more than 8,000 children the basic rules of safety over the last 24 years.



#### **Citizen Police Academy**

From November, 2015 to February, 2016, the Eleventh Citizen Police Academy was held. Its participants were instructed in areas of law, crime prevention, patrol, investigations, D.A.R.E., juvenile crime, traffic safety, recruitment, S.W.A.T., K-9, and firearms training. The class held their graduation at Katherine Legge Memorial Park.





#### YANA & Special Needs Program

The You Are Not Alone (YANA) Program is a free service to senior citizens who live alone and would benefit from someone checking on them on a regular basis. Independent, single residents are called weekly for updates on important information about the community and to have their well-being checked. The program does not provide any medical assistance, service, or advice. Please stop in during lobby hours or call the Hinsdale Police Department if you are interested in joining. The Special Needs program is designed to assist residents who may be at greater risk of becoming confused, disoriented, lost, or missing. It gives attention to family members who may have physical or mental challenges and expedites appro-

priate emergency responses should that person need assistance at their home. Please stop in during lobby hours or call the Hinsdale Police Department if you are interested in joining.

#### **Block Watch / Pace Car Program**

Block Watch enlists the help of residents who have home outdoor video cameras to solve neighborhood crimes. Investigators have found when canvassing a neighborhood after a crime has occurred that a home video system may have captured a picture of a suspect and/or a vehicle. This can be a valuable lead that can help in an investigation and may

lead to an arrest

The Block Watch program is voluntary and asks residents who have outdoor surveillance cameras to register their cameras with the Police Department. While still in its early stages, the program has already helped with the identification of suspects.

To combat speeding in residential roadways, the Pace Car Program relies upon the support and participation of the community as individuals pledge to drive courteously and obey the speed limit on local roadways. Residents who agree with the pledge received a free bumper sticker that designates the driver as a Pace Car Program


participant. The sticker encourages other drivers to drive the speed limit as they follow the pace car.

### **Community Electronic Notification Program**

The Community Alert Network enables the Hinsdale Police Department to use e-mail, text, and/or voice call to send out pertinent community information, including crime or criminal information, street closings, utility notices, missing persons flyers or other emergency information that may affect community members or the Village of Hinsdale. These informative alerts are meant to educate the public, reduce fear, increase the chance that criminals will be caught, and help prevent future occurrences of crime.

### **Crossing Guard Program**

The Hinsdale Police Department trains and oversees school crossing guards at 12 intersections that students use to walk to and from the District 181 elementary schools and St. Isaac Jogues Catholic School. The crossing guards are invaluable for the protection of students' safety during their walks to and from school. Rain or shine, the crossing guards are there to help students get to school and home safely.





### Walk to School Day

In the USA and Canada, International Walk to School Day encourages walking and bicycling to school. Over time, this event has developed into a movement for year-round safe routes to school and a celebration - with record breaking participation - each October. The Hinsdale Police Department participates in the celebration of walking to school by greeting students and parents on their way to the local schools.





### **Open House**

Among the wide variety of activities at the event were demonstrations by a K-9 handler and S.W.A.T. team, station tours, a bounce house, and a fingerprint lifting station. The Hinsdale Jr. Woman's Club volunteered by serving lunch including hot dogs and popcorn.









### Rotary Club of Hinsdale/HCS Family Services

Since 1959 the Rotary Club of Hinsdale has been committed to supporting and serving the community. Deputy Chief Kevin Simpson, has been a member of the Rotary Club of Hinsdale for three years and is a Board member of HCS Family Services. HCS works closely in conjunction with the Rotary of Hinsdale to strengthen the community by giving individuals and families support services and access to local

resources. Hinsdale Police, Firefighters and Rotary members actively participate in the Food Pantry and Mobile Food Pantry that offers food to residents of Southeast DuPage County who are in need.

#### Oak Street Bridge

At over 100 years old and limiting the volume of freight being carried on the BNSF railroad line, the plan for the replacement of the bridge began in 2010. The Oak Street Bridge Replacement Project went underway in September of 2013 with the Environmental Assessment, Preliminary Engineering, Design Engineering and

Land Acquisition. Construction on the bridge began in May 2015 and was completed in December of 2015. The project was 100% grant funded
