#### **CALL TO ORDER**

Mr. Snyder introduced himself to the Commission and described his role in the Village.

#### **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

#### A. November 16, 2022

Commissioner Lavelli made a motion to accept the minutes of the November 16 meeting as presented. Commissioner Burgess seconded the motion. Upon the call of the roll the vote was:

#### PUBLIC COMMENT

None.

#### **OLD BUSINESS**

#### A. Rolling Calendar Review

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the rolling calendar. The Village is continuing to offer its signature events in 2023 and will be enhancing them for the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. The next upcoming event for the Village is the Fourth of July Parade. Ms. Field and Ms. Wagner spoke about the upcoming events for the Chamber of Commerce, including the Fine Arts Festival, the Farmer's Market, and Uniquely Thursdays. 2023 is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Farmer's Market and the 21<sup>st</sup> season for Uniquely Thursdays. The Chamber has revised and updated their sponsorship packages for Uniquely Thursdays.

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the Fourth of July parade. The route will be returning to its original route. The Village is encouraging participants and businesses to consider their own history in Hinsdale and incorporate it into their entries. The Village will be adding additional paid acts to enhance the parade for the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Ms. South provided an update on the parade entries received at this point in time. The Commission requested that staff reach out to the local businesses to see if they would like to participate in the parade or the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrations. Ms. Peterson discussed different ways in which the business community could participate. The Commission discussed potential Grand Marshals for the parade.

#### B. Shop local Campaign Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the campaign. Staff has been increasing the Village's social media presence to keep shopping local top of mind. The Commission discussed ways to

increase the business presence in the campaign, such as including business logos on light pole banners and other promotional materials.

#### C. Holidays in Hinsdale Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the holiday events and marketing efforts. Holidays in Hinsdale drew approximately 1,000 participants over the two weekends. Winter Wonderland drew over 500 participants to KLM and was sold out. Staff also sent out 250 personalized letters from Santa to residents. The Christmas Walk was extremely popular with record crowds coming out over the past several years.

#### D. Restaurant Week Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on Restaurant Week. This year, the event was held April 14<sup>th</sup>-23<sup>rd</sup>. Staff featured the architecture of different restaurant buildings and history-inspired food and drink specials in social media updates. Ms. Peterson provided social media metrics for the Commission. The Commission provided positive feedback on the marketing materials and event overall.

#### E. Hinsdale Business Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the new businesses coming to town and current first floor occupancy rates in the downtown. The Commission and staff discussed the retail vacancies in the downtown as well as new businesses that are coming into Hinsdale. The Village is currently at a low retail and office vacancy rate overall.

#### F. Sales Tax Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the Village's sales tax revenue. The Village is showing healthy sales tax revenues.

#### G. Downtown Pedestrian Walkway Update

Ms. Peterson provided an update on the safety and aesthetic enhancements planned for the parking deck, including a brick pedestrian walkway and new landscaping, lighting, and wayfinding signage. The next step will be to go out to bid on the project. Staff plans to complete this work in 2023, contingent on bid pricing.

#### H. Burlington Park and Washington Street Display Box

Staff is looking to update the information in the black display boxes in Burlington Park and on Washington Street. This project is scheduled to be completed in 2023.

#### I. Outdoor Dining Update

Outdoor dining has begun for the season. Ms. Salmon provided an update on the program. Residents and businesses were surveyed regarding the program. Resident feedback was great, with many residents participating and offering positive feedback. There were some concerns about parking, maintenance, and traffic, but the community is largely in favor of the program. The Village Engineer is looking at creating permanent solutions for outdoor dining. The Commission and staff discussed parking in the downtown.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

#### A. Gift Card Program

Only 41 gift cards were sold last year, leading the program to operate at a loss despite aggressive marketing. Ms. Peterson discussed the benefits, challenges and limitations of the program. Staff is recommending that the Village evaluate the gift card program and would like input from the Commission. The consensus of the Commission is to end the program and not consider alternatives at this time.

#### **OTHER BUSINESS / DISCUSSION ITEMS**

#### A. Update on Hinsdale 150<sup>th</sup> Events

Ms. Peterson provided information on the 150<sup>th</sup> events. Staff is keeping all signature events and is looking to enhance them wherever possible. The 150<sup>th</sup> ceremony was held at the Village Board meeting on May 2<sup>nd</sup>, which was well-attended. The Village will be hosting a light show event using the south side of the Memorial Building on August 17<sup>th</sup>, following Uniquely Thursdays. Staff looked at incorporating fireworks, but it was not feasible due to a number of reasons. The light show will be a unique event that will utilize the architecture of the building to project the lightshow. There will be a soundtrack for the show.

In late summer, staff is planning a kick-off for the reconstruction of the Memorial Building plaza to celebrate the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. Construction is proposed to begin around Labor Day. The plaza would be dedicated around the time of the Christmas Walk. There will be donation opportunities for the costs of the plaza and possibly a historic roof rail for the top of the Memorial Building. Staff is also planning to continue to meet with local organizations to incorporate their history into the 150<sup>th</sup> events.

#### **B. 2023 Meeting Schedule**

The next meetings are scheduled for August 16 and November 15.

#### **ADJOURNMENT**

There being no further business before the Commission, Commissioner Lavelli made a motion to adjourn the meeting at 10:03am. Commissioner Thangamani seconded the motion. Upon the call of the roll, the vote was:




### Sales Tax Revenue

Updating the Burlington Park and Washington Street Display Boxes is included in the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). This project is expected to be deferred to 2024. This project includes repairing and painting the display boxes at both Burlington Park and on Washington Street.

The retail directory insert at Washington Street is in the process of being updated and will be displayed this fall.

#### **Burlington Park**

The two display boxes in Burlington Park consist of three separate display spaces with the ability to display information on one side. The Burlington Park display box is used primarily for promotion of events/activities.

#### **Washington Street**

The display box on Washington Street has the ability to display information on both sides. The Washington Street display box is used primarily for displaying the retail directory.



## HISTORY OF THE MEMORIAL BUILDING

A patriotic ceremony was held on July 4, 1928 to dedicate the newly completed Hinsdale Memorial Building. The Memorial Building was built to honor the men from Hinsdale who served in the wars, a tribute particularly to those who went out from the Village and did not return. Mr. Philip R. Clarke, Chairman of the Hinsdale Memorial Building Committee, appreciated that the project must be community-wide in order to truly express the gratitude and civic pride of the Village. It was unanimously agreed that the memorial should take the form of a functional building, rather than an unserviceable monument. To erect a building to serve, and honor those who served, impressed the Committee as an utmost tribute to the memory of their heroes. In April 1927, the plans of architect Edwin H. Clark for the new Hinsdale Memorial Building at 19 E. Chicago Avenue, were accepted at a Village meeting, and a drive began to raise the \$150,000 needed to pay for the project. Ninety percent of the funds needed were raised by the end of the first week.

Architect George Maher noted the building's hilltop location as Hinsdale's "natural front yard."

The design of the building is reportedly based on Philadelphia's Independence Hall. The Memorial Building originally housed a number of rooms for local organizations, the Village offices, and the Public Library. Also, the foyer at the heart of the building, "the shrine of memory," contains a commemorative work by noted sculptor Oskar Hansen. The Memorial Building has always stood, both literally and figuratively, at the heart of Hinsdale.

The brick, 2 ½ story structure is a fine example of Colonial Revival design. A classic cornice above the second story windows on the original building is decorated with modillions and moldings. Four columns with ornate capitals support a central pedimented pavilion on the south (primary) elevation. Bedford stone sills and lintels define the windows and form two belt-courses around the building. Large, multi-paned windows in the central pavilion of the north elevation have round-arched tops. The building also has a tall Colonial Revival cupola that contains a clock tower.

The Village Board designated the property as a Historic Landmark on February 6, 2001 by adopting Ordinance O2001-6, making the Memorial Building the first local Historic Landmark in the Village.

## Memorial Building honors past, present

Community drive in 1927 raises funds to build structure that serves as living tribute

The stately brick structure known as the Memorial Building sits atop a hill in the heart of Hinsdale. Built nearly a century ago as a standing, living tribute to those who fought in the first World War, it serves as a hub for the workings of the entire village.

After a call to action from the editor of The Doings newspaper in 1927, the community quickly came together to form the Hinsdale Memorial Building Committee. The committee of Hinsdaleans designed the plan for the building and went door to door in an effort to raise the \$150,000 needed to see the plan to fruition.

In less than a week, the goal was nearly met, and as the story goes, donations were obtained from all but two Hinsdale residents. In the end, Hinsdaleans contributed \$171,000, resulting in the building that today serves as Hinsdale's Village Hall and houses the Hinsdale Public Library, HCS Family Services and the American Legion.

The building was dedicated on Independence Day, 1928. Its rotunda, whose official name is "The Shrine of Memory," features a marble sculpture titled "The Victory of Hinsdale" and a plaque listing the names of those from the village who died in the military service of the country.

As promised in the original village proclamation accepting the gift of the Memorial Building from the people of Hinsdale, the building offers a permanent home, free from rent, to the American Legion and HCS Family Services, known in 1927 as the Hinsdale Nursing and Relief Association. While the proclamation makes the same promise to the American Legion Auxiliary and the Girl and Boy Scouts, those organizations no longer occupy space in the Memorial Building, said Bethany Salmon, village planner and Hinsdale Historic Preservation Commission liaison.

Like Hinsdale itself, the

building has grown over the years. Since its completion in 1928, the Memorial Building has undergone several additions and renovations. According to the village website, the east wing was constructed in 1969, and the west wing in 1974. The northwest addition, housing the library, was built in 1989.

Molly Castor, former marketing and outreach manager at the library, said the library had several homes throughout the village before moving to the Memorial Building in 1929, where it has remained for 94 years. The library now occupies 30,000 square feet of space on the building's west side.

"We love being the building on top of the hill," Castor said.

The building's east side serves as the hub for the workings of the village. It is home to village administrators along with the parks and recreation, finance, community development, engineering and information technology departments.

Meetings of the village board, plan commission and other governmental bodies are

held in Memorial Hall on the building's first floor.

Salmon has worked in the building for more than two years. She said the Memorial Building is a busy place, and despite the option to pay bills by mail or online, Salmon said many residents choose to visit the village offices to settle their water bill, obtain a building permit or buy a vehicle sticker.

"There's still significant pride in this building," Salmon said.

The building's walkability to downtown and proximity to the library encourages visitors and allow employees like herself to easily enjoy a visit to the weekly farmer's market or Burlington Park.

Salmon said that through its many changes and additions, great care has been taken to retain architect Edwin H. Clarke's original vision for the building, which was declared a local historic landmark in 2001 by the Hinsdale Historic Preservation Committee.

there are details within its walls that are not often seen.

The upstairs area known as the "Scout room" is now used by HCS Family Services, but its walls still boast murals that beckon back to the room's original purpose, Salmon said.

Another little-known detail can be found on the bell inside the building's bell tower. It is inscribed with a dedication to the village's war heroes, dated July 4, 1929. Salmon said getting those bells ringing again is on the wish list of more than a few Hinsdale residents.

Just as the citizens of Hinsdale came together to build the original building, village leaders of today have announced Hinsdale's 150 Memorial Building Historic Plaza and Roof Railing Campaign. This fundraising effort will result in restoration of the building's original roof railing and a renewed patio area to the south of the building, commonly seen as the front of the building. The patio area will continue to welcome library patrons in search of a relaxing spot to enjoy a book, and it will serve



as a spot for planned events and community gatherings.








PROPOSED CONCEPT PLAN - SUBJECT TO FUNDING






## Parks and Recreation Fall/Winter brochure registration went live August 7<sup>th</sup>
