OTHER BUSINESS/DISCUSSION ITEMS

A. Burns Playground

Mr. Hayes presented the request. Currently, the playground at Burns Field is the oldest playground in the Village and is next to be replaced. The Village has budgeted \$180,000 to replace this playground. All three playground designs are ADA compliant, although one design does feature more ADA accessible elements. This project would begin at the end of summer when the playground is less heavily used. Because staff is working through the OMNIA Public Sector state purchasing agreement, major changes to the playground equipment cannot be made, although some pieces can be altered. Christine Gebauer, 629 S Monroe St in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would like to see more spinning and sensory elements incorporated into the playground designs, as well as keeping the sand area and fencing around the playground

Izabela Turba, 723 N Adams St in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would like to see more ninja-style obstacles added to a future playground. Morgan Howe, 317 N Garfield St in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would like to see the sand elements preserved as well as the fence and would like elements for different ages combined.

Timothy Rooney, 609 N Grant St in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. He would like to see additional toddler swings, a poured in place surface, and a sand area.

Liz Pedota, 415 Warren Terrace in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would also like to see fencing, a poured in place surface, and additional swings.

Rosemary Rojas, 552 N Garfield Ave in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would like to see a poured in place surface, additional swings, fencing, more sensory elements, and additional elements added to the toddler area.

Sarah Tims, 111 N Adams St in Hinsdale provided feedback on the proposed designs. She would like to see a higher, straighter slide and prefers a taller playground structure.

Overall, the members of the public were in favor of brighter colors for the new playground equipment. Mr. Hayes and members of staff will work with the playground company to put together an updated design incorporating the feedback from the public and will bring it to the May meeting.

Recreation Supervisor

Todd Linder's first day with the Parks and Recreation Department was August 28th. Todd is replacing Hilary Poshek who resigned her position in July to begin a new career outside of the recreation field. Todd has a vast amount of knowledge in aquatics, events, and programming from working at the Bensenville Parks District.

Upcoming Brochure & Activities

The fall/winter brochure was posted on July 31st. Registration for residents and non-residents began on August 7th. This season, the Department is offering 287 recreation programs, including 30 new programs. New programs include some cooperative adult and senior programs to ensure equitable programming opportunities across all age groups. Our Breakfast with Santa and Lunch with Santa events are already sold out and have waitlists.

The winter/spring brochure is scheduled to be posted on November 27th and registration begins December 4th. In the Athletics portion for the winter/spring brochure one of the classes we are increasing is Ultimate Ninja (formerly Windy City Ninja). We have grown our class offerings now to include adult and early childhood Ninja classes.

Summer Special Events

This summer, staff offered our regular annual special events, including Lunch on the Lawn and Movies in the Park. This summer's Movies in the Park were Encanto at Robbins Park in June, The Santa Clause at the Pool in July, and Despicable Me at Robbins Park in July. Lunch on the Lawn acts this summer were Jeanie B! and the Jelly Beans, Miss Jamie's Farm, and Magic of Gary Kantor. Unplug and Play was scheduled to be held in July at Burlington Park, but was cancelled due to inclement weather.



The 2023 Fourth of July Parade and Festival was one of our largest yet, with 80 different entries participating. Staff booked additional acts to celebrate the Village's 150th Anniversary, including the Jesse White Tumblers and the Oscar Meyer Frankmobile. These entries were well received by the community and added to the celebratory nature of the parade and the sesquicentennial celebrations. Staff also added some different carnival games and inflatables to the Festival, which were well received as well.

Upcoming Fall Special Events

The Hinsdale Family Fall Festival is scheduled for Saturday, October 14th in Burlington Park. This event will be held in partnership with The Community House, The Hinsdale Chamber of Commerce, The Hinsdalean, and the Hinsdale Public Library. The new location will bring Fall Fest in closer proximity to the Police and Fire Open House. This event will include free pumpkins for the first 500 attendees, inflatables, a costume contest, pictures with The Hinsdalean, giveaways, food vendors, and trick or treating in the downtown business district. Our premier sponsor is Paul Mancini with @properties. We also currently have 4 food vendors and 6 event sponsors. Chicago Tent has agreed to sponsor our event bags that we will hand out to the kids.

Holiday events will include Breakfast and Pizza with Santa on Saturday, December 2nd at The Lodge and Winter Wonderland on Sunday, December 3rd at KLM Park. Staff also plans to offer the popular Letters from Santa program again this year and will accept letters December 1st through December 8th.

The Fall T-Ball

T-Ball registration closed on Friday, August 11th with 108 participants enrolled in the program. There are total of 10 teams for the Fall season. For reference, the Spring of 2023 league saw 97 participants for 10 teams and Fall of 2022 also saw 10 teams with 115 participants registered. Salt Creek Ballet has provided a sponsorship of \$800.00 for the league as well. The Fall T-Ball League season runs on Saturday mornings at 9 a.m. or 10 a.m. at various Hinsdale parks. The first two weeks are practices, followed by four weeks of games – for a total of six weeks. The program is slated to begin on Saturday, September 9, and is scheduled to conclude on Saturday, October 14 (weather permitting).



Hinsdale Community Pool

The 2023 season officially ended on Labor Day. Staff will be starting to winterize the facility over the next several weeks. Staff received compliments on the condition of the facility We will be conducting a municipal survey that is sent out to 182 Illinois Aquatic facilities regarding pool operations. The survey covers wages, staffing levels, staff incentives and also includes questions regarding pool operations. Several operational adjustments were made this year to enhance safety. Once we close out the 2023 operating budget, staff will present a formal aquatic operational report and financial report from Assistant Village Manager / Director of Finance, Carrie Dittman.

KLM Lodge August Update

In August, KLM Lodge hosted 4 weddings, a celebration of life event, a memorial for a veteran officer, a family reunion and a law enforcement training camp. School District 102 spent the day at The Lodge for their staff team building to prepare for back to school. KLM also hosted the annual Tommy's Camp, a multi-day bereavement camp for children who suffered the loss of a loved one.

Staff continues to work towards renting the facility on any remaining open days in our 2023 calendar with targeted postings on social media for corporate meetings, memorials and special events.



KLM Lodge September Update

In September, KLM Lodge hosted 7 weddings, 2 celebration of life events, a police forum hosted by IRMA and a fundraising event. 



HISTORY OF THE MEMORIAL BUILDING

A patriotic ceremony was held on July 4, 1928 to dedicate the newly completed Hinsdale Memorial Building. The Memorial Building was built to honor the men from Hinsdale who served in the wars, a tribute particularly to those who went out from the Village and did not return. Mr. Philip R. Clarke, Chairman of the Hinsdale Memorial Building Committee, appreciated that the project must be community-wide in order to truly express the gratitude and civic pride of the Village. It was unanimously agreed that the memorial should take the form of a functional building, rather than an unserviceable monument. To erect a building to serve, and honor those who served, impressed the Committee as an utmost tribute to the memory of their heroes. In April 1927, the plans of architect Edwin H. Clark for the new Hinsdale Memorial Building at 19 E. Chicago Avenue, were accepted at a Village meeting, and a drive began to raise the \$150,000 needed to pay for the project. Ninety percent of the funds needed were raised by the end of the first week.

Architect George Maher noted the building's hilltop location as Hinsdale's "natural front yard."

The design of the building is reportedly based on Philadelphia's Independence Hall. The Memorial Building originally housed a number of rooms for local organizations, the Village offices, and the Public Library. Also, the foyer at the heart of the building, "the shrine of memory," contains a commemorative work by noted sculptor Oskar Hansen. The Memorial Building has always stood, both literally and figuratively, at the heart of Hinsdale.

The brick, 2 ½ story structure is a fine example of Colonial Revival design. A classic cornice above the second story windows on the original building is decorated with modillions and moldings. Four columns with ornate capitals support a central pedimented pavilion on the south (primary) elevation. Bedford stone sills and lintels define the windows and form two belt-courses around the building. Large, multi-paned windows in the central pavilion of the north elevation have round-arched tops. The building also has a tall Colonial Revival cupola that contains a clock tower.

The Village Board designated the property as a Historic Landmark on February 6, 2001 by adopting Ordinance O2001-6, making the Memorial Building the first local Historic Landmark in the Village.

Memorial Building honors past, present

Community drive in 1927 raises funds to build structure that serves as living tribute

The stately brick structure known as the Memorial Building sits atop a hill in the heart of Hinsdale. Built nearly a century ago as a standing, living tribute to those who fought in the first World War, it serves as a hub for the workings of the entire village.


After a call to action from the editor of The Doings newspaper in 1927, the community quickly came together to form the Hinsdale Memorial Building Committee. The committee of Hinsdaleans designed the plan for the building and went door to door in an effort to raise the \$150,000 needed to see the plan to fruition.

In less than a week, the goal was nearly met, and as the story goes, donations were obtained from all but two Hinsdale residents. In the end, Hinsdaleans contributed \$171,000, resulting in the building that today serves as Hinsdale's Village Hall and houses the Hinsdale Public Library, HCS Family Services and the American Legion.

The building was dedicated on Independence Day, 1928. Its rotunda, whose official name is "The Shrine of Memory," features a marble sculpture titled "The Victory of Hinsdale" and a plaque listing the names of those from the village who died in the military service of the country.

As promised in the original village proclamation accepting the gift of the Memorial Building from the people of Hinsdale, the building offers a permanent home, free from rent, to the American Legion and HCS Family Services, known in 1927 as the Hinsdale Nursing and Relief Association. While the proclamation makes the same promise to the American Legion Auxiliary and the Girl and Boy Scouts, those organizations no longer occupy space in the Memorial Building, said Bethany Salmon, village planner and Hinsdale Historic Preservation Commission liaison.

Like Hinsdale itself, the

building has grown over the years. Since its completion in 1928, the Memorial Building has undergone several additions and renovations. According to the village website, the east wing was constructed in 1969, and the west wing in 1974. The northwest addition, housing the library, was built in 1989.

Molly Castor, former marketing and outreach manager at the library, said the library had several homes throughout the village before moving to the Memorial Building in 1929, where it has remained for 94 years. The library now occupies 30,000 square feet of space on the building's west side

"We love being the building on top of the hill," Castor

The building's east side serves as the hub for the workings of the village. It is home to village administrators along with the parks and recreation, finance, community development, engineering and information technology departments. Meetings of the village board, plan commission and other governmental bodies are

held in Memorial Hall on the building's first floor.

Salmon has worked in the building for more than two years. She said the Memorial Building is a busy place, and despite the option to pay bills by mail or online, Salmon said many residents choose to visit the village offices to settle their water bill, obtain a building permit or buy a vehicle sticker.

"There's still significant pride in this building," Salmon said.

The building's walkability to downtown and proximity to the library encourages visitors and allow employees like herself to easily enjoy a visit to the weekly farmer's market or Burlington Park.

Salmon said that through its many changes and additions, great care has been taken to retain architect Edwin H. Clarke's original vision for the building, which was declared a local historic landmark in 2001 by the Hinsdale Historic Preservation Committee.

there are details within its walls that are not often seen.

The upstairs area known as the "Scout room" is now used by HCS Family Services, but its walls still boast murals that beckon back to the room's original purpose, Salmon said.

Another little-known detail can be found on the bell inside the building's bell tower. It is inscribed with a dedication to the village's war heroes, dated July 4, 1929. Salmon said getting those bells ringing again is on the wish list of more than a few Hinsdale residents.

Just as the citizens of Hinsdale came together to build the original building, village leaders of today have announced Hinsdale's 150 Memorial Building Historic Plaza and Roof Railing Campaign. This fundraising effort will result in restoration of the building's original roof railing and a renewed patio area to the south of the building, commonly seen as the front of the building. The patio area will continue to welcome library patrons in search of a relaxing spot to enjoy a book, and it will serve

as a spot for planned events and community gatherings.








PROPOSED CONCEPT PLAN - SUBJECT TO FUNDING
