Investigations, Crime Prevention, and Youth Bureau Summary November 2014

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

For the month of November 2014, the division had a total of 50 cases being investigated with 22 of these cases brought to disposition. The most frequent incident classifications for these cases were Fraud/Identity Theft (16), Theft (8), Vandalism/Trespass (7), Burglary (7).

On November 13, 2014, a 51-year-old man, formerly from Clarendon Hills was indicted by the DuPage County Grand Jury on two counts of **Financial Institution Fraud over \$500,000**, three counts of **Continuing Financial Crimes Enterprise**, and two counts of **Theft over \$500,000**. The male is wanted on an active warrant.

On November 16, 2014, a 39-year-old Hinsdale man was charged with one count of **Driving under the Influence of Alcohol**, one count of **Improper Lane Usage** and one count of **Illegal transportation of Alcohol**, after being stopped on a routine traffic stop for driving erratically. The man was released on an I-bond.

On November 25, 2014, a 53-year-old Hinsdale man was arrested for two counts of **Domestic Battery**, after an altercation with a family member. The family member was pushed down causing a laceration to the back of her head, which required treatment at the Hinsdale Hospital emergency room. The man was transported to the DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

During the month of October and November, 2014, and after several weeks of investigation, a 32-year-old Hoffman Estates woman was charged with one count of **Forgery**. The woman is alleged to have passed a forged document (check) at a local Bank. The woman also was responsible for other forgeries with similar checks at other branches throughout the western suburban area. The woman was transported to DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

During the month of November, Hinsdale Investigators participated in a multi-jurisdictional investigation involving suspects in residential burglaries. The investigation is ongoing.

The <u>Junior High D.A.R.E Program</u> is a ten lesson program that is presented in all eighth grade classrooms in Hinsdale Public and Parochial Schools. Topics include making good decisions, consequences, decision-making, drug, alcohol, tobacco awareness and resistance.

On November 5, 2014, Officer Coughlin the DJOA board meeting in Wheaton. Topics covered were meeting/training sites, upcoming trainings and board meetings, membership, website, scholarships and elections.

On November 13, 2014, Officer Coughlin gave a station tour to a group of Cub Scouts from Madison School. He spoke to the boys about Crime Prevention, being a good a citizen and fingerprinting. He then showed different types of fingerprints and fingerprinted each Cub Scout.

On November 14, 2014, Officer Coughlin was invited to the S.E.L.A.S. assembly at Hinsdale Middle School. Officer Coughlin was given a check for \$300.00 for the Hinsdale DARE program. This donation was raised by the students in the Peer Leadership group.

On November 17, 2014, Officer Coughlin served as Bailiff at Peer Jury at Downers Grove Village Hall.

On November 19, 2014, Officer Coughlin attended the D.J.O.A. training meeting at the Naperville Police Department. Naperville Police Detective Wistocki spoke about internet crime investigations geared towards juveniles such as social networks, juvenile sexting and internet predators.

On November 19, 2014, Officer Coughlin attended the District 181 Safety & Crisis Committee meeting at Prospect school. Topics covered were safety training for substitutes, 3m safety film, crossing guards, double buzzer at doors, update on signage for areas of refuge and doors with electronic access.

On November 21, 2014, Officer Coughlin attended the quarterly IJOA meeting at the Tinley Park Police Department. Topics covered were membership fees, change of by-laws, update of website, juvenile justice commission grant and the State Conference. The conference will be held back in Peoria on June 10, 11, 12, 2014.

On November 22, 2014, Officers Coughlin & Keller presented the Alive at 25 defensive driving class at the Hinsdale Police Department. The class lasts $4\frac{1}{2}$ hours and is dedicated to improving decision making by identifying behaviors which can lead to traffic crashes. The course includes videos, group work and facilitated discussion.

On November 24, 2014, Officer Coughlin met with the parents of a fifth grade student who were concerned about the behavior of one of their son's classmate's parent.

On November 13 & 20, 2014, Officer Coughlin presented the 2014 Citizen's Police Academy. Topics covered were Traffic Enforcement, Radar, D.U.I.s, School Resource, Juveniles and tour of Hinsdale Central High School was given to all.

On November 14 & 21 2014, Officer Coughlin walked the <u>Business District</u> monitoring the behavior of middle school students. Officer Coughlin spoke with teens, shoppers, business owners and handled any incidents related to the students.

On November 4, 25, 26, 2014 Officer Coughlin supervised three high school students completing community service work.

On 11/17/2014 at approximately 8:00am, a HCHS senior was charged with **School Truancy** when she failed to come to school. She was given **Station Adjustment**.






AGE AND SEX OF OFFENDERS




DISPOSITION OF CASES

November 2014



Hinsdale Police Department Training Summary November 2014

(All training is mandatory unless noted otherwise)

On Tuesday, November 4, 2014, Officers Thomas Lillie and Louis Hayes attended 8-hour **FIAT Training**.

On Wednesday, November 5, 2014, School Resource Officer Mark Keller attended 8-hour **Behavioral Threat Assessment Summit**. The Behavioral Threat Assessment Summit provides a forum and professional development training opportunity to learn how forming a threat assessment team can benefit your organization.

On Tuesday, November 11, 2014, Officer Grant McElroy attended Patrol Response to Internet Crimes. The decisions made by first responders can make or break oftentimes sensitive internet/ digital investigations. This 8-hour program addressed the PATROL response to complaints and investigations related to internet-based crimes, including fraud, sexting, cyberbullying, sexual predators, stalking, etc. Skills addressed in class included: Obtaining basic overviews of Craigslist, EBay, Facebook, Form Spring, various e-mail service providers, Google, YouTube, and Match.com; Searching live hard drives for pictures and videos; Detecting if software-based key logging software is attached to a computer; Obtaining crucial information in internet/computer fraud cases; Obtaining IP's, screen names, e-mail headers, Facebook user ID's, banking information, and cell phone data for the initial report; Laws concerning internet crimes, including computer tampering, stalking, computer fraud, identity theft, harassment through electronic communication, sexting, indecent solicitation of a child, sexual exploitation of a child, and child pornography; Computer and cell phone forensics and when it is appropriate to seize these items from a victim or a suspect for analysis; Differences in charging harassment through electronic communication and cyber-stalking; Procedures for obtaining a Stalking No Contact Civil Order of Protection; Determining the appropriateness of contacting suspects in any of the aforementioned cases. Attendees of the program were given a flash drive with all the necessary documents needed to start a computer crime report, such as: Computer consents to search, seize, and analyze forms; Consent to assume online presence forms; Consent to use photos; Exigent Circumstance forms; Letters of preservation forms.

On Wednesday, November 19, 2014, Detective Kevin Susmarski attended 8-hour 2014 Financial Crimes Training Seminar. Featured Speakers: Len P. McGowan, CFCI- Senior Investigator, Global Security, TD Financial, Retired Toronto Police Service. Len provided an outstanding presentation on EMV and Chip Card Technology and related fraud schemes. Credit cards imbedded with computer chips are increasing in the US along with the number of fraud schemes associated with their use; Doug Buan, CFCI,CISM,PCIP,CCCI, Director, Risk Management, Wind River Financial. Doug gave excellent & easy to understand presentation on Bitcoin Currency. Mike Carroll, Contractor, United States Postal Inspection Service, Investigating Nigerian Fraud Schemes: Andrew Boutros, Assistant United State's Attorney, Northern District of Illinois, Prosecuting Cross Border Fraud; Basil Demczak, United States Postal Inspection Service, Postal Inspector/Team Leader, Jamaican Lottery Fraud.

Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Warrants November 2014

The following warrants should be met prior to installation of a two-way stop sign:

1. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;

2. Street entering a through highway or street;

3. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or

4. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign (defined by 5 or more collisions within a 12-month period).

The following warrants should be met prior to the installation of a Multi-way stop sign:

1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.

2. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period, that is susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.

3. Minimum volumes:

- a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
- b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but

If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h or exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.

4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3.a, and 3.b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3.c is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

The need to control left-turn conflicts;

2. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high-pedestrian volumes;

3. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and

4. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-ay stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

The following warrants must be met prior to the installation of a Yield sign:

1. On a minor road at the entrance to an intersection where it is necessary to assign right-of-way to the major road, but where a stop sign is no necessary at all times, and where the safe approach speed on the minor road exceeds 10 miles per hour;

2. On the entrance ramp to an expressway where an acceleration ramp is not provided;

3. Within an intersection with a divided highway, where a STOP sign is present at the entrance to the first roadway and further control is necessary at the entrance between the two roadways, and where the median width between the acceleration lane; and

4. At an intersection where a special problem exists and where an engineering study indicates the problem to

be susceptible to correction by use of the YIELD sign.
