Investigations, Crime Prevention, and Youth Bureau Summary December 2014

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

For the month of December 2014, the division had a total of 62 cases being investigated with 32 of these cases brought to disposition. The most frequent incident classifications for these cases were Fraud/Identity Theft (17), Theft (13), Burglary (10), Vandalism/Trespass (8).

On December 4, 2014, a 24-year-old Chicago man and a 23-year-old Zion man were indicted on 22 counts of Financial Institution Fraud, Identity Theft, Possession of an Altered Debit or Credit Card, Continuing Financial Crimes Enterprise and Organizer of a Financial Crimes Enterprise, after an investigation which began in August of 2014, when a skimming device was placed on a ATM machine located at BMO Harris Bank. Seven accounts and PIN's of customer's had been compromised and over \$12,000.00 in loses were incurred.

On December 22, 2014, a 20-year-old Orland Park woman was charged on outstanding warrants for one count of **Criminal trespass to Motor Vehicle** and one count of **Criminal Damage to Property**, after an investigation into an August, 2014, Motor Vehicle theft. The woman was released after posting bond.

On December 30, 2014, a 25-year-old Burbank man was charged with local ordinance violations for one count of **Possession of Cannabis under 30** grams and one count of **Possession of Drug Equipment**, after Officer's received a call of a suspicious vehicle in the BP Amoco parking lot at Ogden Avenue and York. The man was release on an I-bond.

A nine week <u>D.A.R.E. Program</u> is presented in all fifth grade classrooms in Hinsdale Public Schools and in sixth grade classrooms in the Hinsdale Parochial Schools. Topics include making good decisions, consequences and alcohol, drug, tobacco awareness and resistance.

On December 3, 2014, Officer Coughlin attended the DJOA board meeting in Wheaton. Topics covered were meeting/training sites, upcoming trainings and board meetings, membership, website, scholarships and elections.

On December 5, 2014, Officer Coughlin participated in the annual Christmas Walk. He spoke with many parents and their children, answering questions and handing out glow necklaces and stickers. Officer Coughlin visited many stores and spoke with employees and owners.

On December 6, 2014, Officer Coughlin participated in the Annual DuPage County Shop with a Cop. Officer Coughlin brought two grammar school students to Glen Ellyn Park District where they had breakfast, had their photo taken with Santa and played basketball. Officer Coughlin then drove the students in a police caravan with lights and sirens on to the Meijer in Bloomingdale. The two students were able to pick out Holiday gifts for themselves and family members.

On December 8, 2014, Officer Coughlin met with a female alcohol offender and her mother and placed her in the peer jury diversion program.

On December 9, 2014, Officer Coughlin assisted K-9 Officers with a search of lockers, study hall, boy's locker room and the girl's locker room at Hinsdale Central High School. Drugs were located in a backpack of a student in study hall. One male juvenile was arrested for drug possession.

On December 10, 2014, Officer Coughlin and Assistant Fire Chief McElroy presented Crisis table top training to the Principal and staff at Madison school.

On December 17, 2014, Officer Coughlin presented a condensed version of Alive at 25 to a group of peer jurors at Downers Grove Township. Our department requires alcohol and cannabis offenders to take the Alive at 25 class. Jurors wanted to see what the class consisted of that the offenders were taking. Officer Coughlin answered many questions about alcohol, cannabis, driving laws and other laws from the jurors.

On December 19, 2014, Officer Coughlin presented the 8th grade D.A.R.E. Graduation at Hinsdale Middle School. Officer Coughlin invited a K-9 Officer from the Oak Brook Police Department to the graduation to give a presentation. Officer Coughlin arranged to have two recovering teen patients from Abraxix Interventions speak with the students. The two teens spoke of their former drug and alcohol abuse and advised the graduates not to get involved with any of these. The teens then answered many questions from the eighth graders. Principal Pena then addressed the 8th graders. Chief Bloom then addressed the students and certificates were handed out to all graduates.

On December 22, 2014, Officer Coughlin covered the street in patrol while patrol officers were in Use of Force training.

On December 4, 11 2014, Officer Coughlin presented the 2014, Citizen's Police Academy. Topics covered were Crisis Negotiations, Traffic stops and Felony stops. Traffic stop scenarios were the reenacted inside the public works garage. Citizens had a chance to be the police and interact with offenders (officers) in different scenarios.

On December 12, 19, 2014, Officer Coughlin walked the <u>Business District</u> monitoring the behavior of middle school students. Officer Coughlin spoke with teens, shoppers, business owners and handled any incidents related to the students.

On December 6, 8, 10, 13, 20, 2014, Officer Coughlin supervised two high school students completing community service work.






AGE AND SEX OF OFFENDERS



DISPOSITION OF CASES



December 2014





Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Warrants December 2014

The following warrants should be met prior to installation of a two-way stop sign:

- 1. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;
- 2. Street entering a through highway or street;
- 3. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or
- 4. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign (defined by 5 or more collisions within a 12-month period).

The following warrants should be met prior to the installation of a Multi-way stop sign:

- 1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- 2. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period, that is susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
- 3. Minimum volumes:
 - a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
 - b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but
 - c. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h or exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.
- 4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3.a, and 3.b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3.c is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

- 1. The need to control left-turn conflicts;
- 2. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high-pedestrian volumes;
- 3. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
- 4. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-ay stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

The following warrants must be met prior to the installation of a Yield sign:

- 1. On a minor road at the entrance to an intersection where it is necessary to assign right-of-way to the major road, but where a stop sign is no necessary at all times, and where the safe approach speed on the minor road exceeds 10 miles per hour;
- 2. On the entrance ramp to an expressway where an acceleration ramp is not provided;
- 3. Within an intersection with a divided highway, where a STOP sign is present at the entrance to the first roadway and further control is necessary at the entrance between the two roadways, and where the median width between the acceleration lane; and
- 4. At an intersection where a special problem exists and where an engineering study indicates the problem to be susceptible to correction by use of the YIELD sign.
