Executive Summary of Police Monthly Report



Attached please find our May 2015 monthly report of Police Department activities. My review of the report found nothing remarkable to report.

In other noteworthy matters, we received a number of inquiries from residents and some Village Board members concerning motorists' obedience to stop signs within the Village. I would concur with their observations that there appears to be an increased number of people rolling through stop signs. In 2009, similar concerns arose. At that time, we implemented a program called "Stop Means Stop" that included both education and enforcement components. Our plan is to again implement this program starting in early June 2015. The program will kick off with a press release and announcements on our website and on Channel 6, followed by an enforcement period that includes warnings and citations.

I learned recently that we were named as a second place finisher in the Illinois Traffic Safety Challenge for municipal police agencies in the 11-25 sworn officers' category. The Traffic Safety Challenge is a program administered through the Chiefs of Police Association that promotes traffic safety through public education, enforcement and engineering. Agencies competing in the Traffic Safety Challenge submit applications describing their efforts to promote traffic safety. Sergeant Steve Cogger along with Detective Kevin Susmarski and volunteer Cindy Go worked hard to prepare a compelling application. As a second place finisher, we have been invited to attend a banquet where traffic safety and enforcement equipment will be awarded along with the opportunity to win a fully outfitted squad car.

On May 22, 2015, Sergeant Steve Ruban graduated from Northwestern University's Center for Public Safety, Police Staff and Command Course. The Police Staff and Command program is an intensive 10 week course geared for police administrators providing upper-level instruction in a total of 27 core blocks for instruction that include Leadership, Human Resources, Organizational Behavior, Applied Statistics and Planning, Budgeting, and Resource Allocation. We anticipate a variety of benefits from Sergeant Ruban's participation in this program.

Investigations, Crime Prevention, and Youth Bureau Summary May 2015

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

For the month of May 2015, the division had a total of 76 cases being investigated with 26 of these cases brought to disposition. The most frequent incident classifications for these cases were Fraud/Identity Theft (41), Theft (9), and Vandalism/Trespass (5).

On May 16, 2015, a 20-year-old Westmont woman was charged with one count of **Possession of Cannabis**, after a traffic stop on a vehicle in which the woman was a passenger. The woman was charged with a local ordinance and released on an I-bond.

On May 19, 2015, a 22-year-old Willowbrook man and a 17-year-old Hinsdale man were charged with one count of **Possession of Cannabis** each after a call of suspicious persons near Woodside and Columbia. Both subjects were charged with local ordinances and released on I-bonds.

On May 22, 2015 28-year-old Aurora man was charged with two counts of **Aggravated Identity Theft**, after an investigation in which the offender stole two checks from the complainant, while doing work at the residence. The man was taken to the DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

On May 27, 2015 a 57-year-old Broadview woman was charged with one count of **Theft**, after an investigation into missing patient clothing from ManorCare nursing home. The woman was charged with a local ordinance and released on an I-bond.


YOUTH BUREAU SUMMARY




Hinsdale Police Department JUVENILE MONTHLY REPORT May 2015

AGE AND SEX OF OFFENDERS




DISPOSITION OF CASES

NOTABLE TRAFFIC INFORMATION REQUESTS AND ACTIVITY MAY 2015

Intersection Safety Reviews: Concerns were expressed from residents regarding the safety at the below listed intersections. Residents expressed interest in additional traffic control measures, including additional stop signs. Preliminary reviews of all intersections are in-progress, and feedback regarding MUTCD standards has been provided to the residents. Low-level improvements such as pavement markings, warning signs, or parking restrictions will be recommended and forwarded for immediate action. Should the preliminary review indicate that a traffic control device be installed, recommendations will be forwarded to the Village Board.

2nd & Madison: A preliminary intersection study is in progress at this intersection following a resident inquiry about addressing speeding issues, and hazardous crossing for pedestrians at this intersection. A speed study, along with posting of speed feedback sign, was completed to determine what strategies that may be recommended for speed control and improvement for pedestrian safety. The speed studies did not conclusively identify trends that were aberrant to other arterial roadways within the Village. Due to the high traffic volumes on Madison Street, a recommendation will be forwarded for adding additional pedestrian warning signage, and this area will continue to be monitored for speed violations.

The Lane & Oak Street: At the request of residents living near The Lane & Oak Street, a meeting was held at the intersection on May 29th which was attended by representation of the District 181 Board President and members of the Building and Grounds Department. Residents expressed concerns about on-going near-miss accidents of vehicles and pedestrians due to confusion at this 2-way stop intersection. A preliminary evaluation was completed that indicated the warrants for a 4-way stop would not be met; however, continued evaluation is on-going to determine whether an adult crossing guard may be recommended. Additional follow-up meetings will be scheduled with District 181 officials to discuss funding of an additional crossing guard, should it be warranted.

Other Traffic related activity:

School Crossing Guard Evaluations: Annual performance evaluations were completed for all crossing guard staff. Evaluations constituted of an on-site evaluation checklist completed by an evaluator that covertly monitored the crossing guards. Immediate feedback was given when observed. An evaluation of on-going need for each location is in progress.

Seatbelt and DUI Enforcement Initiative (Memorial Day Holiday): The Memorial Day Seatbelt and DUI enforcement initiative resulted in 3 DUIs and 103 Seatbelt violations. The campaign was funded by the Illinois Department of Transportation to hire-back officers specifically for the enforcement of Seatbelt and DUI offenses. Hinsdale Officers have used this grant-funded opportunity to not only seek seatbelt violations, but while standing at intersections officers enforced distracted driving violations, which included 42 cell phone citations being issued. Grant funding continues to be allocated through the remaining 2015 holiday enforcement periods established by IDOT.


Speed Feedback Sign Purchase by Monroe School PTO: The Monroe School PTO has submitted a request for a speed feedback sign to be installed on Monroe Street, between Hickory & Walnut, which will be funded by the PTO. In May of 2014, a sign was installed on Madison at Walnut, and speed studies show the sign has been effective in reducing vehicle speeds, particularly during the school crossing times. The timeline for implementation is targeted for the 2015-2016 school year.

Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Warrants May 2015

The following warrants should be met prior to installation of a two-way stop sign:

- 1. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;
- 2. Street entering a through highway or street;
- 3. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or
- 4. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign (defined by 5 or more collisions within a 12-month period).

The following warrants should be met prior to the installation of a Multi-way stop sign:

- 1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- 2. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period, that is susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
- 3. Minimum volumes:
 - a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
 - b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but
 - c. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h or exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.
- 4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3.a, and 3.b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3.c is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

- 1. The need to control left-turn conflicts;
- 2. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high-pedestrian volumes;
- 3. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
- 4. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-ay stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

The following warrants must be met prior to the installation of a **Yield** sign:

- On a minor road at the entrance to an intersection where it is necessary to assign right-of-way to the major road, but where a stop sign is no necessary at all times, and where the safe approach speed on the minor road exceeds 10 miles per hour;
- 2. On the entrance ramp to an expressway where an acceleration ramp is not provided;
- 3. Within an intersection with a divided highway, where a STOP sign is present at the entrance to the first roadway and further control is necessary at the entrance between the two roadways, and where the median width between the acceleration lane; and
- 4. At an intersection where a special problem exists and where an engineering study indicates the problem to be susceptible to correction by use of the YIELD sign.



Social Networking Monthly Status Report May 2015

The **Hinsdale Police Department** continues to publicly advocate its community notification via social media. During the past reporting period, posts were disseminated on the following topics:

- Provided a map for the Wellness House Run/Walk with traffic detours for the event.
- Acknowledged the sacrifice of Hinsdale Patrolman Paul Schwieger who was killed in the line of duty on June 10, 1927. Sergeants Lamb and Wodka paid tribute to Patrolman Schwieger by representing the Hinsdale Police Department at the Illinois Law Enforcement Memorial Ceremony in Springfield.
- Wished Hinsdale Moms a Happy Mother's Day and provided road closure information for the annual "Run Like a Mother" race.
- Announced that residents can now register for overnight street parking using their computer or smart phone.
- Announced our department's participation in "Click it or Ticket" enforcement campaign from May 12-25 to keep roadways safer over the Memorial Day weekend.
- Encouraged residents to sign up for "Smart911" to help protect their family by providing vital personal and medical information to first responders. The service is free.
