
Attached please find our February 2015 monthly report of our activities. In summary I would point out the following as noteworthy:

On February 7, 2015, we arrested a resident from Burr Ridge and a resident from Westmont who were observed in the Main Train Depot after hours by a patrol officer. When confronted they were found in possession of approximately 16 small zip lock bags containing a substance that field tested positive for heroin. Both persons were charged with possession of a controlled substance (a felony). Based on the packaging of the suspected substance it appears to have been prepared for sale and distribution.

Sergeant Tom Yehl graduated from Northwestern University, Center for Public Safety, School of Police Staff and Command. This is an intensive 10 week program geared for police administrators.

We have formalized our process for conducting preliminary traffic safety studies. We receive regular requests from residents to conduct traffic safety studies for potential safety improvements. The primary purpose for these requests is to determine if the intersection can be improved with the addition or changes of traffic control devices. Our study findings and recommendations are based on the criterion contained in the Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD). In most cases, our preliminary review and data collection justifies the current traffic controls. This information is shared with the resident requesting the study and in most cases they are satisfied with the results. In incidents where the resident contests our preliminary findings, an in-depth review is done and our recommendation is referred to the Village Board for review. You will note in the traffic section of the attached report that six (6) preliminary traffic studies were completed.

Investigations, Crime Prevention, and Youth Bureau Summary

February 2015

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

For the month of February 2015, the division had a total of 47 cases being investigated with 18 of these cases brought to disposition. The most frequent incident classifications for these cases were Fraud/Identity Theft (13), Burglary (8), Theft (5) and Disorderly Conduct (5).

On February 7, 2015, a 53-year-old Hinsdale man was charged with two counts **Domestic Battery**, after striking a family member. The man was transported to the DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

On February 7, 2015, a 24-year-old Burr Ridge woman and a 37-year-old Westmont man were charged with one count of **Possession of Controlled Substance** each, after both were found inside the closed train depot. During further investigation numerous small plastic zip lock baggies were found in their possession that tested positive for heroin. The man and woman were both transported to DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

On February 9, 2015 a 40-year-old Bolingbrook man was charged with one count of **Possession of an Essential Vehicle Part**, the woman he was with, a 32-year-old from Bolingbrook, was also charged with one count of **Possession of an Essential Vehicle Part** and one count of **Driving while Revoked**. Both offenders had been observed by Burr Ridge Police Detectives cutting off a catalytic converter from a vehicle parked in the Hinsdale Hospital parking garage. The man and woman were both transported to DuPage County Jail.

On February 11, 2015, a 22-year-old Chicago man was charged with one count of **Attempted Forgery** after entering a local bank with a forged document. The man was released after posting bond.

On February 16, 2015, a 34-year-old Chicago man was charged with one count of **Battery**, after pushing a co-worker. The man was released after posting bond.

On February 21, 2015, a 40-year-old Bolingbrook woman was charged with one count of **Theft**, after an investigation in which the woman who was working at a local nursing home stole a co-employee's phone. The woman was released after posting bond.

On February 27, 2015, a 57-year-old Schaumburg woman was charged with one count of **Harassment by Phone** on an outstanding warrant for threatening another person. The woman had been arrested on other charges in Schaumburg when our warrant was served. The woman is currently in Cook County Jail.


On 2/13/2015 at approximately 8:00am, a HCHS junior was charged with **Violation of School Curfew**. He was given a **Station Adjustment**.




AGE AND SEX OF OFFENDERS




DISPOSITION OF CASES

NOTABLE TRAFFIC INFORMATION REQUESTS AND ACTIVITY

Intersection Safety Reviews: Concerns were expressed from residents regarding the safety at the below listed intersections. Residents expressed interest in additional traffic control measures, including additional stop signs. Preliminary reviews of all intersections are in-progress, and feedback regarding MUTCD standards have been provided to the residents. Low-level improvements such as pavement markings, warning signs, or parking restrictions will be recommended and forwarded for immediate action. Should the preliminary review indicate that a traffic control device be installed, recommendations will be forwarded to the Village Board.

8th & Bodin: A preliminary review of this intersection determined that warrants may be met for the replacement of existing yield signs with stop signs. A full intersection study with recommendations is in progress.

5th & Washington: A preliminary review of this intersection determined that warrants may be met for the replacement of existing yield signs with stop signs. A full intersection study with recommendations is in progress.

7th & Monroe: A preliminary review of the intersection found that warrants have not been met to replace existing yield signs with stop signs.

Ayres & Washington: A preliminary review was conducted following an intoxicated motorist that drove onto the property and struck the residence within the last 6 months. Resident requested the installation of a permanent barrier. Preliminary review found that no conditions exist that are unique to this intersection from other 3-way intersections within the Village. The likelihood and risk of this occurrence is present at all 3-way intersections within the Village, and any recommendations for action at this intersection would set precedence for similar action to be taken at all 3-way intersections within the Village.

8th & County Line Road: A preliminary review was conducted following an intoxicated motorist that drove onto the property and struck the residence within the last 6 months. Resident requested the installation of a permanent barrier. Preliminary review found that no conditions exist that are unique to this intersection from other 3-way intersections within the Village. The likelihood and risk of this occurrence is present at all 3-way intersections within the Village, and any recommendations for action at this intersection would set precedence for similar action to be taken at all 3-way intersections within the Village.

Burlington Drive Signage: Concerns were expressed about a lack of signage for motorists that indicates traffic is restricted in the westbound direction. Preliminary review found that adequate "DO NOT ENTER" signage is posted at the exit of Burlington Drive to Washington Street.

Other Traffic related activity: The Hinsdale Police Department received notification of being awarded \$7,679 in grant funding provided by the Safe Routes to School Initiative. The grant is a 20% local match, to be used for the purchase of speed monitoring equipment (feedback signs). As of this time, the Illinois Department of Transportation is awaiting approval of federal funding before purchases can be made under this award.



Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Warrants

February 2015

The following warrants should be met prior to installation of a **two-way** stop sign:

1. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;
2. Street entering a through highway or street;
3. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or
4. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign (defined by 5 or more collisions within a 12-month period).

The following warrants should be met prior to the installation of a **Multi-way** stop sign:

1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
2. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period, that is susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.
3. Minimum volumes:
 - a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
 - b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but
 - c. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h or exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.
4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3.a, and 3.b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3.c is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

1. The need to control left-turn conflicts;
2. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high-pedestrian volumes;
3. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
4. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-way stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

The following warrants must be met prior to the installation of a **Yield** sign:

1. On a minor road at the entrance to an intersection where it is necessary to assign right-of-way to the major road, but where a stop sign is not necessary at all times, and where the safe approach speed on the minor road exceeds 10 miles per hour;
2. On the entrance ramp to an expressway where an acceleration ramp is not provided;
3. Within an intersection with a divided highway, where a STOP sign is present at the entrance to the first roadway and further control is necessary at the entrance between the two roadways, and where the median width between the acceleration lane; and
4. At an intersection where a special problem exists and where an engineering study indicates the problem to be susceptible to correction by use of the YIELD sign.

Social Networking Monthly Status Report

February 2015

The **Hinsdale Police Department** continues to publicly advocate its community notification via social media. During the past reporting period, posts were disseminated on the following topics:

- Notified residents that the Police and Fire Departments were responding to a gas leak at the corner of Chestnut and Washington Streets.
- Announced that registration for the 33rd annual Safety Village will begin on April 15th. All children living in Hinsdale/Clarendon Hills and/or in School District 181, and entering kindergarten or first grade in the fall are eligible for the program.
- Advised that the Hinsdale Police and Fire building will be the first designated warming center and shelter for any civilians requiring assistance during the extreme weather conditions expected in the coming days.
- Warned residents about a phone scam in which the caller identifies themselves as working for a computer company, and can assist in repairing your computer. Advised that this is a scam, and the callers ask for personal information in an effort to obtain electronic access to your computer, or install remote access to your home network. Provided a link to information regarding phone scams.
- Warned residents about dangerously cold temperatures and wind chills expected the following day.
