Re: Executive Summary of Police Monthly Report-April 2015



Attached please find our April 2015 monthly report on Police Department activities.

On April 28, 2015 at approximately 10:00 am we successfully transitioned to DuComm as our 9-1-1 dispatch provider from Southwest Central Dispatch (SWCD). The transition was seamless and did not result in any service disruptions or delays. Our staff was very pleased with how organized DuComm was and how well managed the transition was. It's only been a little over three weeks since transitioning to DuComm but the feedback so far from officers has been very positive. We have not received any notification from SWCD regarding costs they incurred due to our leaving. As you may recall, when we recommended DuComm they were in the midst of considering building a second facility that would act as a backup. At this point there does not appear to be support for this option and they are now considering remodeling an existing building in Lombard to use as a backup center. Under this plan, the second facility would be paid for with cash reserves and would not require the Village to enter into a long term capital finance agreement.

During April 2015, we had over 15 victims report that unknown persons had fraudulently filed Federal income tax returns under their names. We are continuing to investigate jointly with the IRS. Preliminarily, it appears that this is somewhat of a widespread event and it does not appear that any local databases were breached to obtain taxpayer information.

Additionally, on April 3, 2015, at approximately 2:20 a.m., officers were dispatched to the 300 block of west Hickory for a suspicious noise complaint. Upon arrival, officers found a vehicle parked in the driveway of a residence that had damage indicating that it had recently been vandalized. Officers also found a flashlight at the scene that they believed was left there by the offender. Officers parked their squad at a remote location and surveilled the residence on foot hoping the offender might return to retrieve the flashlight. After approximately an hour, officers observed a suspect return to the area and throw what they later determined was a bottle filled with gasoline and a wick fashioned out of toilet paper, commonly referred to as a Molotov Cocktail, at the house. Fortunately, the bottle did not break and the fire was extinguished without damage. After a brief foot pursuit, a 17 year old male from Hinsdale was taken into custody and a large fire was averted. The 17 year old was charged as a juvenile with felony criminal damage to property and attempted arson. Officer Jeff Huckfeldt was recognized as the April 2015 Officer of the Month due to his efforts on this incident.

Investigations, Crime Prevention, and Youth Bureau Summary April 2015

INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

For the month of April 2015, the division had a total of 84 cases being investigated with 21 of these cases brought to disposition. The most frequent incident classifications for these cases were Fraud/Identity Theft (33), Theft (13) and Vandalism/Trespass (8).

On April 15, 2015, a 40-year-old Chicago woman was charged with one count of **Theft under \$500.00**. The woman who had been an employee/cashier at the BP Amoco station had been removing money from the cash register during her work hours. After a July 2014 investigation into this incident, a warrant was obtained for the woman. The woman was released after posting bond.

On April 29, 2015, a 24-year-old Chicago man was arrested on one count of **Domestic Battery**, after a physical altercation at the Shell Food Mart parking lot. The man is alleged to have pulled the complainant from a vehicle and then began pushing and hitting the female complainant with an open hand. The man was transported to the DuPage County Jail for a bond hearing.

During the month of April, 2015, the Investigations Division completed eight background checks on candidates applying for the position of police officer. These background checks included speaking to employers, references, an interview, neighborhood visits, and police contacts.

A nine week <u>D.A.R.E. Program</u> is presented in all fifth grade classrooms in Hinsdale Public Schools and in sixth grade classrooms in the Hinsdale Parochial Schools. Topics include making good decisions, consequences and alcohol, drug, tobacco awareness and resistance.

V.E.G.A. (VIOLENCE EDUCATION GANG AWARENESS)

V.E.G.A. is a six lesson program presented in sixth grade classrooms in Hinsdale public schools and in seventh grade at Hinsdale Parochial schools. The program deals with problem solving without violence, bullying and avoiding gang activities.

On April 1, 2015, Officer Coughlin attended the DJOA board meeting in Wheaton. Topics covered were meeting/training sites, upcoming trainings and board meetings, membership, website, scholarships and elections.

On April 6, 2015, Officer Coughlin attended the DuPage County Juvenile Justice Council meeting in Wheaton. Topics covered were Detention Hearing Screening, funding for juvenile mental health services and effective interventions for high-risk youths.

On April 7, 2015, Officer Coughlin attended a Juvenile Detention Hearing in Wheaton for a juvenile that Officer Coughlin brought to the Juvenile Detention Center on April 5, 2015,

On April 11, 2015, Officer Coughlin presented a Situational Awareness/Self –Defense class to a group of high school females. The class was about not putting yourself in a position to become a victim, knowing your surroundings and learning self-defense techniques. The girls all had a chance to practice the self-defense techniques and then they were put in a situation where an offender grabs them and they have to fend him off using the techniques they learned.

On April 14, 2015, Officer Coughlin served as Bailiff for Peer Jury at Darien Village Hall.

On April 15, 2015, Officer Coughlin made Safety Village Applications available to the public in the lobby of the police department and answered questions from residents concerning Safety Village.

On April 22, 2015, Officer Coughlin attended the DJOA (DuPage Juvenile Officers Association) meeting. The topic was Gangs in DuPage County, current gang trends, enforcement techniques and gang issues within schools.

On April 23, 2015, Officer Coughlin met with Hinsdale Middle School Principal Pena, a social worker, a classroom teacher and a parent about the challenges this parent was having with her child in and out of school.






Hinsdale Police Department JUVENILE MONTHLY REPORT April 2015

AGE AND SEX OF OFFENDERS




DISPOSITION OF CASES

NOTABLE TRAFFIC INFORMATION REQUESTS AND ACTIVITY APRIL 2015

Intersection Safety Reviews: Concerns were expressed from residents regarding the safety at the below listed intersections. Residents expressed interest in additional traffic control measures, including additional stop signs. Preliminary reviews of all intersections are in-progress, and feedback regarding MUTCD standards has been provided to the residents. Low-level improvements such as pavement markings, warning signs, or parking restrictions will be recommended and forwarded for immediate action. Should the preliminary review indicate that a traffic control device be installed, recommendations will be forwarded to the Village Board.

7th & Monroe: A preliminary intersection study is in progress at this intersection following a resident inquiry about changing yield signs to stop signs. A recommendation will be made to the Village Board recommending a change if the findings of the study determine MUTCD warrants are met.

2nd & Madison: A preliminary intersection study is in progress at this intersection following a resident inquiry about changing yield signs to stop signs. A recommendation will be made to the Village Board recommending a change if the findings of the study determine MUTCD warrants are met. A speed study, along with posting of speed feedback sign, is also in progress to determine alternate strategies that may be recommended for speed control. A schedule is in place for deployment of the speed trailer to collect 85th Percentile speed data, and officers have been directed to conduct selective enforcement to evaluate the prevalence of speed violations.

Other Traffic related activity:

The National Safety Council has identified the month of April to be "Distracted Driving Awareness Month." On April 24th, the Hinsdale Police department coordinated a regional enforcement effort with law enforcement agencies on along the 55th Street Corridor from Naperville to Western Springs. 11 citations were issued by officers during this enforcement campaign.

Distracted driving is a serious traffic safety concern that puts everyone on the road at risk. In recent years, hundreds have been killed and thousands seriously injured in Illinois as a result of collisions that involved at least one driver who was distracted. Nationally, an estimated 3,328 died in 2012. As a result, law enforcement across the nation, including the Hinsdale Police Department, continue cracking down on cell phone use and texting with the use of zero tolerance enforcement campaigns.



Manual on Uniform Traffic Control Devices Warrants April 2015

The following warrants should be met prior to installation of a two-way stop sign:

1. Intersection of a less important road with a main road where application of the normal right-of-way rule would not be expected to provide reasonable compliance with the law;

2. Street entering a through highway or street;

3. Unsignalized intersection in a signalized area; and/or

4. High speeds, restricted view, or crash records indicate a need for control by the STOP sign (defined by 5 or more collisions within a 12-month period).

The following warrants should be met prior to the installation of a Multi-way stop sign:

- 1. Where traffic control signals are justified, the multi-way stop is an interim measure that can be installed quickly to control traffic while arrangements are being made for the installation of the traffic control signal.
- 2. A crash problem, as indicated by 5 or more reported crashes in a 12-month period, that is susceptible to correction by a multi-way stop installation. Such crashes include right-turn and left-turn collisions as well as right-angle collisions.

3. Minimum volumes:

- a. The vehicular volume entering the intersection from the major street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 300 vehicles per hour for any 8 hours of an average day, and
- b. The combined vehicular, pedestrian, and bicycle volume entering the intersection from the minor street approaches (total of both approaches) averages at least 200 units per hour for the same 8 hours, with an average delay to minor-street vehicular traffic of at least 30 seconds per vehicle during the highest hour, but

c. If the 85th-percentile approach speed of the major-street traffic exceeds 65 km/h or exceeds 40 mph, the minimum vehicular volume warrants are 70 percent of the above values.

4. Where no single criterion is satisfied, but where Criteria 2, 3.a, and 3.b are all satisfied to 80 percent of the minimum values. Criterion 3.c is excluded from this condition.

Option:

Other criteria that may be considered in an engineering study include:

- 1. The need to control left-turn conflicts:
- 2. The need to control vehicle/pedestrian conflicts near locations that generate high-pedestrian volumes:
- 3. Locations where a road user, after stopping, cannot see conflicting traffic and is not able to reasonably safely negotiate the intersection unless conflicting cross traffic is also required to stop; and
- 4. An intersection of two residential neighborhood collector (through) streets of similar design and operating characteristics where multi-ay stop control would improve traffic operational characteristics of the intersection.

The following warrants must be met prior to the installation of a Yield sign:

1. On a minor road at the entrance to an intersection where it is necessary to assign right-of-way to the major road, but where a stop sign is no necessary at all times, and where the safe approach speed on the minor road exceeds 10 miles per hour;

2. On the entrance ramp to an expressway where an acceleration ramp is not provided;

- 3. Within an intersection with a divided highway, where a STOP sign is present at the entrance to the first roadway and further control is necessary at the entrance between the two roadways, and where the median width between the acceleration lane; and
- 4. At an intersection where a special problem exists and where an engineering study indicates the problem to be susceptible to correction by use of the YIELD sign.

The **Hinsdale Police Department** continues to publicly advocate its community notification via social media. During the past reporting period, posts were disseminated on the following topics:

- Reminded residents that the DEA has issued a nationwide alert on Fentanyl as a threat to health and public safety. Hinsdale Police are equipped with Naloxone, which is a nasal spray that immediately reverses an opiate overdose.
- Announced Police Department lobby hours in observance of Good Friday.
- Power Outage Notification: Comed is reporting an outage in the area of 6th and Garfield, which is currently under investigation and an estimated restore time is 10:45 am.
- A tornado watch was issued by the National Weather Service until 11 PM for the Hinsdale area. Reminded residents to monitor weather conditions throughout the evening.
- Road Closure Announcement: Neri Construction will be closing Lincoln St between Hinsdale Ave and Chestnut St on Thursday, April 16, 2015. This FULL closure will prohibit vehicular traffic from crossing the railroad tracks. Barricades and signage will be installed by 7 AM. The closure is necessary for the excavation of an auguring pit on the north side of the railroad tracks.
- Announced that Safety Village applications are available in the Police Department lobby April 15th at 7:00
 am.
- Power Outage Notification: Comed is reporting a power outage near 294 and Ogden that may be impacting
 residents on the northeast side of Hinsdale. The estimated restore time is 5:15pm.
- Notified residents that the National Safety Council has identified the month of April to be "Distracted Driving Awareness Month." Throughout the month, the Hinsdale Police Department will be actively ticketing those texting or operating hand-held cell phones.
- Reminded residents that the Village of Hinsdale prohibits any person to write, place or mark any signs or
 advertisements on any such street, sidewalk or public place. Public places include the parkway, which is most
 often the area between the public sidewalk and the street. Any signs placed in this area are in violation of
 Village of Hinsdale Ordinance 7-1-5 and can be removed, confiscated, with the owner being cited.
- Advised that on Sunday April 26th, The Community House will be hosting the 2015 WALK THE WALK FOR
 AUTISM. This event is scheduled to begin at 8:30AM but residents can expect that travel and parking for the
 along the designated route, especially in the area near the Community House, will be impacted between 811AM. Hinsdale Police Officers will be leading the walk and will be assigned to various intersections along
 the route to assist with traffic and ensure participant safety.
- TRAFFIC ALERT: The intersection of Chicago and Lincoln is currently closed as contractors work to replace a water main. Westbound traffic will be routed north on Lincoln, and eastbound traffic will be routed north on Grant during this closure period.
