# VILLAGE OF HINSDALE ENVIRONMENT AND PUBLIC SERVICES COMMITTEE MINUTES MONDAY, MAY 12, 2014

Chairman Laura LaPlaca called the meeting of the Environment and Public Services Committee to order at 7:34 P.M., Monday May 12, 2014, in Memorial Hall of the Memorial Building, 19 East Chicago Avenue, Hinsdale, IL.

# Approval of Minutes - April 14, 2014

The EPS Committee reviewed the minutes from the April 14, 2014 meeting. Trustee Hughes provided staff a copy of the minutes with minor corrections. Trustee Saigh motioned for approval of the April 14, 2014 minutes. Trustee Hughes seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

# Public Services Monthly Report

Mr. Franco provided an update on Public Service Department upcoming activities which include:

- Water restrictions which begin on May 15, 2014
- Parkway tree planting which is scheduled to begin on Thursday May 15, 2014; dependant upon weather. (Due to the current weather this program has been postponed until Monday May 19, 2014). Trustee Saigh inquired how many trees will be planted. Mr. Franco noted that approximately 120 trees will be planted.

Crews are focusing on maintenance to get the Community Pool running for opening day.

Memorial Building Patio Update. Mr. Franco provided Committee an update on the Memorial Building east patio drainage installation and new patio upgrades. The drainage system has been installed as well as the patio area replaced with brick pavers. Public Service crews will be handling restoration of excavation with dirt and seed repairs and concrete sidewalk replacement.

Trustee LaPlaca noted that the bricks utilized for the patio replacement have been reconstituted from the South Garfield reconstruction project.

Trustee Saigh inquired about the three tubes located on the Memorial Building grounds. Mr. Franco noted that as there are no storm sewers in the area to directly tie the drainage system into, the three tubes serve as an endpoint of the system to let the water leach into the soil. These tubes will be cut flush with the ground after turf has been established.

Village Lot Lighting Update. Mr. Franco provided summary detail on this item which includes \$245,000 funding in the FY 2014-15 budget to complete resurfacing and electrical lighting upgrades in the Village Lot. Input from Committee was requested for the lighting portion of the upgrades to upgrade the lighting from current status to decorative lighting similar to KLM and Chestnut Street parking lots.

Trustee Saigh inquired if three lights would produce enough light in the lot with the current design which includes the installation of three lights. Mr. Franco noted that there are existing decorative light poles on the south, east, and west side of the parking lot. The three new lights will be installed in the interior of the parking lot. Also LED bulbs can be utilized during the installation.

Trustee LaPlaca requested that when a final draft of the improvements is completed, a map is brought back to Committee with the exact location of decorative light pole installation.

# **Engineering Monthly Report**

Capital Project Status. Mr. Deeter highlighted that construction continues on the 2014 Reconstruction Project on Walnut Street from Washington – Vine and on Clay Street from Maple – Walnut. In the Woodlands construction continues on Cleveland from Woodlands – 55<sup>th</sup> Street and Harding Road from Woodlands to Taft. Staff has recently been notified that the Flagg Creek Water Reclamation District construction on 55<sup>th</sup> Street will is estimated to take place in October or September.

**Project Change Order Request**. Mr. Deeter highlighted the project change orders to date. Mr. Deeter discussed with the committee how the Village avoided a larger change order by modifying the Woodlands plan to include a berm between Harding Road and 55<sup>th</sup> Street. This will provide the additional benefit of enhancing the screenings between residents and 55<sup>th</sup> Street.

Oak Street Bridge Phase 2 (Design Engineering) Schedule. Chairman LaPlaca reminded residents that they can still provide comments to the 04/29/14 Public Meeting until 05/015/14. Mr. Deeter highlighted the Oak Street Bridge activities in the last month.

2014 Infrastructure and Resurfacing Project Status. At the 04/25/14 bid opening, only two bids were submitted for construction of this project. Both were over the budget. Mr. Deeter discussed staff's analysis for the high bids and actions to construct as much of the project as possible. Staff is investigating different methods to construction portions of the project within the budget. These include adding some streets to existing projects (2014 Reconstruction or Woodlands Phase 2), using the Municipal Partnering Initiative bids, and re-bidding a smaller portion of the project.

Retention of 2013 Reconstruction Project funds. Mr. Deeter explained the circumstances surrounding the lien on the 2013 Reconstruction Project. This lien will not increase the Village's cost for this project. The Village attorney recommends that the Village should deposit funds that we have retained in the amount of the liens with the Clerk of the Circuit Court. After some discussion, the Committee directed staff to work with the Village attorney to identify the correct amount to deposit and proceed with depositing these funds with the Clerk of the Circuit Court.

# To Award the Engineering Services for Design of the 2015 Reconstruction Project to Bowman Consulting Group in the Amount Not to Exceed \$104,520.00.

Chairman LaPlaca introduced this agenda item. Mr. Deeter noted that requests for proposals were sent out and received from eight engineering consultants. Staff recommends Bowman Consulting Group. Mr. Alan Swanson of Bowman Consulting Group addressed the committee. Mr. Swanson said that Bowman will honor the Construction Observation cost as stated in this proposal if they are recommended for that engineering service next year. Trustee Saigh moved to approve. Trustee Hughes seconded. The motion passed unanimously

# To Award the Engineering Services for Design of the 2015 Resurfacing Project to Christopher B. Burke Engineering Ltd. in the Amount Not to Exceed \$44,682.00.

Chairman LaPlaca introduced this agenda item. Mr. Deeter noted that requests for proposals were sent out and received from eight engineering consultants. Staff recommends Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd. (CBBEL). Mr. Steve Sugg of CBBEL said that CBBEL will honor the Construction Observation cost as stated in this proposal if they are recommended for that engineering service next year. Trustee Saigh moved to approve. Trustee Hughes seconded. The motion passed unanimously

## Other Business

Sump Pump Discharge from 412 E. Eighth Street. Chairman LaPlaca introduced this agenda item. Mr. Deeter stated that excess sump pump discharges into the right of way is an issues throughout the Village. These can cause a public nuisance (perpetually

wet or icy streets & sidewalks) such as at 412 E. Eighth Street. Staff has identified at least 22 areas where discharging into the right of way was a problem.

The issue is caused by two main factors. First, because of unpredictable underground conditions, some sump pumps produce more water than anticipated. This excess water exceeds any ability to soak into the originating property. The majority of the water then runs into the right of way. Secondly, without a near-by sewer inlet, this excess surface flow causes slippery or icy conditions.

Trustee Hughes clarified that there are three different situations that the committee should consider:

- 1) How to prevent this in new construction.
- 2) How to address the existing problem areas.
- 3) How to address new problem areas caused by residents making building or landscaping changes.

Mr. Deeter informed the committee how the staff currently addresses the issue. For new construction, he recommended that the Village require the home owner to discharge their sump pumps into the nearest storm sewers. If no storm sewer is available, they should discharge the sump pump waters in the vicinity of a combined sewer inlet. This would require the owner or builder to installing storm sewer pipes through the right of way to the nearest sewer. This new storm sewer would be installed at the owner's/builder's expense. The committee agreed with this approach. Staff will develop new Village policies for the committee's review.

Staff is studying the existing problem areas in the Village. Staff will present recommendations for these at a future meeting. Village Manager Kathleen Gargano asked that we confirm that these existing discharges were approved at some time by Village staff. Drainage issues caused by future changes to landscaping or discharge points are addressed by staff when neighbors call the Village about the excess drainage. Staff will update the Village Engineering Standards for the Committee's review.

## **Adjournment**

With no further issues to be brought before the Committee, Trustee Saigh moved to adjourn. Trustee Hughes seconded. Motion carried and the meeting was adjourned at 9:08 P.M.

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# AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING PREVAILING WAGES FOR PUBLIC WORKS IN THE VILLAGE OF HINSDALE, COOK AND DUPAGE COUNTIES, ILLINOIS

WHEREAS, the State of Illinois has enacted the Prevailing Wage Act, 820 ILCS 130/0.01 et seq. (2011), as amended ("the Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the Village of Hinsdale ("Village") investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in said Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of the Village employed in performing construction of public works during the month of June of each year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the President and Board of Trustees of the Village of Hinsdale, DuPage and Cook Counties and State of Illinois, as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. <u>Recitals Incorporated</u>. The recitals set forth above constitute a material part of this Ordinance as if set forth in their entirety in this Section 1.

Section 2. Determination of Prevailing Wages. To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in the Village for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing wages for construction work in DuPage and Cook Counties, as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June 1, 2014, a copy of said determinations being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference as Group Exhibit A. The definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in the aforesaid Act shall be the same as in said Act.

Section 3. Prevailing Wages Applicable to Public Works. Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

Section 4. Posting of Determination. The Village Clerk shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested party this determination of such prevailing rate of wages or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wages. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to contract specifications as required by the Act, or, if permitted by the Act, shall be referenced in the contract specifications.

<u>Section 5.</u> <u>Service of Determination.</u> The Village Clerk shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses and have requested copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

<u>Section 6.</u> <u>Filing of Determination</u>. The Village Clerk shall promptly file a certified copy of this Ordinance with both the Secretary of State and the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois.

<u>Section 7.</u> <u>Publication of Determination</u>. Within thirty days after the filing with the Secretary of State, the Village Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be published in a newspaper of general circulation within the area notification of passage of this Ordinance, stating:

#### **Explanations**

COOK COUNTY

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

TRUCK DRIVERS (WEST) - That part of the county West of Barrington Road.

EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical

systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

#### CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

#### COMMUNICATIONS ELECTRICIAN

Installation, operation, inspection, maintenance, repair and service of radio, television, recording, voice sound vision production and reproduction, telephone and telephone interconnect, facsimile, data apparatus, coaxial, fibre optic and wireless equipment, appliances and systems used for the transmission and reception of signals of any nature, business, domestic, commercial, education, entertainment, and residential purposes, including but not limited to, communication and telephone, electronic and sound equipment, fibre optic and data communication systems, and the performance of any task directly related to such installation or service whether at new or existing sites, such tasks to include the placing of wire and cable and electrical power conduit or other raceway work within the equipment room and pulling wire and/or cable through conduit and the installation of any incidental conduit, such that the employees covered hereby can complete any job in full.

#### MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble,

holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up thin set for the installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate, travertine, art marble, serpentine, alberene stone, blue stone, granite and other stones (meaning as to stone any foreign or domestic materials as are specified and used in building interiors and exteriors and customarily known as stone in the trade), carrara, sanionyx, vitrolite and similar opaque glass and the laying of all marble tile, terrazzo tile, slate tile and precast tile, steps, risers treads, base, or any other materials that may be used as substitutes for any of the aforementioned materials and which are used on interior and exterior which are installed in a similar manner.

MATERIAL TESTER I: Hand coring and drilling for testing of materials; field inspection of uncured concrete and asphalt.

MATERIAL TESTER II: Field inspection of welds, structural steel, fireproofing, masonry, soil, facade, reinforcing steel, formwork, cured concrete, and concrete and asphalt batch plants; adjusting proportions of bituminous mixtures.

#### OPERATING ENGINEER - BUILDING

Class 1. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task,

the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

#### LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

DUPAGE COUNTY

IRON WORKERS AND FENCE ERECTOR (WEST) - West of Route 53.

The following list is considered as those days for which holiday rates of wages for work performed apply: New Years Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day and Veterans Day in some classifications/counties. Generally, any of these holidays which fall on a Sunday is celebrated on the following Monday. This then makes work performed on that Monday payable at the appropriate overtime rate for holiday pay. Common practice in a given local may alter certain days of celebration. If in doubt, please check with IDOL.

#### EXPLANATION OF CLASSES

ASBESTOS - GENERAL - removal of asbestos material/mold and hazardous materials from any place in a building, including mechanical systems where those mechanical systems are to be removed. This includes the removal of asbestos materials/mold and hazardous materials from ductwork or pipes in a building when the building is to be demolished at the time or at some close future date.

ASBESTOS - MECHANICAL - removal of asbestos material from mechanical systems, such as pipes, ducts, and boilers, where the mechanical systems are to remain.

TRAFFIC SAFETY - work associated with barricades, horses and drums used to reduce lane usage on highway work, the installation and

removal of temporary lane markings, and the installation and removal of temporary road signs.

#### CERAMIC TILE FINISHER

The grouting, cleaning, and polishing of all classes of tile, whether for interior or exterior purposes, all burned, glazed or unglazed products; all composition materials, granite tiles, warning detectable tiles, cement tiles, epoxy composite materials, pavers, glass, mosaics, fiberglass, and all substitute materials, for tile made in tile-like units; all mixtures in tile like form of cement, metals, and other materials that are for and intended for use as a finished floor surface, stair treads, promenade roofs, walks, walls, ceilings, swimming pools, and all other places where tile is to form a finished interior or exterior. The mixing of all setting mortars including but not limited to thin-set mortars, epoxies, wall mud, and any other sand and cement mixtures or adhesives when used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. The handling and unloading of all sand, cement, lime, tile, fixtures, equipment, adhesives, or any other materials to be used in the preparation, installation, repair, or maintenance of tile and/or similar materials. Ceramic Tile Finishers shall fill all joints and voids regardless of method on all tile work, particularly and especially after installation of said tile work. Application of any and all protective coverings to all types of tile installations including, but not be limited to, all soap compounds, paper products, tapes, and all polyethylene coverings, plywood, masonite, cardboard, and any new type of products that may be used to protect tile installations, Blastrac equipment, and all floor scarifying equipment used in preparing floors to receive tile. The clean up and removal of all waste and materials. All demolition of existing tile floors and walls to be re-tiled.

#### COMMUNICATIONS TECHNICIAN

Low voltage installation, maintenance and removal of telecommunication facilities (voice, sound, data and video) including telephone and data inside wire, interconnect, terminal equipment, central offices, PABX, fiber optic cable and equipment, micro waves, V-SAT, bypass, CATV, WAN (wide area networks), LAN (local area networks), and ISDN (integrated system digital network), pulling of wire in raceways, but not the installation of raceways.

#### MARBLE FINISHER

Loading and unloading trucks, distribution of all materials (all stone, sand, etc.), stocking of floors with material, performing all rigging for heavy work, the handling of all material that may be needed for the installation of such materials, building of scaffolding, polishing if needed, patching, waxing of material if damaged, pointing up, caulking, grouting and cleaning of marble, holding water on diamond or Carborundum blade or saw for setters cutting, use of tub saw or any other saw needed for preparation of material, drilling of holes for wires that anchor material set by setters, mixing up of molding plaster for installation of material, mixing up of sand to cement for the installation of material and such other work as may be required in helping a Marble Setter in the handling of all material in the erection or installation of interior marble, slate,

TRUCK DRIVER - BUILDING, HEAVY AND HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION

Class 4. Six axle trucks; Dual-purpose vehicles, such as mounted crane trucks with hoist and accessories; Foreman; Master Mechanic; Self-loading equipment like P.B. and trucks with scoops on the front.

#### TERRAZZO FINISHER

The handling of sand, cement, marble chips, and all other materials that may be used by the Mosaic Terrazzo Mechanic, and the mixing, grinding, grouting, cleaning and sealing of all Marble, Mosaic, and Terrazzo work, floors, base, stairs, and wainscoting by hand or machine, and in addition, assisting and aiding Marble, Masonic, and Terrazzo Mechanics.

#### Other Classifications of Work:

For definitions of classifications not otherwise set out, the Department generally has on file such definitions which are available. If a task to be performed is not subject to one of the classifications of pay set out, the Department will upon being contacted state which neighboring county has such a classification and provide such rate, such rate being deemed to exist by reference in this document. If no neighboring county rate applies to the task, the Department shall undertake a special determination, such special determination being then deemed to have existed under this determination. If a project requires these, or any classification not listed, please contact IDOL at 217-782-1710 for wage rates or clarifications.

#### LANDSCAPING

Landscaping work falls under the existing classifications for laborer, operating engineer and truck driver. The work performed by landscape plantsman and landscape laborer is covered by the existing classification of laborer. The work performed by landscape operators (regardless of equipment used or its size) is covered by the classifications of operating engineer. The work performed by landscape truck drivers (regardless of size of truck driven) is covered by the classifications of truck driver.

#### MATERIAL TESTER & MATERIAL TESTER/INSPECTOR I AND II

Notwithstanding the difference in the classification title, the classification entitled "Material Tester I" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector I". Likewise, the classification entitled "Material Tester II" involves the same job duties as the classification entitled "Material Tester/Inspector II".

There is \$85,000 budgeted in Public Services Department funding (account 2201-7909) for the replacement of the salt shed roof at the Public Services Department. Village staff solicited bid packets to 9 roofing contractors for this service and the bid notice was in circulation of a local newspaper for two weeks before the bid opening. One sealed bid was opened on May 29, 2014 from Funderburk Roofing Inc. in the amount of \$63,000.

Public Services staff has contacted the other 8 vendors to explore reasons for not participating in the bid process for this project. Vendor name and responses are listed in the chart below.





- Burlington Park Parking Lot

During the bidding process eleven contractors picked up bid packets. We estimate eight of these contractors had the potential to be general contractors. On the bid opening date, 04/17/14, only two contractors provided bids: Martam Construction and John Neri Construction. For the first time in 15 bid openings, the construction bids were higher than both the engineer's estimate and Village budget. The costs are listed below:

The result is that the lowest bid is above the Village budget for the project by \$1.1M. Staff recommends that all bids should be rejected. Per the information provided to the Committee during the May EPS meeting, Staff has re-organized the project into smaller projects for re-bidding.
