

Madison County Saving Lives



Madison County Animal Care and Control is recognized for saving more than 4,000 cats and dogs the past four years...

In August, County Board Chairman Kurt Prenzler commended the work of Animal Control manager Katherine Conder and the staff for the success. He presented Conder with a certificate of appreciation for her work in helping to save the county's healthy and adoptable animals.

He also presented certificates of appreciations to Metro East Humane Society and Partner's for Pets. Between the two rescues they have helped save the majority of the cats and dogs brought into animal control.

"Rescuing animals is a lot of hard work," Prenzler said, "When I first took office more than two-thirds of the cats and one-third of the dogs brought in were put down. Now more than 90 percent of the animals are saved."

He said thanks to Conder, the employees and the rescue groups and organizations the county reached its goal to become "no-kill." In March 2017, the County Board Prenzler worked with Ledy VanKavage, a senior legislative attorney with Best Friends Animal Society, on the resolution.

"We've come a long way since the resolution was passed," Prenzler said.

VanKavage agreed.

"I think Madison County reaching nokill before 2021 is due to the strong leadership of the administration," VanKavage said.

She said it shines a "bright light" to other communities on what can be done when people work together.

Conder credits the success due to the work done by rescue groups.

"It takes team effort to do what we do," Conder said. "Without the rescues we wouldn't be able to save lives.

She said policy changes helped the county reach its goal. Animal control increased hold times from three to 10 days: allowed rescue groups and organizations with a U.S. Department of Agriculture license to pick up animals for adoption; implemented a foster kitten and cat program; and worked with a local rescue for its feral cat relocation program, also known as the barn cat program.

"Every healthy dog and cat is finding its way into a home," Conder said. "It's what they deserve."

Jiffpom has 10.7 million followers on Instagram and 21 million on TikTok.



Candy Corn Dog Treats

Ingredients

1-2 small bananas

1 cup plain non-fat yogurt, divided

1/2 cup canned pumpkinsilicon ice cube tray

Directions

- 1. Fill ice cube trays 1/3 full with plain yogurt, then place molds in the freezer. Freeze for 1-2 hours, or until yogurt is set.
- 2. In a small bowl or glass, mix together 1/2 cup yogurt with canned pumpkin.
- 3. Stir until combined, then pour over frozen yogurt in ice cube molds, making sure to leave space at the top for third layer.
- 4. Return to freezer for another 1-2 hours, or until set. Mash banana(s) in a small bowl and stir in any remaining yogurt, then pour over frozen pumpkin layer in mold.
 - 5. Freeze until set.
 - 6. Pop treats out and serve as needed.
