"Rx 4 Safety" update

Sheriff John D. Lakin, in partnership with <u>all</u> the Police Chiefs of Madison County, have collected over 9 tons of prescription and over-the-counter medications. These medications have been disposed of at a federally regulated location, approved by the E.P.A. (Environmental Protection Agency).

This is a collective effort, between the community, Madison County Planning and Development, and law enforcement, to protect the environment from the improper disposal of medications/drugs and also to keep our prescription medications from being ingested accidentally, stolen, or misused.

Secured drop off bins are located at the following Police Departments: Alton, Bethalto, Collinsville, East Alton, Edwardsville, Glen Carbon, Granite City, Highland, Madison County Sheriff's Office, Maryville, Roxana, SIU-E, Troy, and Wood River. These bins were provided by CVS Pharmacy, Republic Waste and the American Water Company.

These drop off locations are available to the citizens 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

These are the items we CAN accept:

Any over the counter medications, vitamins, liquids, narcotics, cough syrup, prescription medicines, hormones, painkillers, antibiotics, ointments, oils, and any unidentified pills.

These are the items we CANNOT accept:

Oxygen tanks, asthma inhalers, mercury thermometers, hearing aids, household waste, and sharps or needles.



On October 27, 2019, the Madison County Sheriff's Office hosted their 3rd Annual Trunk or Treat Event. Volunteers like the Madison County Coroners Office, Alton Volunteer Emergency Corps, Air Evac LifeTeam 156-Madison County, Hersey Midwest Distribution Center, 1st Mid America Credit Union, and the Junior Service Club of Edwardsville/Glen Carbon made this years event a huge success. The Sheriffs Office hosted an estimated 4,000 adults and children this year.





As part of our ongoing commitment to youth, during the Summer of 2019, the Madison County Sheriff's Office hosted its 3rd Annual Police Youth Academy. These week long programs have been developed consisting of both indoor and outdoor activities. The goal of the academy is to promote law enforcement knowledge and strengthen the relationship between police and youth.





NOTEWORTHY INVESTIGATIONS

THE PUBLIC IS REMINDED THAT ALL ARRESTED PERSONS ARE ONLY ACCUSED OF THE CHARGES AGAINST THEM AND ARE PRESUMED INNOCENT UNLESS PROVEN GUILTY IN A COURT OF LAW.

In late January, 2019, a deputy responded to a residence in Granite City regarding shots fired. Individuals living in the area reported hearing approximately 10 gunshots come from outside, then noticed a silver Chevrolet passenger car flee the area. While the deputy inspected the scene, several shell casings were located in the roadway in front of a residence. At the time of the deputy's arrival, that residence was unoccupied. It was, however, determined that there were individuals in several of the bedrooms and a bathroom at the time of the shooting. After the shooting the occupants left the residence. The responding deputy was able to develop leads and the case was referred to detectives. Detectives were able to chase down the leads and establish probable cause for arrests. Christopher A. Cage and Jeffrey D. Fischer were charged with Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm.

March 25, 2019, the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office took a report of a sexual abuse allegation. During that reporting process, the deputy learned that the offense had occurred in Madison County. On March 26th, the case was forwarded to officers in Madison County. The Detectives assigned to the Madison County Sheriff's Cyber Crimes Division began to investigate the case. After investigating the complaint, executing several search warrants, and interviewing all individuals involved or aware of the incident, Gregory S. Emerson of Granite City was arrested for Predatory Criminal Sex Assault and Aggravated Criminal Sex Abuse.

In May of 2019, Triad Middle School Resource Officers became aware of a potential sexual relationship between a student and Triad Middle School teacher, Triad High School Dance Coach, Erin M. Garwood. Detectives, in coordination with School Resource Officers and the Child Advocacy Center, began conducting interviews and investigating the case. It was learned that the teacher involved had not only sent sexually explicit photos of herself to students but had also made advances towards them requesting a sexual relationship. Erin M. Garwood of Edwardsville was arrested for Indecent Solicitation of a Child and Grooming.

May 24, 2019, the Madison County Sheriff's Office was contacted by the Public Defender's Office. Specifically, Kelcie M. Miller had fraudulently posed as an attorney and had provided a fabricated ARDC card (Attorney Registration and Disciplinary Commission). Ms. Miller had handled approximately 80 Felony cases and received \$28,516.80 in salary from Madison County Government, specifically the Public Defender's Office. Detectives investigated the complaint and Kelcie M. Miller was arrested on charges of Theft Over \$10,000, False Personating of an Attorney, and Forgery.

On June 24th, 2019, a promising lead came in regarding a number of vehicle burglaries that had occurred in the Godfrey and Alton areas. The Detective Division was given the lead and without hesitation began working the case. Three suspects were identified almost immediately, two adults and one juvenile. The adults, Roman N. Thomeczek of Godfrey and Walker S. Moan of Alton, were charged with Burglary. The investigating detectives then escorted the suspects around the Godfrey and Alton areas and had them pin point locations they had burglarized vehicles. This painstaking task led to clearing an estimated 100 vehicle burglaries.

September 15, 2019, deputies were dispatched to a call for shots fired. The caller reported hearing four to five gunshots and seeing a dark four door car fleeing the area. Moments later, dispatch received a call that a vehicle, matching the description of the one involved in the shooting, had struck a residence and a male had fled from the accident. Upon arrival to the original call, deputies learned the entire family was in the residence, including children, at the time of the shooting. After the suspects crashed the vehicle into the residence, two of the three fled on foot. Deputies searched the area but were met with negative results. Fortunately, no one in either residence was injured. Deputies created a field report of the incident and the Detective Division was assigned the case. After conducting several interviews and a thorough review of the evidence, Detectives were able to identify all the suspects involved in the shooting and crash. The investigation resulted in the arrest of two juveniles and one adult, Noel Gonzalez of Collinsville. The adult was charged with Aggravated Discharge of a Firearm.

September 20, 2019, deputies were dispatched to a residence in New Douglas regarding an individual attempting to gain entry to an occupied residence. While deputies were in route, the suspect left the residence and deputies were now looking for a black Dodge Charger. Detectives in the area, on a non-related matter, were able to catch up to the Dodge Charger and initiate a traffic stop. Upon approaching the vehicle, detectives noticed the driver of the vehicle to be former Livingston Police Officer Scott A. Meyer. At that time, the 2 occupants of the vehicle were asked to step out of the car and were placed in hand restraints while detectives determined the details of the incident that had occurred in New Douglas. While speaking with the passenger of the vehicle, detectives noticed the odor of cannabis emitting from the vehicle. As a result the vehicle was searched while both occupants remained with deputies. Several traffic complaint books, report books, tow reports (both blank and completed), and misdemeanor citations from various police departments were located, along with two flash drives and a porcelain dish with a white powder residue. The residue on the dish tested positive for Methamphetamine. Scott A. Meyer was charged with Unlawful Possession of Methamphetamine.

Mid October 2019, several burglaries were reported in the north end of Madison County. After Sheriff's Office Deputies handled the initial calls for service, the cases were referred to the Detective Division and Bethalto Police Department. After working the case for a few weeks, detectives developed a lead when they learned items, that were among those stolen, had been pawned or posted for sale. Colton R. McGaughey and Brittany G. Hamlin were arrested for Burglary. After making the arrest detectives from the Madison County Sheriff's Office and the Bethalto Police Department were able to recover several thousand dollars' worth of stolen items along with three stolen firearms.

October 25, 2019, Deputies handled a theft report. Specifically, the complaint stemmed from several thefts that had occurred at a local resource center for individuals with developmental disabilities. Throughout the previous weeks, an employee discovered some discrepancies in several of their residents check books. When they began to look more closely at the situation, it appeared an employee was stealing money from all 23 residents located in three separate group centers. The police venues for these facilities were Alton, Wood River, and Madison County Sheriff's Office. The resource center made contact with the Office of the Inspector General, deputies made contact with the Detective Division of the Madison County Sheriff's Office, and coordinated efforts between the four agencies began. It was learned that the suspect, Andrea R. Schultz of Granite City, had been stealing from the residents from January 1, 2019 through October 24, 2019. Upon completing the investigation, Andrea R. Schultz was arrested and charged with 22 counts of Unlawful Financial Exploitation of a Disabled Person and 22 counts of Theft of Property by Deception.

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MADISON COUNTY JAIL 2019 INSPECTION REPORT

Criminal Justice Specialist Dianne Fritschle inspected the Madison County Jail on November 19, 2019. Entrance and exit interviews were conducted with Captain Eales and Captain Ridings.

IMPROVEMENTS SINCE LAST INSPECTION

- 1. A new body scanner was installed in the jail.
- 2. Additional surveillance cameras have been installed.
- 3. Two new AED's have been purchased for the jail.
- 4. The kitchen has been renovated with a new range hood and fire suppression system, a commercial refrigerator and a new steam table.
- 5. Detainee medical care is now provided through a contracted organization.
- 6. A new emergency generator has been installed.
- 7. A new "fire coded" door was installed in the female area of the jail.
- 8. An ADA approved shower was installed in one area of the jail.
- 9. An AFIX verifier (thumb scanner) has been installed in both male and female booking areas.
- 10. Additional commissary items have been placed on the commissary list.
- 11. Major renovations are currently underway to repair/replace electrical wiring and plumbing throughout the jail.
