Well Child Checks Essential for Good Health

When I was a student at GHS, we used to talk about getting 'physicals' every year. Nowadays, these visits are often called well child check-ups. The truth is, older children tend to see their healthcare provider only when they are sick and these visits tend to be focused on illness and not on prevention. Well child check-ups have that prevention focus and are designed to help kids stay healthy for a lifetime. These visits should take place once a year between the ages of 2 and 20.

The Gwinn Teen Clinic offers well child check-ups all year long. During these visits, your child will have their growth and development assessed, have a physical exam including hearing and vision screening, receive education about nutrition, exercise and safety and be counseled about tobacco, substance use and other risky behaviors. Clinic staff will also provide any needed immunizations. Parents are invited to participate in these visits and to bring along any questions they have about their child's health. Sports physical forms may also be completed at these visits.

The GTC staff wants to help your child stay healthy for a lifetime. To schedule an appointment for your child's yearly well visit, call the GTC at (906) 372-4002, Monday through Friday. And remember, the clinic will be open all summer long for your child's healthcare needs.

Why Try

Some students ask the question, "Why Try?". Students who can't find the answer to this question are less likely to put forth the effort needed to achieve success in their life. This program poses the question "Why Try?" then provides the answer: for opportunity, freedom, and self-respect. The Why Try program is a strength-based approach to helping students overcome their challenges and improve outcomes in the areas of truancy, behavior, and academics. Nearly 1.3 million students in the U.S. drop out of school each year. Students participating in Why Try were three times more likely to graduate. Part of Why Try's mission is to help students overcome their obstacles and make it to graduation day.

The Gwinn Teen Clinic is excited about bringing the Why Try program to Gwinn High School and Gwinn Middle School. Students participating will be referred by High School Principal, Kevin Luokkala, Middle School Principal, Jackie Cole, and Gwinn Schools Social Worker, Nicole Lackey.

HPV

The HPV vaccine can help protect boys and girls from developing certain cancers as adults... Like cervical, head, and neck cancers. The vaccine is recommended for both boys and girls beginning at age 11.

Why vaccinate against HPV at 11-12 years of age?

- The vaccine produces better immunity to fight infection when given at younger ages, compared with older ones.
- Most men and women will contract at least one HPV in their lifetime.
