PFAS INFORMATION

On August 4, 2018, the State of Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued a "do not eat" advisory for fish in the Huron River due to the detection of a class of substances known as PFAS (perfluoroal-kyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances). This advisory was updated several times, including in September to reflect an advisory regarding PFAS related foam in the Huron River.



As part of the State of Michigan's PFAS response, the Village drinking water supply was tested by the State on June 14, 2018. This test, and another conducted by the Village on the same date, indicated a

result of "non-detect", meaning that no PFAS related substances were found in the Village of Milford public drinking water system. While the State has not yet issued any requirements for further testing, the Village will continue to conduct tests on its own as a precautionary measure.

Village Building Update - Fall 2018

The Union Square residential project by Robertson Brothers is in the final stages of completion. All lots, 24 in total, now have structures and the site should be completed by this spring, if not sooner. Heritage Ridge, the residential development located off of S. Milford Road containing 16 detached units has 5 units at various stages of completion. Uptown Milford, a revived residential project on the north end of town where new attached townhomes are being constructed, has begun the construction of a 5-unit building. They will have two more buildings to construct containing 18 units. The Marquette, a 100-unit apartment complex located between E. Huron and Oakland Streets, has their elevator shafts completed and have begun framing for the buildings at this time.

On the commercial side of construction the foundation has been installed for 160 S. Milford Road, the former Big Boy location. The building is set up to have three tenants and one of the tenants, believed to be a Starbucks, will have a drive—thru. The two story structure located at 310 N. Main is taking shape. All of the exterior walls are up and the roof is on. The next steps to take place are to complete the façade and to try to get the interior sealed up so that work can continue through the winter. At the time of this writing no tenants have been identified.

Winter Reminders In The Village

- *No Parking on Village Streets* Parking on Village streets is prohibited from December 1 to March 1 between 3 a.m. and 6 a.m. Violators will be ticketed.
- **Snow Removal** Property owners are responsible for clearing snow and ice on sidewalks which adjoin their property. Snow must be removed with 48 hours of snowfall. The Village will arrange for removal if not done and bill the property owner.
- **Snowbirds** If you are off to warmer weather this winter don't forget to call the Water Department to have your water turned off and/or give us your away address for billing. You can contact Sandy at 248-684-1515 or email sandys@villageofmilford.org.
- *Water Billing* To avoid estimated bills please keep a path cleared to the remote outside so we can read the meter.

Package Delivery Security



With more people shopping online for the holidays and carriers leaving deliveries by front doors, package theft is a serious problem.

Nearly 20 percent of homeowners surveyed across the country reported having a package stolen last year, with an average loss of \$140. And as you might expect, the most likely time for theft to occur is during the holiday season, the survey found.

But there are steps you can take to protect your holiday package deliveries from so-called porch pirates.

- Use security cameras. You can install them inside and outside your home, allowing you to watch your property from anywhere and record any activity. This would include something as simple and inexpensive as video doorbells. And if the cameras are visible, they might deter thieves from stealing your deliveries in the first place.
- Give instructions to the package delivery service. Some services let you indicate where to leave your package if you're not home. With most services you can instruct drivers to leave a package at a back or side door not visible from the roadway.
- Have packages delivered to where someone is. Use a delivery address such as your place of work or make arrangements for delivery to a neighbor who stays home.
- Sign up for alerts. Some carriers offer text or email alerts so that you know when a delivery will be made. If you aren't home, you might be able to get back in time so that your package isn't left outside for
- Require a signature for delivery. And last, ask retailers to require a signature to make a delivery so that packages aren't simply dropped off outside a house.

These are just a few suggestions from the Milford Police Department that will help us keep our community free from theft.

Vaping Is Not A Safe Alternative For Tobacco



Since its debut, the e-cigarette/vaping industry has been pushing its products as less dangerous than traditional cigarettes. This message has spread to adolescents: researchers have found that teens who persing as less harmful than regular cigarettes

ceive vaping as less harmful than regular cigarettes are more likely to use these products.

Why is Vaping a Problem?

Many kids would not smoke a traditional cigarette thanks to widespread public health campaigns about the health risks of smoking. These campaigns have informed teens and the general public about the health consequences of smoking, especially their link to various cancers, cardiac and respiratory diseases. Since the perception that vaping is safer and therefore does not carry the same consequences, teens may be willing to expose themselves to nicotine in this form, increasing their risk for nicotine dependence. Studies show teens tend to underestimate their risk for getting addicted and overestimate their ability to quit once addicted



Don't forget...

There is no parking on Village streets from December 1 - March 1 between 3 a.m. and 6 a.m.

Furthermore, there is no conclusive evidence that vaping mechanisms are safe. Many experts believe that because they are not combustible, the carcinogens that are present in tobacco smoke will not be created in vapor. However, studies found that high-voltage vaping products can produce carcinogens.

The E-Cigarette Industry Targets Kids

In recent years vaping product companies have employed many of the same marketing tactics as the big tobacco companies. Television ads, celebrity endorsements, flashy displays and free samples featuring the product are once again common. These advertisements glamorize an addiction-promoting product and make it all the more appealing to young people. Additionally, vapes are available in over 7,000 flavors, with new flavors being released each month. Even tobacco companies admit that these options are likely to attract teens to the product.

It is now Illegal for Stores to sell to Underage Kids

The Village and Township of Milford have both enacted ordinances that make it illegal for retailers to sell vaping products to persons under the age of 18yrs. Additionally, it is illegal for any underage person to possess these same products. Let's work together to keep Milford's youth healthy and safe. Educate your children on the dangers of Vaping.

Maple Tar Spot Fungus

For the last three years Michigan has seen an increase in the outbreak of Tar Spot Fungus. While the fungus does not threaten the health of the tree it does make the tree unsightly. The most effective way to manage this is to make sure all leaves are raked and destroyed in the fall.


