Home Security 101 - Since theft is at the top of the list of crimes for most all cities here is some information that may be of help to you and your family.

Have you taken inventory lately? Even our households need to have an "inventory" from time to time. Not necessarily to see how much is expended, (that could be depressing!) but to know what and where the items of value are in our home in the event of a theft, fire or other disaster.

The home inventory is your opportunity to take a "tour" of your home and prepare a list of everything of value (or you be update your

current listing) so that if something would happen you could provide law enforcement and insurance providers with details of every item that is stolen or damaged.

Create a list that will include the following pieces of information for every item of value in your home, such as: Location of item, Make (who manufactured it), Model (name and number), Color, other descriptive items, Purchase amount and Serial number.

Now, take out your phone, camera or video and take pictures/video of each of those items. This will assist greatly in proving replacement an

identifying the items if they were found or recovered. Make a photocopy of your list/photos and keep one copy at home in a safe location and the other at a location other than your home (in case your home is lost in a disaster).

WASTEWATER TREATMENT PLANT UPDATES

The April summary of activities for the construction of the Wastewater Treatment Plant Improvements was submitted mid May. You can find the complete report on the City's website. www.cityofsutherlin.com

General Contractor, Tapani, Inc., says that 57% of the project has been completed on time. They have sub-contractors working for them, as well as having a Tester and Special Inspector, and a Concrete Supplier to round out the team so far.

Quite a bit of progress was made on the new Control Building Electrical Room, the SBR or Sequential Batch Reactors, and the Control Building.

SBR means they are a type of activated sludge process for the treatment of wastewater. SBR reactors treat wastewater such as sewage or output from anaerobic digesters or mechanical biological treatment facilities in batches.

They completed the wooden wall and roof framing for the new blower and the electrical rooms in the new Control Room. They also completed placement of formwork, rebar and concrete for the blower equipment pads within the new Blower Room.

FORD'S POND

The Friends of Ford's Pond is coordinating the first Oak Savanna Restoration project that a city has undertaken in Oregon. A United States Fish & Wildlife Service-Partners for Fish and Wildlife Grant of \$25,000 is in place for the project.

This week Phoenix School's Youth Corp came out from Roseburg to clear brush in preparation for a 50-acre controlled burn along the western hillside this fall.

Our thanks to Phoenix School for partnering with us on the project. Also, a tip of the hat to our board president, Jim Houseman, board member, Geoffrey Faraghan, and our new volunteer, Tony, for handling the heavy equipment used in cutting down the undergrowth.

What is an Oak Savanna?

A savanna is generally defined as a plant community where trees are a component but where their density is "...so low that it allows grasses and other herbaceous vegetation to become the actual dominants of the community." (Curtis, *The Vegetation of Wisconsin*). Savannas are found throughout the world, but the dominant trees differ. In North America, a major type of savanna has oaks as the principal trees. Three major areas of oak savanna in North America are found: 1) California and Oregon on the west coast; 2) Arizona, New Mexico, and Mexico in the southwest; and 3) the Midwestern United States. This web site deals exclusively with Midwestern oak savannas, of which many restorable sites exist. Oak savannas in the Midwest are most commonly found in a climatic zone intermediate between woodland and prairie, which is often called the prairie/forest border.

Savannas are often defined in terms of the openness of the tree canopy. Thus, the upper limit between savanna and forest is generally considered to be a tree canopy with 50% coverage. Therefore, if more than one-half of the ground area is in the sun at noon in midsummer, the vegetation is classed as a savanna. If the canopy has greater than 50% tree canopy coverage, the vegetation is called a woodland or forest. The lower canopy coverage,

between savanna and prairie, is generally considered to be 10% tree coverage, although these upper and lower limits are only approximate. Another term sometimes used as equivalent to oak savanna is "oak opening", which refers to the open-grown characteristic of the trees. Early travelers in the Midwest remarked at the "park-like" character of the vegetation. Some alternate terms occasionally used to describe a savanna-like setting are barren, brush prairie, glade, and open woodland.



The Friends of Ford's Pond is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit working with the City of Sutherlin, Oregon, to develop and maintain a community park on the 202-acre Ford's Pond Property.

We recently were awarded a \$5,000 grant from the C. Giles Hunt Charitable Foundation, which will be used for trail improvements in 2019.

Join our Monday Walkers! We meet at the Church Rd parking area at 9 a.m. Rain or shine. Dress for the weather and in winter expect muddy conditions. Updates are posted on our Facebook page, @FriendsofFordsPond.

Our volunteers continue to care for the property by mowing the 1.7-mile perimeter path and the 1-mile hillside loop, in addition to trash pickup and removal. Please help keep Ford's Pond clean and carry out all trash and pick up after your pets. We provide pet waste bags for your use at all three entrances.



FIRE FIGHTERS CARE Donate Blood

Assistant Chief – Roseburg Fire Department
Message from: Merrill Gonterman



A little background on our family. I am a second-generation firefighter; I have been a professional Oregon firefighter for the last 35 years. February 3rd, 2018 our oldest daughter went to the urgent care in Bend with what seemed like a cold and fever. She was also 26 weeks pregnant with our first grandchild. Our daughter's boyfriend called us at about 2AM in the morning to let us know that they were 70% sure she had some type of Leukemia, they were giving her blood transfusions and would be moving her by air ambulance to OHSU first thing in the morning. When we arrived at OHSU ICU that morning, she looked normal. By midnight, her condition turned worse, the Doctors told us they were doing everything they could but did not think she would make it much longer. She was unconscious, intubated and had about 6 IV's flowing into her. Her skin had become mottled with blood pooling under her skin everywhere, her organs and even the whites of her eyes. She had bleeding in her brain and her kidneys were overwhelmed. Along with constant blood transfusions, she needed dialysis almost daily. We were not sure for almost a week if she was going to live. After four weeks in the ICU, they began monitoring the baby. Somehow, with everything she had been through, the baby was not harmed. She stayed in the ICU a total of six weeks and another month at the Cancer Center. During this time, she required over 40 blood transfusions and almost as many blood products. To put it into perspective, 40 units is equal to 5 gallons of blood. April 11th, 2018 our first grandson, Jennon was born and Hannah was released from the Hospital.

The bottom line, you are never done as a parent. I have been giving assistance to the population as my fulltime job. It is now time that I give back to the community without reward. I started giving blood in August 2017 prior to our daughter's plight and been giving blood and blood products since then, as soon as I am able. Please give blood. I was amazed at the amount of blood and blood products our daughter went through. Talking to the OHSU ICU staff, they get someone with Leukemia nearly once a week and they require a large amount of blood products for the chance to survive.

Remember to:


- Close your bedroom door when sleeping

Grilling Safety

There's nothing like outdoor grilling. It's one of the most popular ways to cook food. But, a grill placed too close to anything that can burn is a fire hazard. They can be very hot, causing burn injuries. Follow these simple tips and you will be on the way to safe grilling.

SAFETY TIPS

- Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should only be used outdoors.
- The grill should be placed well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches.
- Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area.
- Keep your grill clean by removing grease or fat buildup from the grills and in trays below the grill.
- Never leave your grill unattended.
- Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

CHARCOAL GRILLS

- There are several ways to get the charcoal ready to use. Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper as a fuel.
- If you use a starter fluid, use only charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire.
- Keep charcoal fluid out of the reach of children and away from heat sources.
- There are also electric charcoal starters, which do not use fire. Be sure to use an extension cord for outdoor use.
- When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.


PROPANE Grills

Check the gas tank hose for leaks before using it for the first time each year. Apply a light soap and water solution to the hose. A propane leak will release bubbles. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off both the gas tank and the grill. If the leak stops, get the grill serviced by a professional before using it again. If the leak does not stop, call the fire department. **If you smell gas while cooking, immediately get away from the grill and call the fire department.** Do not move the grill.

If the flame **goes out**, turn the grill and gas off and wait at least **5 minutes** before re-lighting it.

FACTS

- ! July is the peak month for grill fires.
- ! Roughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns.

SUTHERLIN LIBRARY ANNIVERSARY


Sutherlin C. Giles Hunt Library celebrated their 2nd Anniversary of operation as an independent library no longer connected with the County. Below is an article written by Rachael McDonald from KLCC Radio.

It's been just over 2 years since Douglas County Commissioners closed their public library system citing lack of funding. But one of its libraries never closed thanks to determined volunteers.

The C. Giles Hunt Memorial Library in Sutherlin is operated by the City. The library runs with mostly volunteers. Pat Lynch, Library Director, is the one part-time staff member. He says the library in the community of just over 8 thousand people is doing well. "There are days when it's just madness in here and there are days when it's quiet. But, what that amounts to is probably somewhere around 50-80 people a day. For a library in a town our size we're pretty busy but we're serving a large geographic area." Lynch says the library is open 4 days a week and anyone in Douglas County can get a card.

The library has 3 new initiatives coming this summer: the Hunt Research Center—an online research center for Douglas County. Book share for those in care: books delivered to child and adult care facilities. And they will be joining the Dolly Parton Imagination Library soon also.

The Sutherlin Library celebrated 2 years as an independent entity recently with a Spring Fiesta Open House. The event was from 3:30 to 5:30 at the library, 210 E. Central Avenue, Sutherlin, Oregon. The celebration was well attended.
