

• Resolution 2024.05 – Workforce Housing & Homelessness Task Force

Staff Report --Gillham, deferred discussion to Livability Services Director, Pat Lynch.

- The Task Force is charged with looking at housing landscape in our city and solutions for homelessness.
- Working with the Governor's task force iSector that works on projects like this.
- We want everybody in the neighborhood to be involved.
- Workforce housing is a mixed model of rental and home ownership. There are roughly 20 different state and federal agencies that aid both financially and programmatically, but they all have different rules, regulations, and guidelines in terms of how many people, what income groups, etc. From Senate Bill 1530 we received a significant grant to kick start this project.
 - Councilor Hamilton —Will you mention some of the agencies that are involved in the Task Force? HADCO (housing agency for the county), UCAN, Aviva Health, Sutherlin School District, Evergreen Family Medicine, and other major employers.
 - Councilor Groussman, clarified that Resolution 2024.05 is to create the Task Force. The Task Force has a dual purpose: Workforce Housing and homelessness. Yes, however it may end up being a combined committee.
 - Mayor Sumner, asked for an introduction of Task Force members. Gillham introduced Mary Gilbert, Gail Kuntz, and Rodney Linton. Members not present are Nicole Bennett and Maryann Anderson.

<u>MOTION</u> made by Councilor Whitaker to approve Resolution 2024.05 – Workforce Housing & Homelessness Task Force as presented; second by Councilor Hamilton.

This grant is for improvements to Waite Street including: a wider street, multi-use pathway, storm, gutters, crosswalks, curbs, pedestrian bridge, and a flashing beacon within the existing right-of-way to create a safe route to school for children.

• Resolution 2024.08 – ORS 105.668 Recreational Immunity

Staff Report – Finance Director, Tami Trowbridge – Deferred to City Attorney, Chad Jacobs, explained that the City must opt-in to take advantage of the recreational immunity statue. This will limit the liability of cities for personal injury and property damage that arises out of the public's non-motorized use of trails or structures in public easements and unimproved rights-of-way. This resolution will provide the City with more protection.

MOTION made by Councilor Whitaker to approve Resolution 2024.08 – ORS 105.668 Recreational Immunity as presented; second by Councilor Groussman.

- Sheri Esterbrook Requested streetlights be placed on Hawthorne St., Eddy St., and Johnson St., stating safety concerns. And asked that council consider installing a fence at the end of Hawthorne to deter transient traffic.
- Sharon Elliott Asked for a grocery store west of town. Informed Gillham and Mayor about Aldi Grocery Stores. Thanked Gillham for reaching out to them.
- Terry Brock Sutherlin Throwdown was successful enough last year that it will be happening again. \$20,000 in scholarships will be available to people wanting to go into trades or vo-tech schools. A brandnew rodeo board has been developed. The plan is to bring the rodeo back even if we must contract it out for a couple of years. The hope is to get groups, volunteer organizations, city staff and governing bodies together and try to figure out a way to improve the rodeo grounds. Terry encouraged anyone wanting to help reach out to him.
- Karen Meier (via Zoom), wanted clarification on the \$2.85 million dollar grant.
 - Lynch The grant came out of Senate Bill 1530 in the short session and Sutherlin was granted money for housing projects. The City was notified last week.

WHAT IS BEING ASKED OF COUNCIL?

This is a public hearing for Resolution 2024.09 for interested parties to speak regarding the proposed changes to the fiscal year 2023-24 budget. After the hearing, Council is being asked to consider approving Resolution 2024.09 to adopt the Supplemental Budget Adjustment for fiscal year 2023-24 as described herein.

EXPLANATION

At the time that the budget was prepared, there was no indication from Business Oregon that there would be an opportunity to begin interest payments on the Non Pareil Water Plant Upgrade loan prior to final on the construction. At the first of the year, our loan specialist reached out to us, letting us know that this option was available. An adjustment to the budget is needed to be able to make this payment.

RESOLUTION NO. 2024.09

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING A SUPPLEMENTAL BUDGET ADJUSTMENT, AMENDING THE 2023-2024 BUDGET

The City Council of Sutherlin finds that:

- **A.** That ORS 294.473 provides the procedures for public governing bodies to adopt supplemental budget adjustments when estimated expenditures differ by more than ten percent from the expenditures in the budget as most recently amended prior to the supplemental budget.
- **B.** The procedure includes the municipal corporation providing notice of a supplemental budget adjustment hearing and holding a public hearing on the supplemental budget adjustment prior to adopting a resolution to change the budget by more than ten percent.
- **C.** Public notice has been provided as required by ORS 294.473 and a public hearing related to the supplemental budget adjustment was held on April 8, 2024, and
- **D.** Due to unforeseen events at the time of adoption, fiscal year 2023-24 budget requires adjustment including but not limited to the following:
 - a. Water Debt Service Fund
 - i. At the time the budget was prepared, there was no indication that there would be an opportunity to begin interest payments on the NonPareil Water Treatment Plant Upgrade construction loan. Our loan specialist has offered us this option. This Budget Adjustment is necessary to appropriate the funds for this new interest only payment before the end of the fiscal year.

NOW, THEREFORE, based upon the above findings,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SUTHERLIN, a municipal Corporation of the State of Oregon, as follows:

Section 1. That the budget for the City of Sutherlin for the fiscal year 2023 - 2024, which was adopted by the City Council on June 12, 2023 and is now on file in the office of the City Recorder of the City of Sutherlin, be hereby amended as follows:

WHAT IS BEING ASKED OF COUNCIL?

Approve Ordinance 1096 – Amending SMC Ch. 2.05.050 – Public Comment at City Council meetings (second reading & adoption); to provide clarity within the council rules regarding public comment procedures during council meetings.

EXPLANATION

State law requires virtual access to Council meetings, including providing the ability to provide public comments online if public comment is permitted in-person. Council rules were never updated to implement these provisions of state law. In addition, multiple jurisdictions have experienced disruptions to their meetings from individuals engaging in virtual public comments.

Ordinance 1096 amends the Council rules to create procedures to allow for virtual public participation as well as to provide general guidance as to the scope of permissible public comments. These changes generally reflect current practices but "codify" those practices to provide greater clarification for Council, staff and the public.

ORDINANCE NO. 1096

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.05.050 OF THE SUTHERLIN UTHERLIN MUNICIPAL CODE. RELATED TO PUBLIC COMMENT AT CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS

WHEREAS, Sutherlin Municipal Code contains the rules of procedure for City Council meetings; and

WHEREAS, the Council desires to update the rules of procedure related to public comment.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF SUTHERLIN ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 2.05.050 of the Sutherlin Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

2.05.050 Duties of meeting chair and public comment.

A. The Mayor shall chair all meetings of the Council. In the absence of the Mayor, the Council President shall act as Mayor Pro-Tem and chair the meeting. In the absence of both the Mayor and Council President, the City Recorder shall call the meeting to order whereby a temporary presiding officer (chair) shall then be elected by the members of Council present.

B. The chair shall keep the meeting in order and impose any reasonable restrictions necessary for efficient and orderly conduct. The chair may modify the order of business on the agenda rather than follow the agenda as published. The chair shall preserve order and decorum, prevent attacks on personalities and confine members in debate to the question under discussion. The chair shall state all questions submitted for vote and announce the results.

C. The chair shall have the prerogative to set guidelines for public hearings and audience participation *in a manner consistent with these rules*. If public participation is to be a part of the meeting, the chair may regulate the order and length of appearances and limit appearances to presentations of relevant points. In exercising such duties, the chair shall impose restrictions in a uniform manner so that all persons seeking to appear before the Council shall have an equal amount of time to do so; provided, that the chair may afford additional time to any speaker as necessary for the Council to receive relevant information. The chair may request that groups with similar comments choose a spokesperson to present joint remarks and provide the spokesperson with additional time. When receiving public request, testimony and evidence, the chair shall rule on the admissibility and propriety of such request, testimony and evidence.

D. Citizen and community group testimony forms will be available at each meeting and shall be filled out and handed to the City Recorder. At the time on the agenda designated for public comment and during any public hearing, any member of the public desiring to address the Council must first request to be recognized by the chair and then state his or her name for the record.

<u>E. Public comment during City Council meetings is not an absolute right.</u> Rather, the City Council permits public comment only for the limited purposes of hearing from the public about matters

directly related to the business of the City that is within the Council's jurisdiction. The public comment period is a limited public forum and comments are therefore appropriately limited to matters of concern, official action, or deliberation which are or may come before City Council. The City Council is not creating an opportunity for and will not accept public comment on matters that fall outside the scope of the Council's jurisdiction, such as employment issues related to employees and officers who are not appointed or supervised by Council. During public hearings, all public comment must relate to the specific matter under discussion. All public comments must be addressed to the City Council as a body.

F, Public comment must not unduly interfere with the City Council's ability to conduct business or otherwise disrupt City Council meetings. Comments that substantially interrupt, delay, or disturb the peace and good order of the proceedings of the City Council are not permitted. Examples of such types of comments include shouting, use of profanity or vulgarity, or speaking outside of allotted time or without first being recognized by the chair. In addition, public comment may not be used for belligerent or abusive behavior including true threats, fighting words, or incitements to imminent lawless action. Abusive and harassing comments that could lead to the creation of a hostile work environment for City employees required to attend City Council meetings likewise unduly interferes with the Council's ability to conduct its business and are therefore prohibited. The City Council requests that all public comment is provided in a manner that is respectful to those in attendance at the meeting.

G. Public comment may be provided to the Council either orally or in writing. Individual and community group testimony forms will be available at each regular business meeting and must be filled out prior to providing public comment orally. Individual and community groups desiring to provide public comment virtually, must register with the City Recorder by 3:00 pm the day of the meeting and provide their name, email, phone, and a general topic. Written comments may be provided to the City Recorder either in advance of or during the Council meeting, although it is possible that the City Council may not be able to read written comments provided during a meeting until after the meeting has concluded.

<u>HE</u>. Upon councilor Motion and a second thereof, decisions of the chair described in the above Subsections B and C may be appealed to a vote of the Council.</u>

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect 30 days after it is approved by the Mayor

WHAT IS BEING ASKED OF COUNCIL?						

The City Council is being asked to hold a public hearing for the procurement method of Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) Services for the Seismic Rehabilitation project of the Sutherlin Fire Station #1 and Sutherlin Police Department.

EXPLANATION

The city was awarded seismic grants, for the Seismic Rehabilitation of the Sutherlin Fire Station #1, in the amount of \$2,492,700 and for the Seismic Rehabilitation of the Sutherlin Police Department, in the amount of \$2,479,180.

The purpose of the grant is to seismically retrofit the Sutherlin Police and Fire Station buildings to meet or exceed the code requirements outlined in ASCE 41-17. It was determined during the initial grant application that the building would be renovated during the rehabilitation work as permitted by budget. All renovated areas will increase Life and Safety elements.

A notice of public hearing was published in the Daily Journal of Commerce on March 25, 2024, for review of the proposed findings of fact for the CM/GC Procurement Method.

This Project is limited to the funding outlined in the grant package; additional funding is not available. It is recommended to procure the Project using the CM/GC contracting methodology as outlined in the findings. ORS 279C.332(3) identifies the CM/GC methodology as an alternative contracting method under ORS 279C.335, which allows a contracting agency to procure construction related services that include, among other things listed in ORS 279C.332(3), a construction manager/general contractor (a) functioning as a member of a project team that includes the City of Sutherlin, the Project Architect or Engineer and other consultants, (b) reviewing and analyzing the project design in order to suggest changes to minimize potential errors, delays, unexpected costs and other problems during construction, (c) estimating construction, materials, labor and other costs for the Project, (d) establishing a fixed price, a guaranteed price or other maximum price for the Project, (e) constructing portions of the Project and subcontracting portions to other contractors, and (f) coordinating and overseeing the construction process. In this Project, the CM/GC contract allows the City of Sutherlin to bring the General Contractor on board during the initial design phase providing value engineering services and a Guaranteed Maximum

Price during the design phase in lieu of during the bid phase after full design documents have been established.

ORS 279C.335 (1) requires, with certain exceptions, that all Public Improvement contracts be based on competitive bids and, under ORS 279C.375, awarded to the lowest responsive and responsible bidder. ORS 279C.335(2) permits the Local Contract Review Board, which in this case is the **City of Sutherlin**, to grant, under certain conditions, specific exemptions from the requirement for competitive bidding upon the approval of specified findings.

OAR 137-049-0620(1), allows the Local Contract Review Board to exempt a Public Improvement contract from the requirements to be competitively bid, provided written findings supporting the use of non-competitive bid process show compliance with OAR 137-049-0600 to 137-049-0690 and applicable statute.

The hearing for review of these findings will be held at 7:00 PM on April 8th, 2024 at the Sutherlin Civic Auditorium located at 175 E Everett Ave, as published in the public notice section in the Daily Journal of Commerce on March 25th, 2024.

Article I. BACKGROUND

City of Sutherlin received a grant through Oregon's Seismic Rehabilitation Grant program for a total value of **\$4,971,880**. The purpose of the grant is to seismically retrofit the **Sutherlin Police and Fire Station** buildings to meet or exceed the code requirements outlined in ASCE 41-17. It was determined during the initial grant application that the building would be renovated during the rehabilitation work as permitted by budget. All renovated areas will increase Life and Safety elements.

This Project is limited to the funding outlined in the grant package, additional funding is not available. The current budget does not reflect a contingency typically allotted for a project of this size and scope. It is the recommendation of the **City of Sutherlin** to procure the Project using the CM/GC contracting methodology. ORS 279C.332(3) identifies the CM/GC methodology as an alternative contracting method under ORS 279C.335, which allows a contracting agency to procure construction related services that include, among other things listed in ORS 279C.332(3), a construction manager/general contractor (a) functioning as a member of a project team that includes the **City of Sutherlin**, the Project Architect or Engineer and other consultants, (b) reviewing and analyzing the project design in order to suggest changes to minimize potential errors, delays, unexpected costs and other problems during construction,

(c) estimating construction, materials, labor and other costs for the Project, (d) establishing a fixed price, a guaranteed price or other maximum price for the Project, (e) constructing portions of the Project and subcontracting portions to other contractors, and (f) coordinating and overseeing the construction process. In this Project, the CM/GC contract allows the **City of Sutherlin** to bring the General Contractor on board during the initial design phase providing value engineering services and a Guaranteed Maximum Price during the design phase in lieu of during the bid phase after full design documents have been established.

The **City of Sutherlin** proposes utilizing the Construction Manager/General Contractor contract delivery methodology to obtain proposals for the **Sutherlin Police and Fire Station Retrofits**.

The exempted procurement process for this Project includes the following:

1) A Request for Proposals (RFP) process pursuant to OAR 137-049-0640 to procure a CM/GC contract with a general contractor.

Article II. FINDINGS REGARDING PROCUREMENT OF CM/GC SERVICES

ORS 279C.335(2) requires that an agency make certain findings as part of exempting public improvement contracts or classes of public improvement contracts from competitive bidding, as is the case with the procurement of CM/GC services. Pursuant to ORS 279C.330(2), the term "findings" as used in ORS 279C.335(2) means "the justification for a conclusion that a contracting agency, in seeking an exemption from the competitive bidding requirement of ORS 279C.335(1), reaches based on the considerations set forth in ORS 279C.335(2). Those required findings, generally defined as "findings regarding competition" and "findings regarding significant cost savings", are addressed below.

A. Findings Regarding Competition

ORS 279C.335(2) (a) requires an agency to find that: "It is unlikely that the exemption will encourage favoritism in the awarding of public improvement contractors or substantially diminish competition for public improvement contracts."

The **City of Sutherlin** finds that selecting the contractor through an exempted competitive proposal selection process in accordance with OAR 125-249-0620 and 125-249-0630 will not inhibit competition or encourage favoritism. This finding is supported by the following facts:

1) The proposed CM/GC alternative contract delivery methodology is a competitive proposal process that allows the **City of Sutherlin** to select a firm to Seismically Rehabilitate **Sutherlin Police and Fire Stations** at the best possible value. Simple price competition is not feasible due to technical complexity associated with a seismic rehabilitation Project of this nature. The technical complexity of the installation of certain structural systems within the rehabilitation plan lends it to specialized contractors with knowledge of these systems.

2) The CM/GC contractor will be selected through an open and competitive proposal process as prescribed by ORS 279C.400 to 410 and related administrative rules, including but not limited to formal public advertising of the solicitation, an award made based upon identified selection criteria described in the RFP, and an opportunity to protest any such award.

B. Findings Regarding Significant Cost Savings

ORS 279C.335(2)(b) requires an agency to find that "Awarding a public improvement contract under the exemption will result in substantial cost savings to the public contracting agency."

This finding is supported by the following facts:

- 1) How many persons are available to bid: There are limited qualified specialized contractors to perform the scope of work associated with this Project.
- 2) The construction budget and the projected operating costs for the completed public improvement: Limited or no additional funding is available for the **Sutherlin Police and Fire Station Retrofits** above and beyond the awarded grant funding source.
- 3) Public benefits that may result from granting the exemption: Utilization of the CM/GC contract delivery process will allow the **City of Sutherlin** to deliver the most comprehensive project for the allotted funding.
- 4) Whether value engineering techniques may decrease the cost of the public improvement: This work integrates specialized equipment and personnel to properly install certain items of the rehabilitation. A requirement to competitively bid this type of work would create additional expenses and lead to uncertainty regarding the installation of said items.
- 5) The cost and availability of specialized expertise that is necessary for the public improvement: An exemption from competitive bidding will allow the **City of Sutherlin** to take advantage of specialized general contractors knowledgeable in the rehabilitation of existing structures and value engineering the Project during the design phase. This will allow the **City of Sutherlin** to be provided the best value and potentially eliminate costly change orders resulting from unknowns in the field.
- 6) Any likely increases in public safety: There are currently concerns with public safety during the scheduled work as **Sutherlin Police and Fire Stations** will remain functional during the proposed work. The CM/GC will assist with the development of a safety plan.
- 7) Whether granting the exemption may reduce risks to the contracting agency, the state agency or the public that are related to the public improvement: Risks associated with contract overruns, schedule increases and unqualified contracts are greatly reduced with the granting of the exemption to competitive bidding.

- 8) Whether granting the exemption will affect the sources of funding for the public improvement: Granting the exemption will not affect funding sources for **Sutherlin Police and Fire Station Retrofits**
- 9) Whether granting the exemption will better enable the contracting agency to control the impact that market conditions may have on the cost of and time necessary to complete the public improvement: The specialty products, services and supplies needed under this contract are not particularly impacted by market conditions.
- 10) Whether granting the exemption will better enable the contracting agency to address the size and technical complexity of the public improvement: Implementation of this Project involves a number of issues of technical complexity. Special skills and expertise are needed for optimizing the related foundation strengthening and the seismic strengthening and element installation.
- 11) Whether the public improvement involves new construction or renovates or remodels an existing structure: The public improvement of **Sutherlin Police and Fire Stations** will renovate and seismically rehabilitate the buildings.
- 12) Whether the public improvement will be occupied or unoccupied during construction: The public improvement will occur while the building is occupied by summer staff. Parts of the Project may occur during normal school hours while students are in classes.
- 13) Whether the public improvement will require a single phase of construction work or multiple phases of construction work to address specific project conditions: It is the intent of **City of Sutherlin** to construct the Project under a single phase of the Project.
- 14) Whether the contracting agency or state agency has, or has retained under contract, and will use contracting agency or state agency personnel, consultants and legal counsel that have necessary expertise and substantial experience in alternative contracting methods to assist in developing the alternative contracting method that the contracting agency or state agency will use to award the public improvement contract and to help negotiate, administer and enforce the terms of the public improvement contract: **City of Sutherlin** will enlist the assistance of **ZCS Engineering and Architecture** as the Project Manager to assist with the enforcement of the terms of the scope of work associated with the public improvement contract. **The City of Sutherlin** will enlist "**Berry Elsner & Hammond LLP**" to assist the District with legal counsel and legal enforcement of the public improvement contract.

Article III. SUMMARY

Use of the CM/GC method of contracting for the **Sutherlin Police and Fire Station Retrofits** is an appropriate use of the alternative contracting method under OAR 137-049-0620. Additionally, an exemption from competitive bidding requirements is justified under the criteria outlined in ORS 279C.330, findings have been developed in compliance with ORS 279C.335(2),

and the **City of Sutherlin** will perform the post project evaluation required by ORS 279C.355. Based upon previously listed findings, the **City of Sutherlin** specifically concludes that:

- 1) It is unlikely the exemption will encourage favoritism in the awarding of public contracts or substantially diminish competition for public contracts; and
- 2) The exemption will result in substantial cost savings to the affected **City of Sutherlin** for the services provided.
