Clean Air Month 2018

Supported by the American Lung Association, Clean Air Month educates people about the impact clean air can have on their lives.

Poor quality air can harm the environment and can affect us all.

Toxic air pollution is linked to serious conditions such as cancer and chronic bronchitis. Air pollution can exacerbate pre-existing conditions such as asthma.



Air pollution can also harm the environment. The burning of fossil fuels (often for transport or electricity generation) releases high levels of sulfur dioxide and nitrogen oxide into the atmosphere. These gases react with other gases and water to create rain which is acidic.

Acid rain raises the acid levels of water and disrupts the natural balance of life in lakes and rivers; acid rain can also damage plants and trees.

Pollutants Which Can Affect Clean Air & The Environment Include:

- Acid Rain
- Ozone
- Toxic Air Pollution
- Lead
- Sulfur Dioxide
- Particulate Soot
- Carbon Monoxide

We can all make positive steps to improve the quality of our air. Ways we can improve air quality are often based around reducing our use of electricity and using transport more efficiently. We can also support legislation which improves air quality.

Help Eliminate Mosquitoes and Protect Yourself from Mosquito-Borne Diseases



Warmer weather will soon be here! Unfortunately, the warm weather also brings out summer pests. None are more annoying than mosquitoes. The problem with mosquitoes is they can spread disease to humans. The most common mosquitoes-borne diseases in West Virginia are La Crosse

Encephalitis and West Nile Virus. However, there are additional disease that can be spread from the bite of a mosquito such as Zika virus.



So, while you are enjoying the warmer weather and the outdoors, take the time to practice the following tips to protect you and your family from mosquito-borne diseases:

- 1. Help reduce the number of mosquitoes around your home by emptying standing water from flowerpots, gutters, buckets, pool covers, pet water dishes, discarded tires, and birdbaths on a regular basis.
- 2. Use insect repellents when you go outdoors. Repellents containing DEET, picaridin, IR3535, and some oil of lemon eucalyptus and para-methane-diol products provide longer-lasting protection. To optimize safety and effectiveness, repellents should be used according to the label instructions.
- 3. Take extra care during peak mosquito biting hours of 5:00 p.m. to dusk. Take extra care to use repellent and protective clothing from dusk to dawn or consider avoiding outdoor activities during these times.



Asthma and Allergy Awareness Month 2018

People who suffer from asthma and allergies often experience noticeable physical symptoms during this month.



Asthma symptoms include coughing, wheezing, shortness of breath, and a tightness in the chest. Symptoms of allergies can vary in severity. Mild allergy symptoms include congestion, skin rash, and itchy water eyes. Moderate symptoms include difficulty in breathing, and itchiness.

Severe asthma symptoms can begin with itching of the eyes and face, but soon progress to swelling, causing breathing difficulties, cramps, diarrhea, and vomiting. Confusion and dizziness are further symptoms of asthma.

What Causes or Triggers Asthma?

People with asthma have inflamed airways which are sensitive to things which may not bother other people. These things are "triggers."

Common allergens that causes allergic asthma include:

- dust mites
- cockroach
- pollens
- molds
- pet dander
- rodents

Irritants in the environment can also bring on an asthma episode. Although people are not allergic to these items, they can bother inflamed, sensitive airways:



- smoke from cigarettes
- air pollution such as smog, ozone, and others
- wood fires
- charcoal grills
- strong fumes, vapors, or odors (such as paint, gasoline, perfumes and scented soaps)
- dusts and particles in the air
- chemicals

Respiratory Illness

- colds
- flu (influenza)
- sore throats
- sinus infections
- pneumonia

Weather

Dry wind, cold air or sudden changes in weather can sometimes bring on an asthma episode.

National High Blood Pressure Education Month 2018

Written as two figures, blood pressure is measured as the pressure when the heart has pumped (systolic) and when the heart is in between beats

(diastolic).

Normal Blood Pressure Levels: At Risk Blood Pressure Levels: High Blood Pressure Levels: Systolic<120 mmHg Systolic 120-139mmHG Systolic 140mmHg or higher Diastolic>80mmHg Diastolic 80-89mmHg Diastolic 90mmHg

Confirming High Blood Pressure:

- Don't drink coffee or smoke cigarettes for 30 minutes prior to the test.
- Go to the bathroom before the test.
- Sit for 5 minutes before the test.

PRIMARY HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE

Primary or essential high blood pressure is the most common type of high blood pressure. This type of high blood pressure tends to develop over years as a person ages.

SECONDARY HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE


Secondary high blood pressure is caused by another medical condition or use of certain medicines. This type usually resolves after the cause is treated or removed.

Maintaining a healthy body weight, regular exercise, quitting smoking and following a healthy low sodium diet rich in fruit and vegetables.

What you don't know about high blood pressure could hurt you. High blood pressure affects one in three Americans yet many people with the condition don't know they have it.

Uncontrolled high blood pressure raises the risk for heart disease and stroke, which are leading causes of death in the United States. Fortunately, high blood pressure is treatable and preventable. Get you blood pressure checked regularly.

Memorial Day in the United States

Memorial Day is observed on the last Monday of May. It was formerly known as Decoration Day and commemorates all men and women who have died in military service for the United States. Many people visit cemeteries and memorials on Memorial Day and it is traditionally seen as the start of the summer season.

It is traditional to fly the flag of the United States at half-staff from dawn until noon. Many volunteers place an American flag on each grave in national cemeteries. Memorial Day is combined with Jefferson Davis' Birthday in Mississippi.

Memorial Day is a federal holiday. All non-essential Government offices are closed, as are schools, businesses and other organizations. Most public transit systems do not run on their regular schedule. Many people see Memorial Day weekend as an opportunity to go on a short vacation or visit family or friends. This can cause some congestion on highways and at airports.

Background

Memorial Day started as an event to honor Union soldiers who had died during the American Civil War. It was inspired by the way people in the Southern states honored their dead. After World War I, it was extended to include all men and women who died in any war or military action.

Memorial Day was originally known as Decoration Day. The current name for this day did not come into use until after World War II. Decoration Day and then Memorial Day used to be held on May 30, regardless of the day of the week, on which it fell. In 1968, the Uniform Holidays Bill was passed as part of a move to use federal holidays to create three-day weekends. This meant that that, from 1971, Memorial Day holiday has been officially observed on the last Monday in May. However, it took a longer period for all American states to recognize the new date.
