GRANT CONTRACT AGREEMENT

This **AGREEMENT**, entered into this **14th Day of December 2021**, by the Assistant Director of the Division of Administrative Services, Justice and Community Services Section, hereinafter referred to as "JCS", and the Upshur County Commission, hereinafter referred to as "Grantee."

WHEREAS, JCS is the recipient of Community Corrections Funds from the State of West Virginia., and

WHEREAS, the Grantee is an eligible applicant who is desirous of receiving funds for: This grant will fund staff in the Upshur County Prosecuting Attorney's Office to provide direct services to crime victims in Upshur County.

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto mutually agree as follows:

- 1. The Grantee agrees to comply with all applicable federal and state laws and rules, regulations and policies promulgated thereunder.
- 2. JCS agrees to assist the Grantee to perform such tasks and functions as set forth in the application, which is attached hereto and made part hereof, hereinafter referred to as Attachment A.
- 3. The Grantee shall do, perform, and carry out in a satisfactory and proper manner as determined by JCS all duties, tasks and functions necessary to implement the application which is hereto attached as Attachment A.
- 4. The Grantee will commence its duties under the Agreement on <u>October 1, 2021</u> and shall continue those services/activities until <u>June 30, 2022</u>. The terms of this Agreement may only be extended or modified by the mutual written agreement of the parties hereto.
- 5. In consideration of the services rendered by the Grantee, the sum of up to \$7,992.00 shall be obligated by JCS and said amount shall be deemed to be the maximum compensation to be received for this Agreement unless a written modification is entered into between the parties amending this Agreement.
- 6. It is the understanding of all parties to this Agreement that JCS by joining in the Agreement does not pledge, or promise to pledge, the credit of the State of West Virginia, nor does it promise to pay all of the compensation hereunder from monies of the Treasury of the State of West Virginia.

- 7. It is the understanding of all parties to this Agreement that JCS has determined that the Grantee will receive an upfront scheduled allocation of funds.
- 8. If the Grantee is not receiving an upfront scheduled allocation of funds: To be eligible for any and all payments of the grant amount, the Grantee shall submit a Request for Reimbursement of Funds once per month to JCS. Upon receipt of said request, JCS shall review the same for reasonableness and appropriateness; and if approved, will cause a warrant to be requested on that sum considered reasonable and appropriate. It is expressly understood that the total compensation shall not exceed the amount set forth in Paragraph Five hereinbefore cited and said compensation will be expended only as outlined in the budget sections of Attachment A, unless written approval of modification of the budget is signed by the parties hereto. Grantee shall submit a fiscal report detailing expenditures to JCS by the twentieth (20th) day of each month.
- 9. If the Grantee <u>is</u> receiving an upfront scheduled allocation of funds, the Grantee hereby agrees to adopt a schedule of payments dictated by JCS: To be eligible for any and all scheduled allocation of funds of the total grant amount, the Grantee shall submit a Request for Funds to JCS which adheres to the schedule of payments. Upon receipt of said request, JCS shall review the same for reasonableness and appropriateness; and if approved, will cause a warrant to be requested on that sum considered reasonable and appropriate. It is expressly understood that the total compensation shall not exceed the amount set forth in Paragraph Five hereinbefore cited and said compensation will be expended only as outlined in the budget sections of Attachment A, unless written approval of modification of the budget is signed by the parties hereto. Grantee shall submit a fiscal report detailing expenditures to JCS by the twentieth (20th) day of each month.
- 10. Grantee hereby represents that it possesses the legal authority to contract for this Agreement and that attached hereto and made a part hereof as Attachment B is a certified copy of the resolution, motion or similar action which was clearly adopted or passed by the Grantee's governing body; and further, that it has directed and authorized an official representative to act in connection with this Agreement. If the Grantee is a State agency, the completed application signed by the agency head is sufficient.
- 11. Grantee agrees to abide by the grant conditions, terms, assurances and certifications which are a part of Attachment A and such other special terms and conditions that JCS has set forth in Attachment C which is incorporated herein and made part hereof, if said Special Conditions are appropriate to this Agreement.
- 12. If, through any cause, the Grantee shall fail to fulfill in a necessary and proper manner, obligations under this Agreement, the JCS may withhold payments to the Grantee upon notice in writing, suspend, or cancel this Agreement and Attachments. The notice of withholding payments, suspension, or cancellation should set forth the JCS reasons for taking said action.
- 13. JCS and Grantee may from time to time require changes in the scope of services performed hereunder. Grantee agrees to submit a written request for modification prior to changing any budget line item. All such changes, including any increase or decrease in the amount of compensation hereunder or work to be performed, which are mutually agreed upon between the parties shall be in writing.
- 14. If for any reason funds received by JCS are suspended or terminated, in whole or in part, funding for this Agreement shall cease.

- 15. Grantee shall within the time period prescribed by grant conditions upon the termination of the Agreement, submit to JCS a final report on forms provided by JCS. Said reports shall reflect actual costs incurred or expended during the terms of this Agreement.

- 1. LAWS OF WEST VIRGINIA: This grant application/contract shall be governed in all respects by the laws of the State of West Virginia. State procedures and practices will apply to all funds disbursed by JCS, regardless of the original funding source. At the sole discretion of JCS, this grant can be based on a "reimbursement bases" mechanism, or a mechanism which awards an "upfront allocation" of funds on a quarterly or semi-annual basis. Upon timely notification to the grantee, JCS reserves the express right to commute an upfront allocation mechanism to a request for reimbursement mechanism for a recipient of funds, at any time during a grant period.
- 2. <u>LEGAL AUTHORITY:</u> The applicant hereby certifies it has the legal authority to apply for the grant; that a resolution, motion or similar action has been duly adopted or passed as an official act of the applicant's governing body authorizing the filing of the application, including all understandings and assurances contained therein, and directly authorizes the person identified as the official representative of the applicant to act in connection with the application and to provide such additional information as may be required if applicable.

If the project is not operational within 60 days of the specified project starting date, the grantee must report by letter to JCS, the steps taken to initiate the project, the reasons for delay, and the expected starting date.

- OPERATIONAL WITHIN 90 DAYS: If the project is not operational within 90 days of the specified project starting date, the grantee must submit a second statement to JCS explaining the delay in implementation.
- 6. <u>SUSPENSION OF FUNDING:</u> The grantee acknowledges that acceptance of an award is not a guarantee of funds. Further, by accepting this award, the grantee acknowledges and agrees that JCS may suspend in whole or in part, terminate, or impose other sanctions on any grantee funds for the following reasons:
 - Failure to adhere to the requirements, standard conditions, or special conditions and assurances of this program;
 - 60 or more days late in submitting reports;
 - Failure to submit reports;
 - · High Risk Grantee as determined by the JCS High Risk Assessment; or
 - Any other cause shown.
- 7. <u>SANCTIONS FOR NONCOMPLIANCE:</u> In the event of the grantee's noncompliance with the terms, conditions, covenants, rules, or regulations of this grant, JCS shall impose such contract sanctions, as it may deem appropriate, including but not limited to:
 - Withholding of payments to the grantee until the grantee complies or, if reports are more than 60 days late, the funding for that month is forfeited and may not be recouped or remedied;
 - Cancellation, termination or suspension of the contract, in whole or in part;
 - Refraining from extending any further assistance to the grantee until satisfactory assurance of future compliance has been received;
 - If the grantee is receiving funds on an upfront basis, JCS can commute the transfer of funds mechanism to a reimbursement only process for the remainder of the grant period;
 - If the grantee is receiving funds on an upfront basis and a determination is made by JCS that funds were intentionally or unintentionally misused, misappropriated, misspent or otherwise not consistent with the intents and purpose of the grant, the grantee automatically forfeits any remaining funds from the grant program, and any other awarded funds from any other program, until a satisfactory resolution has been achieved;
 - If a grantee is indebted to JCS for any amount of funds at the close of an
 applicable quarter, semi-annual or end of a grant period, and the debt is
 not resolved within 30 days following the close of those periods, the grantee
 acknowledges and agrees that it is automatically ineligible to receive or
 apply for funds from JCS for any grant program; and
 - Grantee agrees and acknowledges that under no circumstances may it commute a debt to be applied as matching funds; or, will JCS reduce a future quarterly or semi-annual allotment or future award as repayment of the debt. Repayment must be from a general account or an account unrelated to the grant award.

- 8. ACCOUNTING REQUIREMENTS: Grantee agrees to record all project funds and costs following generally accepted accounting principles. A unique account number or cost recording must separate all project costs from the grantee's other or general expenditures. Adequate documentation for all project costs and income must be maintained. Adequate documentation of financial and supporting material must be retained and be available for audit purposes. Federal regulations prohibit the commingling of Federal grant funds with funds from other sources; further, funds received on an upfront basis from JCS for one program may not be comingled with funds received on an upfront basis for another JCS program.
- 9. <u>REPORTS:</u> Regardless of an award being on an upfront or reimbursement basis, each grantee shall submit all reports as JCS requires necessary to the execution of monitoring, stewardship, and evaluation of programmatic and fiscal responsibilities.
- 10. WRITTEN APPROVAL OF CHANGES: The grantee must obtain prior written approval from JCS for all project changes (programmatic, fiscal or otherwise) before those changes are executed.
- 11. OBLIGATION OF PROJECT FUNDS: Funds may not, without prior written approval from JCS, be obligated prior to the effective start date or subsequent to the termination date of the project period. Obligations outstanding as of the project termination date shall be liquidated within thirty (30) days.
- 12. <u>USE OF FUNDS:</u> Funds awarded through JCS may be expended only for the purposes and activities specifically covered by the grantee's approved project scope and budget. By attaching their signature, the grantee recognizes that any deviations from the original grant budget are unallowable.
- 13. <u>ALLOWABLE AND UNALLOWABLE COSTS</u>: Allowable and unallowable costs incurred under this grant shall be determined in accordance with General Accounting Office principles and standards, state guidelines, and federal guidelines pursuant to the specific grant program.
- 14. <u>PURCHASING:</u> When making purchases relevant to the grant, the grantee will abide by applicable State and local laws, which address purchasing procedures by a state or local unit of government or another agency. See 148CSR1 of the West Virginia State Code.
- 15. PROJECT INCOME: All income earned by the grantee as a result of the conduct of this project must be accounted for and included in the total budget. Project income is subject to the same expenditure guidelines established for grant funds by JCS. All grantees must maintain records that clearly show the source, the amount, and the timing of all project income. There is no waiver provision for the project income requirement.
- 16. MATCHING CONTRIBUTION: The grantee will have available, and will expend as required, adequate resources to defray that portion of the total costs as set forth in this application as "match" and as approved by JCS. The applicant assures that the matching funds required to pay the grant portion of the cost of each program and project, for which funds are made available, shall be in addition to funds that would otherwise be made available for the proposed project by the recipients of grant funds and shall be provided on a project-by-project basis. Matching contributions are subject to the same expenditure guidelines as grant funds for this program. All grantees must maintain records that clearly show the source, the amount, and the timing of all matching contributions. In addition, Federal grant dollars from any source may not be utilized as matching funds.

- 17. <u>TIME EXTENSIONS:</u> In general, time extensions will not be granted. Unexpended grant funds remaining at the close of the grant period shall be deobligated. Funds remaining at the end of a project where an upfront allocation will, by the deadline of the final financial and progress report, be remitted back to JCS.
- 18. NON-SUPPLANTING: Grant funds must be used to supplement existing funds for program activities and may not replace (supplant) funds that have been appropriated for the same purpose. Potential supplanting will be the subject of monitoring and audit. Violations can result in a range of penalties, including suspension of future funds under this program, suspension or debarment from state grants, recoupment of monies provided under this grant, and civil and/or criminal penalties. The grantee hereby certifies that funds made available under this grant will not be used to supplant other funding sources.
- 19. TRANSFER OF FUNDS PROHIBITION: The grantee is expressly prohibited from transferring funds between any JCS programs. Federal regulations prohibit the commingling of Federal grant funds with funds from other sources.
- 20. <u>TRAINING:</u> For projects involving payment of personnel, JCS reserves the right to require training as a condition of the grant before or at any time during the project period.
- 21. <u>PURCHASE OF AMERICAN-MADE EQUIPMENT/PRODUCTS</u>: To the extent practicable, all equipment and products purchased with state funds made available under this grant should be American-made.
- 22. MARKING OF EQUIPMENT: Grantee will ensure that all equipment purchased with grant funding shall be prominently marked as follows: "Purchased with funds provided by Justice and Community Services."
- 23. PROPERTY ACCOUNTABILITY: The grantee shall establish and administer a system to control, protect, preserve, use, maintain, and properly dispose of any property or equipment furnished it, or made available through a grant by JCS. This obligation continues as long as the property is retained by the grantee, notwithstanding the expiration of this agreement. Prior to sale, trade in or disposal of property, disposition instructions will be obtained from JCS. Grantee assures inventory checks will be performed annually or pursuant to guidance promulgated in the Administrative Manual for this program (if applicable), with copies provided to JCS. Property must be used for the intended grant purposes. If the property is not being used in accordance with terms of the grant, said property will revert to JCS.
- 24. <u>COMPUTER EQUIPMENT:</u> Grantees purchasing computer equipment (hardware, software, or peripherals) with grant funds are required to adhere to the established bidding procedures for their respective units of government or agency. To ensure reputable vendors are obtained, grantees may consider utilizing the current applicable State computer contract. Computer equipment must adhere to minimum requirements established by the West Virginia Office of Technology.
- **25. LEASE AGREEMENTS:** Grantee agrees to provide JCS with a copy of the lease arrangement if funds are being requested for reimbursement or utilized as match.

- award or sub award; and, (2) any rights of copyright to which a recipient or sub recipient purchases ownership, in whole or in part, with State or Federal support. Grantee agrees to consult with JCS regarding the allocation of any patent rights that arise from, or are purchased with, this funding.
- 27. <u>ACCESS TO RECORDS:</u> JCS, through any authorized representative, shall have access to and the right to examine all records, books, papers, or documents related to the grant and to relevant books and records of contractors.
- 28. CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLIANCE: Grantee will comply with any applicable federal nondiscrimination requirements, which may include the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34 U.S.C. §§ 10228(c) and 10221(a); the Victims of Crime Act (34 U.S.C. §20110(e)); the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act of 2002 (34 U.S.C. § 11182(b)); the Violence Against Women Act (34 U.S.C. § 12291(b)(13)); the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 U.S.C. § 2000d); the Indian Civil Rights Act (25 U.S.C. §§ 1301-1303); the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. § 794); the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. §§ 12131-34); the Education Amendments of 1972 (20 U.S.C. §§ 1681, 1683, 1685-86); the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 (42 U.S.C. §§ 6101-07); Executive Order 13279, Equal Protection of the Laws for Faith-Based and Community Organizations; Executive Order 13559. Fundamental Principles and Policymaking Criteria for Partnerships With Faith-Based and Other Neighborhood Organizations; and the DOJ implementing regulations at 28 C.F.R. Part 38. Subrecipients of grants under the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) of 1994, as amended, are prohibited from discriminating on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. - 32. FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT: All records, papers, and other documents kept by recipients of grant funds are required to be made available to JCS. These records and other documents submitted to JCS and its grantees, including plans and application for funds, reports, etc., may be subsequently required to be made available to entities under Federal Freedom of Information Act, 5. U.S.C. §552, or Chapter 29B, Article 1 (West Virginia Freedom of Information) of the West Virginia Code. JCS recognizes that some information submitted in

the course of applying for funding under this program or provided in the course of its grant management activities, may be considered law enforcement, personnel, juvenile sensitive, or personal or otherwise important to national or state security interests. This may include threat, risk and needs assessment information, and discussions of demographics, transportation, public works, and industrial and public health infrastructures.

While this information <u>under state control</u> is subject to requests made pursuant to the Chapter 29B, Article 1 of the West Virginia Code, all determinations concerning the release of information of this nature are made on a case-by-case basis by JCS and may fall within one or more of the available exemptions under the Act.

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News Releases IRS issues standard mileage rates for 2022

IR-2021-251, Dec. 17, 2021

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today issued the 2022 optional standard mileage rates used to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business, charitable, medical or moving purposes.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 2022, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (also vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be:

- 58.5 cents per mile driven for business use, up 2.5 cents from the rate for 2021,
- 18 cents per mile driven for medical, or moving purposes for qualified active-duty members of the Armed Forces, up 2 cents from the rate
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations; the rate is set by statute and remains unchanged from 2021.

The standard mileage rate for business use is based on an annual study of the fixed and variable costs of operating an automobile. The rate for medical and moving purposes is based on the variable costs.

It is important to note that under the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act, taxpayers cannot claim a miscellaneous itemized deduction for unreimbursed employee travel expenses. Taxpayers also cannot claim a deduction for moving expenses, unless they are members of the Armed Forces on active duty moving under orders to a permanent change of station. For more details see Moving Expenses for Members of the Armed Forces.

Taxpayers always have the option of calculating the actual costs of using their vehicle rather than using the standard mileage rates.

Taxpayers can use the standard mileage rate but must opt to use it in the first year the car is available for business use. Then, in later years, they can choose either the standard mileage rate or actual expenses. Leased vehicles must use the standard mileage rate method for the entire lease period (including renewals) if the standard mileage rate is chosen.

Notice 22-03, contains the optional 2022 standard mileage rates, as well as the maximum automobile cost used to calculate the allowance under a fixed and variable rate (FAVR) plan. In addition, the notice provides the maximum fair market value of employer-provided automobiles first made available to employees for personal use in calendar year 2022 for which employers may use the fleetaverage valuation rule in or the vehicle cents-per-mile valuation rule.

The staff of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC or Commission) has prepared a final supplemental environmental impact statement (sEIS) for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline, LLC's (Atlantic) Atlantic Coast Pipeline Restoration Project, and Eastern Gas Transmission and Storage, Inc.'s (EGTS) Supply Header Restoration Project (Restoration Projects), in the above-referenced dockets. Atlantic and EGTS request authorization to implement the Restoration Projects in order to stabilize lands affected by previous construction efforts for the Atlantic Coast Pipeline and Supply Header Project, respectively, and to facilitate cessation of all project-related activities. Implementation of the plans is proposed because Atlantic and EGTS have cancelled their respective projects and do not intend to complete them.

The final sEIS assesses the potential impacts that would result from the Restoration Projects, in accordance with the requirements of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA).¹ The FERC staff concludes that the proposed actions, with the additional mitigation measures recommended in the sEIS, would continue to avoid or reduce impacts to less than significant levels, with the exception of climate change impacts, for which FERC staff is unable to determine significance.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service and the U.S. Department of the Interior's Fish and Wildlife Service participated as cooperating agencies in the preparation of the sEIS. Cooperating agencies have jurisdiction by law or special expertise with respect to resources potentially affected by the proposal and participate in the NEPA analysis.

The sEIS addresses the potential environmental effects of the following activities:

The construction and operation impacts of the then-proposed Atlantic Coast Pipeline and Supply Header Project were evaluated in a final EIS, which was issued by the Commission on July 21, 2017, in Docket Nos. CP15-554-00, CP15-554-001; and CP15-555-000.

- Atlantic proposes to leave all installed pipeline in place (approximately 31.4 miles of the pipeline right-of-way), restore lands that were cleared and graded (approximately 82.7 miles of the pipeline right-of-way), and leave felled trees in place in areas where trees have not yet been cleared (approximately 25.2 miles of the pipeline right-of-way). For aboveground facilities, Atlantic proposes to restore the sites and manage the disposition of the materials and land through an investment recovery process. Workspace for these activities would occur in West Virginia, Virginia, and North Carolina.
- EGTS proposes to leave all installed pipeline in place (approximately 11.7 miles), leave approximately 0.13 mile of felled trees in place, and complete final restoration of approximately 9 miles of the pipeline right-of-way that EGTS previously cleared and/or graded. EGTS proposes to stabilize all aboveground facility sites and prepare assets for long term preservation. Workspace for these activities would occur in Pennsylvania and West Virginia.

Mon Power and Potomac Edison Propose Environmental Compliance Program for Power Plants

Fort Martin and Harrison plants expected to operate until 2035 and 2040, respectively, following upgrades

FAIRMONT, W. Va. — Mon Power and Potomac Edison, subsidiaries of FirstEnergy Corp. (NYSE: FE), have applied to the Public Service Commission of West Virginia for approval to undertake a multi-year environmental compliance program at the companies' two regulated power plants, Fort Martin Power Station in Maidsville and Harrison Power Station in Haywood. The approximately \$142 million program would consist of new wastewater treatment projects at the plants to meet the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's effluent limitation guideline (ELG) requirements.

If approved, the companies would complete the work by the end of 2025, reducing the environmental impact of the two facilities. The upgrades also support the continued operation of Fort Martin and Harrison beyond the 2025 compliance deadline, until their anticipated retirement dates of 2035 and 2040, respectively.

"The proposed upgrades will create local jobs and allow us to continue to operate our plants into the next decade for the benefit of our customers in West Virginia, while also minimizing their impact on the environment," said Jim Myers, president of West Virginia operations for FirstEnergy.

The cost of the improvements would be funded through a ratepayer surcharge that would start at 51 cents per month for the average residential customer in West Virginia when the first projects are implemented in 2024.

Fort Martin and Harrison were placed into service in the late 1960s and early 1970s, and such plants historically have an average life span of approximately 60 years. The future retirement of either facility would be subject to commission review and approval.

In the years ahead, Mon Power and Potomac Edison will work to evaluate the most reliable and cost-effective ways to replace the significant capacity of the plants. The two plants generate 3,080 megawatts of power combined.

Last year, FirstEnergy announced a <u>pledge to achieve carbon neutrality</u> by 2050. As part of its comprehensive climate strategy, the company conveyed its intent to thoughtfully transition its generation fleet within that time frame.

Mon Power and Potomac Edison recently submitted an application to the Public Service Commission of West Virginia to build five utility-scale <u>solar energy projects</u> throughout the companies' West Virginia service territory that would generate 50 megawatts of clean, renewable energy.

Re: The Property Tax Modernization Constitutional Amendment November 2022 General Election

Dear Commissioners:

During the 2021 regular session, the West Virginia Legislature adopted House Joint Resolution 3 (HJR3), the Property Tax Modernization Amendment. The amendment will be up for ratification at the November 2022 General Election. HJR3 proposes a fundamental change to our State's Constitution – to allow the Legislature to exempt essentially all personal property from taxation – including equipment, inventory, and motor vehicles. Have no doubt, HJR3 has the potential to drastically cut local government and eliminate local government services.

For example, if ratified, HJR3 would provide a mechanism to eliminate more than \$60 million in constitutionally protected funding that currently supports local government in Kanawha County. Potential losses include \$17 million to the County Commission and the County's Public Safety Levy, \$34 million to the Board of Education, \$7 million to the County's fifteen Cities and towns, and nearly \$1 million to the Kanawha County library system.

Stated another way, HJR3 could result in drastic cuts to the essential funding that supports Kanawha County's ambulance and bus services, the Kanawha County Sheriff's Office, Metro 911 center, municipal police departments, and volunteer and municipal fire departments.

Most concerning with this proposed amendment is that, unlike other recent legislative proposals to amend the Constitution, HJR3 did not include a plan for implementing these drastic changes or guaranteed replacement revenue for local governments. As it stands, when voters go to the polls next November they will be asked to amend the State Constitution without knowing the full - and potentially devastating - impact on local government, public education, and police, fire and EMS.



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Therefore, the Kanawha County Commission strongly encourages every County Commission in this state to contact your County Assessor and Sheriff to determine HJR3's impact on your county finances and the services you provide. We also strongly urge you to contact your Legislators and ask for an open, transparent process to identify replacement revenue for local governments in the event HJR3 is ratified.

The meeting was called to order by Joe Gower at 6:30 pm. All motions passed unanimously unless otherwise stated.

Guest Bobby Monroe from Datamax provided an overview and answered questions about the services his company provides to its customers regarding collection of debt, and the benefits to the Fire Board in regards to unpaid fire fees. The company works on a 25% commission.

The Fire Fee Clerk reported the 2021 Fees are at 79 percent collected. The unpaid fees list is completed through 2019 and was electronically provided to the Board.

The checking account balance as of 10/29/2021 was \$178,842.99. The disbursement from the Chief Tax Deputy was \$30,860.12 for September was deposited on November 11, 2021. The Disbursement for October from the Chief Tax Deputy is \$14,137.05.
