FINANCE DEPARTMENT



PET LICENSING

Licenses for dogs are issued for the calendar year and expire December 31. Reminder cards are NOT sent. The new licenses are generally available in the Finance office by mid-December for the following calendar year.

The city ordinance requires ALL dogs be licensed, even if they do not go outside. You could receive a citation for pets who are not properly licensed. To be issued a dog license, bring your pet's current rabies vaccination certification (required) along with cash or check to the Finance Department at City Hall, 106 Jones Street.

Fees for licenses are:

- Male/Female unaltered—\$15.00
- Male/Female altered-\$10.00
- Licenses obtained after the last Friday in March are assessed a late fee of \$5.00 each.

Are you a new pet owner and not sure when to license your pet?

- When your pet is five (5) months of age and has obtained the rabies vaccination.
- Within thirty (30) days of obtaining a dog over five months of age, or within thirty (30) days of moving into the City with a dog over five months of age.

PROPERTY TAXES

Property tax bills will be mailed in early December. City taxpayers may choose to pay real estate taxes in full by January 31 or take advantage of the installment plan. Due dates for the installment plan are January 31, April 30 and July 31. Taxpayers using the installment plan are responsible for remembering the due dates as no additional notices are sent after the original tax bill is mailed. For taxpayers who wish to pay by the end of 2024, the last day City Hall will be open in 2024 to accept tax payments is December 31, 2024 from 8am - 12pm. Taxpayers may mail their tax payments or drop them in the night deposit box on the brick wall to the left of the City Hall front doors through December 31, 2024 for them to be considered paid in 2024.

 registrations may be done the Monday before election day.
- October 22 through November 1 In person absentee voting will be held during normal City Hall business hours at the Watertown Municipal Building. Photo ID required.
- November 5 Election Day

INTERESTED IN WORKING THE POLLS?

Elections Inspectors (sometimes called poll workers) are the gatekeepers of democracy and are vital to efficient and honest elections. Election Inspectors proudly conduct elections with accuracy, integrity, and dignity. The City of Watertown needs election inspectors to help with the November Election. You can

join this team of caring community members who help city residents exercise their basic right of citizenship – voting in fair and accurate elections – by contacting the City Clerk at elections@watertownwi.gov or by submitting an application found on our city website, www.watertownwi.gov [Residents > Election/Voter Information > Election Inspectors].



GENERAL VOTING INFORMATION

Persons not currently registered to vote or who have moved or changed their name since they last voted will need to register. Voters may register online at myvote.wi.gov, in the Finance Department at 106 Jones Street during regular office hours, by mail until October 16, or at their polling location on election day. No registrations can be made on the Monday before the election. Proof of residency is required. For more information regarding voter registration, absentee ballot requests, or finding your polling location, go to myvote.wi.gov, visit the City's website, www.watertownwi.gov [Residents > Election/Voter Information > Register to Vote], or contact the Finance Department at 920-262-4000.

2025 LOCAL ELECTIONS

The 2025 Spring election will be a Mayoral and Municipal Judge election along with odd-numbered Aldermanic Districts. December 1, 2024, is the first day for candidates to begin circulating nomination papers. HOUSING REHAB GRANT FUNDS AVAILABLE

The RDA's Housing Rehab Grant Program is still accepting applications through the RDA website. The RDA recently completed its first home repair project, which included repainting the exterior of a home and installation of new gutters. This program is available to all City of Watertown homes, both owner-occupied and rentals.

Eligible Expenditures: Funds are to be used for physical repairs to the existing building. Grant funds may only be used to cover material costs, not labor. Additions to an existing building are not eligible for this grant program. Garages, sheds, decks, patios, and other similar structures are not eligible. Eligible expenses include roofs, porches, exterior paint, windows, doors, and power service upgrades to panels (with a correlating plan for upgrading in wiring).

Additional Guidelines: Property must be in good standing with the City of Watertown, with taxes current. If the property has any outstanding code violations or citations the project must address and resolve all outstanding violations and citations. The project must be completed within 90 days of approval to receive grant funds. An inspection is required at the time of project completion. Grant funds are paid to the contractor or other person who has completed the work.

Application Process: Applications are reviewed on a first-come, first-served basis. Applications will be reviewed based on criteria including project feasibility, impact to the value of the property, aesthetic improvement to the property, location of the proposed project, and other factors as determined by the RDA Application Review Committee. The RDA reserves the right to conduct a background and credit check on all applicants. More information can be found at watertownredevelopment.org.

WATERTOWN REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY ANNOUNCES NEW REVOLVING LOAN FUND PROJECTS

The Watertown Redevelopment Authority proudly announces the latest recipients of its Downtown Commercial Revolving Loan Program. Budget Print, located at 107 S. 5th Street, and the Deerfield Properties building at 118 N Water Street, have been awarded loans to support significant enhancements to their properties. The Downtown Commercial Revolving Loan Program is a key initiative designed to stimulate business expansion, create high-quality upper-level residential units, and update historic structures in Watertown's downtown area. The program offers low-interest financial support for façade beautification, structural repairs, and major mechanical upgrades, including plumbing, electrical, heating, and cooling systems. Additionally, loan funds can offset costs related to design, architectural, or engineering expenses. Steve Hill, owner of Budget Print, expressed his enthusiasm for the program: "We are thrilled to receive this support from the Watertown Redevelopment Authority. The revolving loan fund allows us to undertake necessary upgrades that will not only enhance our building's exterior but also improve our operational efficiency. This investment will help us continue to Watertown 1 serve our community with high-quality Redevelopment printing services."

DOWNTOWN RIVER CORRIDOR PLANNING PROJECT

After the completion of the Bentzin Family Town Square, the Watertown Redevelopment Authority saw the Downtown River Corridor plan as the logical next step in our mission and our vision for a continually evolving and lively downtown.

Our goal is to catalyze growth and cultivate a dynamic, community-oriented future. The RDA has held two community open houses to gather public input on the future of this vital area along the downtown Rock River.

WATER WALKING & DEEP-WATER AQUA JOG

Lap swimming and fitness classes not your thing? During water walking, adults may walk or jog laps using the shallow-depth area of the pool. Deep water aqua jogging is a time when adults may use the 12-foot area of the pool to jog or tread water. Aqua jog flotation belts are available to use, if desired. Water walking, and deep aqua jog are not instructor led; participants exercise independently. Cost is \$4 (Res.)/\$5 (NR.) per person or a swim pass.

WATER SAFETY INSTRUCTOR

If you are 15 years or older and a proficient swimmer, you can become an American Red Cross Water Safety Instructor. Learn to teach children and adults to swim and give water safety presentations to kids and their parents.

CLOSED FOR THE SEASON

It's time for the park facilities to close for the season. Restrooms will be closed, electric and plumbing turned off, and be winterized as of October 15th. Park facilities will reopen on April 15th for the 2025 summer season.

Anyone planning a wedding in 2025 should consider holding their ceremony at the beautiful gazebo in Riverside Park. Park reservations will begin on the first working day in February 2025 and the gazebo can be reserved up to a year in advance.

ICE SKATING AND HOCKEY

When weather conditions permit, ice skating will be available at Silver Creek. Ice must be at least 8 inches thick to be safe. Please use extreme caution when venturing out onto river ice, as ice depths are not consistent. Ice conditions that are near bridges and dams are especially dangerous.

HIKING & CROSS-COUNTRY SKI TRAILS

The Parks, Recreation, & Forestry Department and the Watertown Unified School District together provide a four-mile trail system for hiking and cross-country skiing. The trail is located on the Brandt/Quirk Park and High School grounds. There is an access point and parking at the north end of both Carriage Hill Drive and Hiawatha Street. The ski trail is groomed for skiing when there is sufficient snow.

PET EXERCISE PARK

The Boomer Street Pet Exercise Park is located on Boomer Street, 1/2 mile east of Twelfth Street at the old land fill site. Amenities include: tunnel, grooming/training table, climber and photo opportunity area. Facilities include: perimeter fencing, a parking lot, directional fencing which allows your pet to play off leash, waste collection bags and containers, and mowed trail. Park rules are posted at the trail head. Admittance is free. Dogs must play well with others!

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

Winter weather is a regular part of life in Wisconsin, and it can lead to dangerous conditions on the roads. It's harder to control or stop a vehicle in snow, sleet, and ice. Use these tips to help protect yourself and your passengers.

- Drive for conditions slower speeds, slower acceleration.
- On multi-lane roadways, snowplows often need to clear the center, throwing snow, ice and slush into nearby lanes.
 If approaching an on-coming snowplow, slow down and give the plow a little extra room.

- Use your headlights.

CITY OF WATERTOWN SNOW EMERGENCIES

During a declared snow emergency, no owner or operator of any vehicle shall park upon any public street, parking area among or within a right-of-way or alley between November 1 and April 30 between the hours of 11:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. A snow emergency may be declared by the Chief of Police or the Chief's delegate not later than 7:00 p.m. of the evening the snow emergency is to take effect. Residents who have no off-street parking available are encouraged to utilize municipal parking lots or make arrangements with neighbors, relatives or friends to avoid a potential \$50.00 citation. In addition, any vehicle that has been ticketed and remains parked at the same location for 24 or more hours afterward may be towed at the owner's expense.

DRUG DROP BOX - AVAILABLE 24/7

The Watertown Police Department in cooperation with Watertown Regional Medical Center, established a permanent drop-off site for unwanted or expired pharmaceutical and overthe-counter medication. The drop-off container is located in the lobby of the Watertown Police Department at 106 Jones Street, Watertown, WI. Public access to the drop off container is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

City residents may drop off their unwanted drugs – which include prescription, non-prescription, vitamins and veterinary drugs – for proper disposal. Hospice and group homes also may bring their drugs to the drop site, but hospitals, assisted living, clinics and pharmacies are required to do their own disposal of pharmaceuticals. No sharps/needles, radioactive materials, oxygen tanks or nebulizers may be disposed at the drop-off site. Contact the Watertown Health Department for proper disposal guidelines of these items.

CITY FLOOD CONTROL PROGRAM

Watertown's issues with water are complex, including high groundwater, changing precipitation events, historic development patterns, low areas surrounded by higher topography, and lots of hard surfaces (streets, parking lots, rooftops, etc.), draining toward the nearest creek, wetland or the Rock River. Storm sewers, ditches, swales, culverts, stormwater ponds and over 100 Best Management Practices (BMPs) exist on public and private property throughout the City. These systems are designed to capture and convey stormwater runoff safely with minimal impacts to private property and public infrastructure.

Storm sewer systems are typically sized to handle stormwater up to 4 inches of rain if it falls evenly over 24 hours. In rain events larger or heavier than this, the system is designed to allow stormwater to pond in low areas, swales, and along streets up to the top-of-curb. Once the downstream inlets and sewers can drain the water, these areas will dry up.

After the 2018 storm event of over 8 inches of rainfall in one day, the Engineering Division was tasked with identifying and addressing local flooding issues to avoid impacts from heavy rain events as much as possible. A City-wide Flood Control Master Plan was developed in 2022 & 2023. Modeling was completed for underground storm sewer pipe of 18 inches in diameter or larger throughout the City to identify significant flooding areas during the 10-year, 100-year and 500-year rain events. This modeling, along with staff knowledge and documentation of past flood events, was used to develop a list of 15 priority areas. Conceptual recommendations were developed for these areas with cost estimates to help guide City staff toward plan implementation.

Next steps include completing detailed drainage area studies and designs, budgeting, construction and on-going maintenance of flood control projects. Please check the City website for more information about the City-wide Flood Control Master Plan or contact the Engineering Division at 920-262-4060.

WHERE ARE MY PROPERTY LINES?

Why is it important to know where my property lines are? Whether installing a fence, purchasing a new property, or resolving a property line dispute between neighbors, it's important to know your items are actually on your property. If not, a fence would require an expensive relocation, or a bush or tree would be considered the property of the owner's land it is on.

How can I locate where my property lines are?

Hiring a surveyor to complete a survey which can be recorded at the county level is the most legally binding path to choose. However, if the property lines need to be located for a simple project, you may contact the Building, Safety, & Zoning Department at 920-262-4060. We can provide a printout of the property with the dimensions. Metal detectors are also available in our office for the public to use for no more than one week at a time. We require a \$400 deposit which we give back immediately upon the return of the metal detector. The deposit may be submitted in the form of cash, check made payable to "City of Watertown", or credit card. There is also a short application form to complete at the time of rental.

Is there anything to consider before digging to find my property marker?

Be sure you contact Diggers Hotline before digging in your lawn. They are a free service and may be contacted either by calling 800-242-8511 or going to their website (https://www.diggershotline.com/) to file a request there.

Where are my property pins located and what will they look like? Property lines in the City of Watertown are indicated by metal stakes in each corner of a property which are shared with neighboring properties. They are typically 6-12 inches under the ground. If there is something above ground, it's likely that a previous owner located the property stakes and wanted to ensure they didn't have to locate them again. Although it is illegal to remove or relocate the property stakes, there are no regulations stating an owner can't put something on top of the stakes for easy reference in the future. These stakes are shared with any neighboring property.

What if my neighbor is disputing where the property line is? Occasionally there is disagreement on the actual location of the property boundaries. When it occurs, it is considered a personal property dispute. A first step would be for each property owner to hire a surveyor to verify the location of the property lines. If that does not satisfy the issue, the property owners may have to seek legal counsel.

LEAF COLLECTION, SCHEDULE & ROUTES

The City will collect leaves in paper bags and loose at curbside again in Fall of 2024. Leaf collection will begin October 1st to meet Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources stormwater permit requirements. Early season leaf collection will focus on bagged leaves; curbside leaf collection is anticipated to begin later when more leaves have fallen off the trees. Bagged or loose leaves can also be dropped off at the Yard Waste Site at 1507 Boomer Street.

Here are some tips to manage leaves this fall:

- Bagged or loose leaves should be left on the grass at the edge of curb, not in street
- Only leaves should go in paper bags or leaf piles at curbside; no sticks, vegetation, grass clippings or pet waste
- Loose or bagged leaves can also be dropped off at the Yard Waste Site at 1355 Boomer Street.
- Only paper bags of leaves are accepted at the Yard Waste Site - no plastic bags should be used for leaves.
- No material other than leaves should be in paper bags.
- Simply fold the bags to close do not tie, stable, or tape.
- Rake & bag leaves on your schedule, not the City's leaf collection schedule. You can call the Street Division to see if an earlier collection can be done or bags of leaves can be stored out of site until it's time to put them out for the monthly leaf collection, whereas loose leaf piles on the grass may kill grass or blow back onto the lawn, streets, or storm inlets/curbline.
- Do not park in front of piles/bags. Crews must have easy access to bags/leaves.
- Leaves can also be composted or used as mulch in garden beds.

Collecting bagged leaves saves time and is more cost-effective, allowing City crews to focus on other end-of-season tasks. Keeping fallen leaves out of streets and storm drains minimizes phosphorus in downstream waterways, local flooding, and the cost to clean and maintain underground storm sewers. Compostable paper bags and leaf loading tools can be purchased at local hardware stores, home improvement stores, other related retailers and online. Mention this article at the Street Department and get one FREE pack of compostable bags per City of Watertown residence, while supplies last.

Fall leaf collection with the Leaf Vacuums is scheduled to begin October 21 in Section 3. Once a section is completed, crews will move onto the next section (unlike brush collection). The next week, no matter where we ended the previous week, we begin with the designated section.

IS MY CONTRACTOR LICENSED AND REPUTABLE?

Hiring a contractor to complete a job at your property can feel very overwhelming. To protect residents, Wisconsin has a home improvement law which protects residents when they hire a contractor for anything from installing air conditioning, installing a deck or full remodeling projects. The law is Wis. Adm. Code Ch. ATCP 110.

There are some things that a property owner can do to ensure they are hiring the best contractor for the job. Just a few tips include:

- Be very clear on what the proposed work is. Either have a write up, a drawing, or both and ensure a contract is signed by both the property owner and the contractor, which includes an estimated cost.
- Get more than one estimate. If there is a very high or very low estimate, don't be afraid to ask the contractor what the discrepancy is.
- Check the Better Business Bureau (BBB) at 800-273-1002 and the Bureau of Consumer Protection at 800-422-7128 to see if any complaints have been filed against the contractor.
- Call the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection at (608) 224-5012 or visit their website for further information and tips.

SNOW

Winter is coming! Equipment will soon be outfitted with brine/salt spreaders, plows, and wings. During snow season residents are encouraged to:

- Park vehicles off the streets in accordance with the winter parking ordinance when snow is forecasted.
- Minimize travel when plows and salters are out.
- Allow extra time and adjust speed for slippery conditions.
- Maintain safe driveways, sidewalks and crosswalks at your property as required by City Ordinance. Residents are prohibited from depositing snow in the street or alleys except as defined in the central downtown area.
- Remain a safe distance behind the salt and plow trucks.
 Following too closely could result in damage to your vehicle and City equipment.

WHAT IS SALT BRINE?

Salt brine is a solution of salt (typically sodium chloride) and water. It has a freezing point lower than pure water and, as such, is a useful tool in reducing the adhesion of snow and ice to road surfaces.

Brine is more effective and coats roadways better than plain salt. Brine gives crews more time to prepare and manage roadways, since brining can occur up to 48 hours before a

storm. It's best to apply brine when road surfaces are dry, so that the solution doesn't wash away or become diluted. That typically means that crews won't brine roads if rainy conditions come ahead of snow or ice. Brine is cheaper and more costefficient than rock salt. The City of Watertown treats streets with salt and brine.

SMALL APPLIANCE AND ELECTRONICS RECYCLE

E-cycle Wisconsin laws mandate all electronic devices be recycled. Small appliances and electronic devices must be brought to be recycled at the Street Department/Recycle Center on South First Street or delivered to a private contractor. The recycle carts are only to be used for the standard materials such as: paper, plastic, cans, glass. We have several recyclers, based on product and cost, that we do business with, and each recycler specializes in different products.

CURB PLACEMENT OF CARTS

Please allow a minimum of 3 feet of space between carts as well as from other items such as mailboxes, parked cars, and utility poles. Our trucks must be able to maneuver the lifting arm around the cart for pick up. The handles should be on the house side. As part of our City Ordinance, carts must be off the boulevard by 8pm the day of your scheduled pick up. Nothing will be picked up outside the cart. The Solid Waste and Recycle crew are not allowed, per city ordinance, to pick up items abandoned at the curb. Always refer to the Recycling Guidelines for reference/pricing or rent a dumpster.

STREETLIGHT OUTAGES

Streetlight outages may be reported to www.we-energies.com/ services/streetlight

The streetlights on Main Street (the carriage lights on poles and concrete poles), the Church Street carriage lights and river walk lights are maintained by the city.

LANDSCAPE WASTE

Residents may take grass clippings, vines, leaves, garden plants and wood chips to the yard waste site at 1507 Boomer Street. Twigs and brush or stones must be separated and go in a different area at the site. The Yard Waste Site is open for the 2024 season April 1 – December 2. No debris or garbage may be left on site. All bags/containers must be emptied. An attendant will be on-site for questions as we do not offer unloading assistance.

Landscape timbers, railroad ties, etc...compost very slowly and must be taken to the Street & Recycle center as construction debris. (fees apply)

LIMB/BRUSH CHIPPING

Stacking requirements

Cut ends facing street except in a sidewalk area please place parallel as not to block sidewalk.

Limbs must be a minimum of 4 feet in length Limbs may be a maximum of 6 inches in diameter No grass, fabric, rocks, stumps or debris mixed with limbs Please do not park in front of a stack

If the stack is covered in snow or frozen to the ground, we cannot complete the pick up

The chipper team will operate weekly zone routes through November. December - March please contact the street department at (920)262-4080 or streets@watertownwi.gov to be added to the list for periodic scheduling.

CHRISTMAS TREE CHIPPING

Weather permitting, discarded Christmas tree chipping will begin Monday, January 6, 2025. Nails, wires, lights, tree stands, and plastic bags must be removed from the trees. All strings of lights can be recycled for no fee- please drop off at the Street Department/Recycle Center.

SOLID WASTE & RECYCLING GUIDE



Recycling and solid waste carts are owned by the city and must stay with the residence. Items that are outside of the carts and placed on the curb will not be picked up.

BLUE RECYCLE CARTS

Corrugated Cardboard, chipboard & glossy chipboard, all cardboard from food products – cake boxes, cracker boxes, tissue boxes, pizza boxes, orange juice containers, fast food containers, etc.

Packing material, peanuts, and bubble wrap

• Since 2019 - The City's recycling contractor does not accept packing material. Please place these in your garbage cart.

The below items may be brought to the DPW Street Division/ Recycle Center at 811 S First St.

Please do NOT place the below items in Recycle Carts. Check in at office upon arrival. Fees may apply. Lift assistance is not available.

WHITE GOODS

Stoves, washers, dryers, dehumidifiers, refrigerators, air conditioners, freezers

ELECTRONICS

Televisions, computers, monitors, key pads, printers, mouse, fax machine, cords, chargers, stereo, laptops, VCR, DVD and blue ray players, phones, etc.

APPLIANCES - SMALL AND MEDIUM

Microwaves, dehumidifier, air conditioner, water cooler, toaster, mixers, toaster ovens, Keurig, carpet cleaners, vacuum, space heater, paper shredder, etc.

FURNITURE

Couches, recliner, love seat, sectional, upholstered chairs, futons, tables, ottoman, lawn furniture, mattresses, box springs, bed frames, etc.

CONSTRUCTION DEBRIS

Wood (including non-hazardous painted, treated and coated wood/products), wall coverings, plaster, drywall, plumbing fixtures, non-asbestos insulation, roofing shingles and roof coverings (not from an entire roofing job), plastics – not sealed in a manner that conceals waste or contaminates. Please note we cannot accept bulk construction debris. Please call the DPW Street Division BEFORE you bring the items in to confirm pricing and availability.

WASTE OIL AND FILTERS

Place oil in a sealed one-gallon container (milk jug or similar size) and bring to the Street Department at 811 S First Street. No oil mixed with anti-freeze, gasoline, paint thinner or other flammable liquids. Empty oil containers may be recycled.

BATTERIES

- Automotive Lead acid batteries may be recycled at the Street Department.
- Household/Dry cell batteries may be disposed of in the garbage.
- Nickel cadmium (nicad), lithium ion (rechargeable), Lithium metal, and mercury batteries must be deposited at a Clean Sweep Event.

ITEMS WITH MERCURY

- Fluorescent bulbs, high pressure sodium or metal halide bulbs – must be recycled at the Street Department/ Recycle Center. Fees apply.
- Incandescent or halogen bulbs contain no hazard and may go into the garbage.
- Thermometers and thermostats must be recycled at the Street Department or Clean Sweep Event.

LATEX PAINT

Air dry liquid paint by removing the lid. To speed up the process, mix sand or kitty litter with the paint. Dispose of dried paint in gray garbage cart.

SEWER DEDUCT METER (SDM) CUSTOMERS

- Report your meter reads: Don't forget to call in your SDM readings monthly while using the meter.
- Winter Care: Keep your meter in a warm location to prevent freezing. A frozen and broken meter will forfeit your deposit when returned.
- Return or Pickup: If you won't be using the meter next year, please, contact us to arrange pickup before December 31st to avoid the \$20 rental fee for 2025.

METER REPLACEMENT/UPGRADE & CROSS CONNECTION SURVEY APPOINTMENTS

The Water Utility Department, in compliance with PSC regulations, is required to test a certain percentage of meters each year. If your water meter is scheduled for replacement, upgrade, or a cross-connection survey, a notification letter will be mailed to your address on file.

Did you receive a letter and have no time to call? You can make the appointment online! Go to the City website, watertownwi.gov, scroll through the blue circles in the center of the screen click " Meter Check Service Appointment", choose your preferred date & time, fill in the required information, and click Complete Appointment. Or call 920-262-4075 to arrange a convenient date and time.

Please respond promptly to the notification letter to help us maintain an efficient program without the need for additional notices or water shut-offs.

Knowing the location of your water meter and shut-off valve is essential in an emergency. Periodically exercising the valve helps prevent leaks during meter changes and ensures it functions when needed.

Please note the following:

- The Water Department is not responsible for leaks after a valve has been used for meter change-outs.
- Do not obstruct the water meter; Water Department personnel need easy access.
- The Water Department is not responsible for property damage if the meter is obstructed.
- If you build around the meter, ensure at least 1 to 2 feet of clearance on all sides, including above and below.

Additionally, the EPA and DNR require us to do a cross-connection survey at every property in the city. This survey will be done during the same appointment as the meter replacement/transmitter installation and will take about 15 minutes.

The cross-connection control program is designed, to protect the public water supply from potential backflow hazards that could allow "dirty" water to enter the system. The Water Department must complete an annual report for the DNR indicating the number of cross-connection surveys completed for residential, commercial, and industrial customers.

HydroCorp has been hired to complete the industrial and commercial cross-inspections. Please visit the city website to learn about HydroCorp and how



the cross-connection inspection program affects you.

Did you know that under 50 pounds of pressure....

- A dripping faucet uses 15 gallons of water per day.
- 1/16" opening uses 943 gallons per day, which could raise your bill by \$276.47 in one month.
- 1/8" opening uses 3,806 gallons per day.
- 1/4"opening uses 15,226 gallons per day, which could raise your bill to \$3,853.46 a month.

WHY IS HYDRANT FLUSHING NECESSARY?

The Water Department conducts hydrant flushing twice annually, during spring and fall. The primary objectives of hydrant flushing include verifying proper hydrant operation, checking for appropriate pressure and flow, and moving water rapidly through the system in the shortest time possible.

During hydrant flushing, the water in the distribution system moves rapidly, which helps to remove stagnant water and clean the mains. However, it's normal to see water discoloration during this process. The color of the water can range from yellow to yellow-brown, and in severe cases, brown to red. To prevent discolored water from



entering your home or business, we recommend avoiding water usage during the flushing hours of 6 a.m.-2 p.m. If you notice water personnel in your area, it's safe to assume that flushing is taking place. Once flushing is complete, wait for at least an hour before using water, but keep in mind that discoloration may persist for up to four hours. Although the water is safe to use, the discoloration may not be aesthetically pleasing. If the discoloration persists, please reach out to the Water Department for assistance.

Water discoloration may occur at other times due to street construction or the opening of fire hydrants. We advise you not to use softened or hot water during these times, as rust may get into your softener and water heater, making it difficult to move.

FROZEN PIPE PREVENTION

Winterizing your home in Wisconsin is crucial to safeguard your water pipes from freezing. By following these steps and taking proactive measures, you can significantly reduce the risk of frozen pipes and the associated damage. Remember, prevention is key, and investing time and effort into winterizing your home will save you from costly repairs and unnecessary inconvenience,



- Make sure that all basement windows and doors are closed and insulated.
- Insulate water pipes that are on outside walls, especially in the basement, crawl spaces, and attic. Use pipe insulation sleeves or heat tape where necessary.
- Re-open heat vents in basements or crawl spaces.
- Keep cabinet doors open: In areas with pipes inside cabinets, such as under sinks, open the cabinet doors to allow warm air from your home to circulate and reach the pipes.
- Shut off the outdoor water supply.
- Allow faucets to drip during extremely cold weather. This keeps water flowing and reduces the likelihood of freezing.
- Vacant properties: Consider taking extra precautions and hiring a professional plumber to winterize the property properly.

The Water Department is not responsible for thawing the service after curb stops, or for any plumbing issues within the property or home. If there is a leaking service, the water will be turned off at the curb stop, and any expenses incurred will be the responsibility of the property owner.

Should the meter freeze and break due to negligence on the part of the property owner or occupant, the broken meter cost and labor charges will be billed.

PUBLIC AWARENESS - CROSS CONNECTION CONTROL

Bathrooms & Kitchens

Did you know that your water can become contaminated if connections to your plumbing system are not properly protected.

The purpose of the local Cross Connection Program, as required by the State Plumbing Code and Regulations, is to ensure everyone in the community has safe, clean drinking water.



It's Public Safety...

To avoid contamination, backflow preventers are required by state plumbing codes wherever there is an actual or potential hazard for a cross connection. The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources requires all public water suppliers to maintain an ongoing Cross Connection Control Program involving public education, onsite inspections, and possible corrective actions by building owners.

What is Cross Connection?

A cross connection is an actual or potential connection between the safe drinking water (potable) supply and the source of contamination or pollution. State plumbing codes require approved back-flow prevention devices, assemblies, or methods to be installed at every point of potable water connection and use. Cross Connections must be properly protected or eliminated.

How does contamination occur?

When you turn on a faucet, you expect the water to be as safe as when it left the treatment plant. However, certain hydraulic conditions left unprotected within your plumbing system may allow hazardous substances to enter and contaminate your drinking water or even the public water supply. Water normally flows in one direction to your faucet. However, under certain conditions, water can actually flow backwards; this is known as Backflow. There are two situations that can cause Backflow: back siphonage and back pressure.

What is Backflow?

Backflow is when the water in your pipes (the pipes that enter your home after the water meter), travels backwards. There are two situations that can cause water to flow backward: back siphonage and back pressure.

What is Back Siphonage?

Back siphonage may occur due to a loss of pressure in the municipal water system during a fire emergency, a water main break, or system repair. This creates a siphon in your plumbing which can draw water out of a sink or bucket.

What is Back Pressure?

Backpressure may be created when a source of pressure, such as a boiler, creates a pressure greater than the pressure supplied from the Public Water Supply. This may cause contaminated water to be pushed into your plumbing system through an unprotected cross-connection.

In the Bathroom - Hand Held Shower The handheld shower fixture is compliant if:


- When the shower hose head is hanging freely, it is at least 1 inch above the top of the flood-level rim of the receptor (tub).
- Complies with ASSE # 1014.
- Has the ASME code 112.18.1 stamped on the handle.



In the Bathroom—Toilet Tanks

There are many unapproved toilet tank fill valve products sold at common retailers which do not meet the state plumbing code requirements for backflow prevention.

- Look for the ASSE #1002 Standard symbol on the device and packaging.
- Replace any unapproved devices with an ASSE #1002 approved anti-siphon ball-cock assembly.
 The average cost for this, do-it-yourself, type device available at home improvement stores is \$8 to \$22.
- Verify overflow tube is one inch below the critical level (CL) marking on the device.



Do...

- Keep the ends of the hoses clear of all possible contaminants.
- Make sure dishwashers are installed with the proper "air gap" device.
- Verify the hose bibb vacuum breaker on all threaded faucets around your home.
- Make sure water treatment devices such as water softeners have the proper "air gap", which is a minimum of one inch above the drain.






Don't...

- Submerge hoses in buckets, pools, tubs, sinks, ponds, or automobile radiators.
- Use spray attachments without an approved backflow prevention device.
- Connect drain pipes from water softeners or other treatment systems directly to the sewer drain. Always be sure there is a one-inch "air gap" separation.

Hoses and water treatment devices may create a potential backflow hazard if not properly isolated with backflow prevention devices or methods.

Children ages 18 years or younger are eligible for free or reduced-cost vaccines if they meet at least one of the following requirements: They are Medicaid eligible, Medicaid-enrolled (BadgerCare/ForwardHealth) or they have no health insurance. Seasonal influenza vaccines for adults and children will be available at the Watertown Department of Public Health, please call for an appointment.

Flu vaccines will cost \$35.00 and high dose \$75.00 Medicare is accepted for adult flu vaccines. BadgerCare/Forward Health insurance is accepted only for children ages 18 years or younger. Private pay vaccine is available.

SEPTEMBER IS NATIONAL PREPAREDNESS MONTH

September is National Preparedness Month, which is an observance each September to raise awareness about the importance of preparing for disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time. Everyone can be more prepared in their homes by creating emergency go-kits both inside the home and in their cars.

1. Home Go-Kit

After an emergency, a person might need to survive on their own for several days. This means having water, food, and other supplies. To assemble your kit, store items in airtight plastic bags. Place it in an easy to reach area in the event you need to leave the house right away. After assembling your kit remember to maintain it so it's ready when needed.


